Men's Shed Shaping Up

Eighteen months after receiving a \$60,000 grant from FRRR (Foundation for Rural Regional Renewal) there has been a major step forward in the construction of the shed extension for the Lake Grace Community Men's Shed.

Unforeseen costs and the time taken to meander through the process of Development Applications and the ensuing Building Permit meant it was a full 12 months before anything happened. In that time the Men's Shed were able to secure further funding from CBH, Lotterywest, Lake Grace Community Crop Community Funding and the Shire of Lake Grace.

With the plumbing completed earlier this year and a tree removed from the site it was a relief to see the concrete pad go down this week and the framework being erected. The builders have moved on to other commitments and will be back to continue the work of cladding and installing roller doors and personnel doors.

The shed extension is taller than the existing shed with the future plan being to install a mezzanine floor for further storage.




Ready for the last competition training session before the Katanning Gymnastics Competition on Saturday 24th June and we've now added to our floor space which is fantastic.

Book Review: Homecoming by Kate Morton

A beautiful cover and a fabulous read. If you thought your family had a few skeletons in the closet, chances are they have little to get excited about compared to ones within the covers of this novel.

Adelaide Hills, Christmas Eve 1959:


At the end of a scorching hot day, beside a creek in the grounds of a grand country house, a local man makes a terrible discovery. Police are called, and the small town of Tambilla becomes embroiled in one of the most baffling murder investigations in the history of South Australia.

Many years later and thousands of miles away, Jess is a journalist in search of a story. Having lived and worked in London for nearly two decades, she now finds herself unemployed and struggling to make ends meet. A phone call summons her back to Sydney, where her beloved grandmother, Nora, who raised Jess when her mother could not, has suffered a fall and is seriously ill in hospital.

At Nora's house, Jess discovers a true-crime book chronicling a long-buried police case: The Turner Family Tragedy of 1959. It is only when Jess skims through its pages that she finds a shocking connection between her own family and this notorious event – a murder mystery that has never been satisfactorily resolved.

An epic story that spans generations, Homecoming asks what we would do for those we love, how we protect the lies we tell, and what it means to come home.





Presenters Ashleigh Michael and Alyson Elari from Injury Matters were invited to Lake Grace to present two workshops; After a Road Crash – Supporting Yourself and Others and a one-hour information session Stay On Your Feet – Move, Improve, Remove. Both workshops were funded by CBH which meant the CRC didn't have to chase funding themselves for these important learning opportunities. Both workshops were well attended with 12 at the 'After a Road Crash' and 14 at the SOYF.

Each year in Western Australia, thousands of people are impacted by road trauma. Responding or first on scene at a car crash, losing family and friends, dealing with injuries, caring for those injured, causing a crash or witnessing a serious crash can have a devastating and enduring impact.

Injury Matters is funded to provide Road Trauma Support in WA and are available to help at any time. Their counsellors are available to have a confidential discussion and answer any questions you may have. They provide free counselling statewide via phone, skype or face to face to anyone affected by road trauma regardless of their level of involvement.

As we know SOYF is alive and well in Lake Grace with Cobi Stanton corralling over 55s for an hour of exercise

every Tuesday morning. The ethos behind SOYF is that you need to keep moving, improve your health by managing medications, nutrition and keeping a healthy mind as well as removing hazards around the home, checking your eyesight and wearing safe footwear.

Feedback from the participants was excellent so we will look at running these workshops in two years time. Another workshop that could be of interest within the community is anxiety, recognizing the triggers and how to manage it. State Wage Case Decision

The Western Australian Industrial Relations Commission has increased the state minimum wage and all pay rates in WA awards effective from the first pay period on or after 1 July 2023.

The state minimum wage for adult employees (21 and over) will increase by 5.3% (\$43.50 per week) to \$863.40 per week.

State award rates of pay will also increase by 5.3%.

Junior rates and rates for apprentices and trainees will also increase proportionately.

The new minimum rates and updated Wageline WA award summaries will be available on the Wageline website by 1 July 2023.

Subscribe to Wageline news or follow Wageline social media to be notified with the new pay rates are available on the Wageline website.

This pay rate increase only applies to employers and employees in the **state industrial relations system**. It covers businesses and organisations which operate as:

- sole traders
- unincorporated partnerships

- unincorporated trust arrangements
- incorporated associations that are not trading or financial corporations and other not-for-profit organisations that are not trading or financial corporations

Josh is counting the days down before he leaves us for a few weeks to visit friends and family on a long overdue holiday to New Zealand. That means Scott and Wade will be left to hold down the fort.

Wade assisted Kondinin Police with a call out near Norseman last week. We feared the worse after a couple had messaged their loved ones on Sunday morning stating they were driving back to Norseman. Come Monday afternoon they still had not arrived. A phone triangulation showed them to be 150km east of Hyden and their phone had not moved in many hours. It turns out they has decided to camp the night on the side of the road without telling anyone. It serves as a good reminder to let people know if you are travelling long distances and change your plans.

CRIME NEWS

The Kulin Post Office was the victim of a Burglary recently. A male forced entry into the premises via one of the front windows. Once inside he stole a number of items and attempted to depart the scene in his vehicle. Now we say he attempted it because the CCTV



cameras outside the post office captured everything. The male found his car wouldn't start and spent 10 minutes under the hood trying to get it going before realised he had to make a getaway. He pushed his car down the road and managed to push start it before leaving the area. Not before leaving us with some great images including some of his distinctive tattoos.

We attended the scene the next morning and put Scott's forensic skills to the test. Aside from the CCTV of the offender and his vehicle, we found a large amount of forensic evidence. The vehicle the male was using had been stolen in Perth the night before, however the offender was linked to that offence already. Detectives and multiple police stations became involved and the male was arrested at the border of South Australia. He has since been charged with this and several other offences.

We have recently investigated a stealing from the Lake Grace Early Learning Centre that some may be aware of. Three males attended the centre during the hours of darkness and dug up a custom-made street sign that the children use in their playground.

Firstly, this was extremely disappointing to see and was upsetting for some of the children. After a prompt investigation, with the assistance of members of the community, we were able to identify the vehicle used and a 19-year-old Lake Grace man has been charged with Stealing. The sign was returned back to its rightful place however the offenders have removed the 'Kane St' part of the sign and this is still outstanding. We have further lines of enquiry that we'll follow up to track down the outstanding suspects.

TRAFFIC NEWS

Aside from a driver being charged with No Authority To Drive after we stopped him speeding near Newdegate and found his driver's licence was suspended due to fines enforcement, we have had little in the way of traffic news.

We have received complaints of a specific vehicle being involved in hooning behaviour on the roads and in public spaces. We will be following that up this week and will let you know how long his vehicle gets impounded for.

GPs Discussion on Improving Health Outcomes

GPs from across Western Australia discussed ways to improve health outcomes through primary care in a forum with Greens Senator Jordan Steele-John and members of the Royal Australian College of GPs earlier this month.

The forum gave GPs from Perth, as well as regional and rural communities, the opportunity to raise key issues with the Greens Spokesperson on Health Senator Steele-John. The pressing issues on the agenda are:

- The benefits of 60-day dispensing for WA patients. This will double the medicines pharmacists can dispense to patients for stable conditions on the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme to up to 60 days. It will save patients up to \$180 per year on dispensing fees and more for people taking multiple medicines, reduce unnecessary trips to pick up medicines, and free up GP appointments for other patients.
- Medicare patient rebates need to better reflect the cost of providing health services across WA and reduce out-of-pocket costs for patients.
- Growing the general practice workforce by supporting registrars to experience general practice placements and making it easier and more attractive for overseas medical graduates to come to WA.

RACGP WA Chair Dr Ramya Raman said the forum is a valuable opportunity for the Senator to hear from WA's GPs.

"GPs know their patients and communities, and the challenges many people face accessing healthcare and medicines they can afford, particularly with the current cost of living crisis," she said.

"The change to 60-day medicine dispensing is in patients' best interests and it's long overdue. It has been recommended by the independent Pharmaceutical Benefits Advisory Committee since 2018 and brings Australia into line with other countries like New Zealand, the US and Canada, where patients can get multiple months of medications on a single script.

"This reform will benefit the people who need it most, including those with chronic conditions, people in rural areas who have a long drive to their nearest pharmacy, and our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities. Our parliamentarians need to put patients first and support this reform which will save money and time for some six million Australians, and free up GP appointments."

The WA Chair said more can be done to grow the state's GP workforce, particularly in rural communities, and to reduce out-of-pocket costs for patients.

"General practice keeps people healthy and out of hospital – everyone needs access to high-quality and affordable GP care, no matter where they live across WA or the rest of our country," she said.

"There are many ways the government can grow WA's GP workforce. The RACGP is continuing to call for governments to make it easier and more attractive for international medical graduates to come to Australia by cutting red tape and re-instating the subsidy for their training to practice as a specialist GP. We also want to see the return of a general practice placement program so registrars can experience what it's like to be a GP and the rewards of this career.

"It's also essential that Medicare patient rebates better reflect the cost of providing health services across WA. The RACGP welcomed the recent increase in Medicare rebates in the Federal Budget, but there is a long way to go to repair the decades of underfunding of what is Australia's public health insurance. I look forward to working with MPs and Senators on this, and the government's reforms to continue strengthening Medicare and rebuilding general practice care for patients."

One of the GPs attending the forum, Dr Damien Zilm, who practices in Meekatharra in the Mid-West, was keen to speak to the Senator about the benefits of 60-day dispensing for his patients.

"This change will save our patients money at a time when they really need it. It's especially important for our families who just miss out on healthcare card subsidies – they are really hurting right now and halving the cost of their medication will make a difference," said Dr Zilm.

"It will also make life easier for my patients who live on remote stations and places that are over 100 kilometres from the nearest town with a pharmacy. It will cut the unnecessary travel, and they'll be less likely to run out of their medications."

Converting a District plate to a District optional plate. LG****

Do you currently display a Lake Grace District plate on your vehicle that is sentimental to you?

Did you know that these plates are ineligible to be remade if one or both are lost or stolen. These plates can now be converted to Optional District plates.

This means you would be able to

- Have them remade if they are lost or stolen
- The grant of the Certificate of Right to Display and Trade
- The ability to display them on a vehicle, whether it is licensed in the plates holder's name, a third party or an organisation
- The holder of the Certificate may sell that right at any price in the open market

There is no change to the appearance of a District plate once it has been converted but you do have the option to have it remade in either BLACK on WHITE, BLACK on YELLOW or BRAND WA FORMAT. (fee applies)

You do not require any forms and the current fee for conversion is \$175.00

Are We Under the Right Influence

A Most Famous Face

Indian Finance and Economic Updates

544 years ago one of the most famous people in history was born. Though you don't know her name, you definitely know her face.

Here is the story of the woman with the world's most famous smile, Lisa Gherardini, who never even saw her own portrait...

Lisa Gherardini was born in the Republic of Florence on 15th June, 1479.

She came from an old and aristocratic Florentine family which, though well off, wasn't quite as wealthy or influential as it used to be.

The Gherardinis made money from farms they owned around the city. She was the eldest of seven children, and the family moved around Florence several times, eventually settling near the famous Santa Croce.

Here the family may have befriended Piero da Vinci, the father of Leonardo. In 1495 Lisa married a cloth merchant called Francesco del Giocondo. So she became Lisa del Giocondo.

Mona" was a common Italian contraction of "madonna," meaning "my lady," the equivalent of the English "Madam". So Mona Lisa in Italian meant "Madam Lisa". Hence the Mona Lisa is known as La Gioconda in Italy and La Joconde in France.

He had money, she had a noble name, and together they lived a comfortable middle class life. Lisa had five children with Francesco, and she also raised his son from a previous marriage.

In 1503 they moved out of an apartment and into their own house on the Via della Stufa; Francesco had become part of Florence's government and was making more money. It was in this year, 1503, that Francesco commissioned a portrait of his wife, perhaps to celebrate moving into their new home.

And he commissioned none other than Leonardo da Vinci, who had just returned to Florence from Milan (via Venice) after nearly twenty years away. The 16th century biographer Giorgio Vasari said Leonardo "lingered over it for four years" before leaving the painting unfinished.

He had been commissioned to create a large painting in Florence's town hall, the Palazzo del Vecchio, and so his attention turned to that. But Leonardo never completed that project either.

And when he returned to Milan in 1508, and thereafter went to France to work for King Francis I, he took the portrait of Lisa del Giocondo with him.

He probably continued working on it until his death in France in 1519. So the subject of the most famous portrait in history never even saw it.

The Mona Lisa was kept at the Palace of Fontainebleau and then at Versailles by the French monarchy.



Until 1797, after the Revolution, when it was moved to the Louvre — where it has remained ever since.

But back to Florence, where Francesco was in trouble. He was a supporter of the Medici family (who had been exiled in 1494) and was imprisoned in 1512 amid political tensions.

Only to be released later that year when the Medicis returned and took control of the city again. In 1537 Francesco died, and though Lisa received enough from his will to support herself she entered the (now abandoned) Convent of Sant'Orsola, where one of her daughters was already a nun.

And that is where she died in 1542, at the age of 63. So that's a very brief biography of Lisa del Giocondo, born 544 years ago.

Little could she or Francesco have known that her face (and smile) would become perhaps the most famous face in history, known all around the world nearly five centuries after her death.
