Medals for Lake Grace Gymnasts

On Saturday 24th June, Lake Grace Gymnastics Club attended the Katanning Gymnastics Competition with 13 athletes across multiple levels. This is the first time we have taken a team to a competition since 2019, which consisted of 2 athletes.

Our athletes showed their skills to judges across 4 apparatus (bars, beam, floor and vault for the girls, and bars, pommel, vault and floor for our boy). It was freezing in the gymnastics centre, but despite the cold conditions and it being their first time at a competition, all of our gymnasts demonstrated their skills to the best of their ability and with confidence.

Each gymnast was graded on how well they demonstrated the skills within their routines, so they were only competing against themselves during the competition. This has given our gymnasts an amazing sense of achievement within themselves and the training they have been doing, and also given them something to work towards for the next competition set to be held in Narrogin on the 9th of September.

- Our HC/MC workshop is rapidly approaching, we have six taking part. Thank you to those who are participating, it ensures that we are able to bring these workshops to Lake Grace. We won't be holding another one in 2023 but if we can get the interest Keen's will be back in 2024. It's never too early to show an interest, by putting your hand up it gives us an indication that this training and accreditation is needed.
- We are struggling to get another accredited forklift workshop via TAFE, apparently their trainers are all heading to the mines and I can't say that I blame them. - On another happy note we have been successful in obtaining a FRRR grant (see page 11) to go toward young adult activities (18-35) for drought resilience. This grant will go toward three activities; one in Lake Grace, one in Darkan and one in another centre yet

to be decided. These activities will be actioned and managed by a committee of young adults in each community, that way they're getting an activity or event that genuinely appeals to them. The CRC will be in the background to manage the money and provide some guidance; depending on the event planned (Lake Grace's is an Oktoberfest) more funding and sponsorship may have to be sought. Watch this space for more information.

- We have also booked an accredited First Aid workshop with St John for Friday 6th October. This workshop is for youth (16-18) and will come under the banner of Lake Grace Roadwise. We will be looking for funding to cover the costs of this workshop to keep any costs to a minimum (preferably free). Lake Grace Roadwise is keen to give youth the skills and confidence to act if they are involved in or come across an accident while driving. We are more than happy to take expressions of interest.

Live Sheep Trade

On Wednesday 21st of June, the Live Export by Sea Phase out Consultative Committee attended Lake Grace meeting with approximately 180 people attending at the Lake Grace Sports Pavilion. People travelled from as far as Lake King and Jerramungup to have their concerns aired. The committee was introduced, and Chairperson Philip Glyde spoke of the process of the committee and what they had done so far.

Many people addressed the panel with their concerns aout what a phase out would do to their businesses and the unintended consequences it would mean for their towns. Consensus was that this is an unnecessary policy driven by votes and not based on science or animal welfare. Below are some of the comments from people that attend.

Andrew Stewart started proceedings by expressing to the panel the consequences of uncertainty in the market at present. Sheep are selling for as low as two dollars per head in the sale yards with many growers not able to get stock up to weight for processors. With the dry May paddock feed is short and many growers have lambs on farm that should have been sold and new season lambs being born. Bob Iffla spoke along the same lines quoting the extra numbers that he has on hand, and it is a considerable number with the number of sheep he carries on his farms. Garry Prater then explained where the state of the market was at and some comment with statistics from the SCIRO. Garry spoke of the possibility of Saudi Arabia reentering the live export market and the possibility they could take up to a million sheep per year. The Saudi's had been a major exporter of Australian sheep but exited the market when Australia introduced the Exporter Supply Chain Assurance System (ESCAS) following the Awassi Express debacle. The ESCAS system has the strongest animal welfare standards of any country that participates in the export of live sheep by sea.

Rochelle Walker explained to the committee that she is concerned for the many different people that are involved with her being able to conduct her sheep enterprise. She is concerned for the shearers and mulesing contractors that support her to the shop keepers that rely on people being in her town to workers that she employs to work on farms and support the local sporting clubs. Noel Bairstow followed her and spoke of the history of the live export trade and how it has evolved and supported communities over the years. Asking what the Federal government is going to do to support our communities. Noel also mentioned

that live export of sheep by sea also enables the live export of cattle as well with many cargos having both on board. Live export of cattle to the middle east would be too expensive without the sheep on board.

Darren Spencer spoke on behalf of the shearing industry and made mention of impact the decrease in sheep numbers since 1991 had had on the surrounding towns with supermarkets closing and some services no longer available. Shearing contractors are major employers in small towns and the nature of many shearers is they spend most of their income in town. The other major issue with another decrease in sheep numbers is the continuity of work for employees in the shearing industry.

Chloe McDougall expressed her concerns as a small business owner in town and the fact that the phase out is occurring not because of science but out of sentiment of people that have no financial investment in the industry. She spoke of her science-based education and that she could understand if the proposed phase out was based on scientific evidence. Rex Parsons from Jerramungup commented on how his shire has so many corporate farmers who don't farm with livestock in their enterprise and are buying up large tracts of land. These farms only employ a minimum number of staff and their local sporting teams are now struggling to field a side in the Ongerup Association. When they had family farms that ran sheep there were many more people in their town to support the local sporting clubs and the local businesses.

Owner manager of Patmore feeds Dean Toovey asked the panel if they could recommend that the industry be given plenty of time to transition if that's the decision. Patmore Feeds have just invested considerable capital to build new pellet making infrastructure at their Cuballing property. Leon Clarke spoke of the effect this policy is already having and will continue to have on his farming enterprise which produces barley, hay, and straw for livestock producers. Shane Carruthers spoke of how his two sons had come home from Perth to work on the farm and run a sheep-based enterprise." If we were to lose the live sheep, we would have to re-think our strategy "

Bradley Lay summed up the stupidity of this policy when he asked panel chairman where he could get a Social Licence after Federal Minister for Agriculture Hon Murray Watts comment that Live Export trade had lost its social licence. Many people are very passionate about this policy, and we haven't heard the last of it. The panel is due to hand their report to the Federal Minister on September 30 and it will be up to the Ministers discretion whether the report is made public.

Several local people attended the final meeting in Belmont on Friday 23 rd June and reported that it was a very tense and emotional crowd that attended with many animal activists attending. This is an emotional topic on both sides with over 4000 people supplying submissions to the panel before closing date 31st May.



Backyard Buddies— European Wasp

The European wasp 2022-23 season has drawn to a close with 21 nests found and destroyed.

The optimum time to detect and locate European wasps (*Vespula germanica*) has passed. Traps have been cleaned and now is the time to reflect on another fruitful surveillance season. It is also time to say **thank you** to everyone across WA who adopted a surveillance trap, kept an eye out and reported anything unusual!

How did we go?

Nest numbers were much lower than last season; 21 compared to 53. Nest distribution indicates multiple areas of incursion across Perth, predominantly in and around industrial areas – which is typical of this hitchhiking pest. The nests detected did not show signs of 'overwintering', which means they were created this season. This is a promising indication that nests were not missed during last season's surveillance activities. Public awareness and reporting remained strong. Residents, businesses, and local government all detected wasp activity in good time. This allows for nests to be found and trapping areas expanded where required. And finally, there have been no signs or reports of wasp activity since April!

Season highlights:

• 2,800 surveillance traps deployed across the

Perth metropolitan region

- 75 regional traps deployed with 0 detections
- 171 new traps adopted by the community, bringing the total of 'Adopt a trap' subscribers to 1076
- 350 public enquiries, with 4 confirmed detections
- 21 nests found and destroyed across 6 Local Government Areas, all in the Perth metropolitan region
- the majority of nests were found in embankments of water sumps and drains
- a nest was located in a wood log at primary school playground – yikes!
- wasp flight paths were tracked to locate a nest on Perth Airport grounds
- no public injuries were reported from disturbing these cryptic and often hidden nests



65 Projects Funded Thanks to Future Drought Fund

FRRR has awarded \$3,733,324 to local organisations in 11 regions across Australia for 65 projects that will enhance the capacity and resilience of these agriculture -dependent communities in preparing for the impacts of future drought.

Funded through the Future Drought Fund's Helping Regional Communities Prepare for Drought Initiative, this is the second tranche of funding delivered through the Initiative's Community Impact Program. The first tranche was announced last month.

The Initiative is designed to support locally-led organisations across 35 remote, rural and regional regions, identified as vulnerable to the impacts of drought.

Thanks to the Community Impact Program, these organisations will work together to deliver a range of projects, events, initiatives, training, capability building and small-scale community infrastructure projects to assist local people prepare for future droughts.

As part of the Program, a facilitator has been employed in each region to support the lead community partner in engaging and communicating with key stakeholders, helping identify investments that are already happening locally and ensuring that the projects align with the community's preparedness priorities.

Nina O'Brien, Disaster Resilience and Recovery Lead for FRRR, says that the Foundation is always impressed by the fortitude and adaptability of rural people and their willingness to learn and share innovative ways to build drought resilience.

"The collaborative nature of the Community Impact Program has been well received by local groups. They have really stepped up, coming together to shape local solutions to increase understanding and provide practical solutions to increasing drought preparedness that make sense at a local community level.

"With the Australian Government's support, these grants will create opportunities for these agriculturedependent communities to increase social connection, strengthen network opportunities and identify and adopt innovative and transformative ways to build drought resilience.

"We look forward to seeing the impacts of these projects, as they roll out over the next two years," Ms O'Brien said.

As part of the program, each region can also access tailored Australian Rural Leadership Foundation (ARLF) leadership development activities.

ARLF Chief Executive, Matt Linnegar, says the leadership development supports the delivery of local projects and yields long-term benefits for the regions.

"We know that a multimodal approach of leadership development increases the impact the investments have in each region. In addition to the project funding, these leadership development activities build social capital required to support the project and people in each region. We get to connect local networks, create a deeper sense of shared purpose and develop capability that helps people to take action and address challenges and make the most of opportunities."

Participants also gain access to the wider alumni network of the ARLF. "It's these connections that prove invaluable to people. When they're stuck, there's someone to ask for advice," Mr Linnegar said.

A detailed list of grant recipients and their preparedness projects is below.

Other elements of the Future Drought Fund's Helping Regional Communities Prepare for Drought Initiative are also underway, including a Mentoring program, being led by ARLF. Work is also underway on the design of the network to connect leaders working on these projects across the country and FRRR is finalising the appointment of an expertise panel, which the groups awarded funding can draw on, if they don't have locally qualified people with the skills they need.

In addition, there will be small grants on offer in areas that aren't covered by these Community Impact Program grants, which will open early next year.

Successful grant for Wheatbelt South (Region 18) were:

Corrigin Farm Improvement Group. Community Partner Lead Organisation (CPLO). Strengthen drought preparedness and drive local action in the Wheatbelt South region through the coordination of Community Impact Program activities and evaluation administration. \$73,687

Shire of West Arthur. Economic / Business Diversification. Improve capability, coordination and collaboration between networks, other community organisations and sectors that can be drawn upon in future drought through networking sessions, information, events and through the increase in the utilisation of community infrastructure. \$106,437.

Lake Grace CRC. Youth Events and Networking. Building capability in community leaders, networks and organisations to undertake strategic drought resilience planning and future drought preparedness activities through the establishment of an informal youth network, activities and events which will build capabilities of future leaders. \$52,277.

Corrigin Farm Improvement Group. Next Generation Volunteers. Support capacity building activities where local people and communities have opportunities to develop the skills and knowledge to ace the unique challenges caused by drought in remote, rural and regional Australia through delivering leadership workshops and volunteering opportunities for emerging leaders.


For most of the last hundred years, Biloxi was known for its beaches, resorts, and seafood industry. But it had a darker side. It was also notorious for corruption and vice, everything from gambling, prostitution, bootleg liquor, drugs...even contract killings. The vice was controlled by a small cabal of mobsters, many of them rumoured to be members of the Dixie Mafia.

Keith Rudy and Hugh Malco grew up in Biloxi in the sixties and were childhood friends. But as teenagers, their lives took them in different directions. Keith's father became a legendary prosecutor, determined to 'clean up the Coast.' Hugh's father became the 'Boss' of Biloxi's criminal underground. Keith went to law school and followed in his father's footsteps. Hugh preferred the nightlife and worked in his father's clubs. The two families were headed for a showdown, one that would happen in a courtroom.

Rich with history and with a large cast of unforgettable characters, The Boys from Biloxi is a sweeping saga of two sons of immigrant families who grow up as friends, but ultimately find themselves in a knife-edge legal confrontation in which life itself hangs in the balance.

What Do You Do When Someone Close to You Is Struggling But Won't Seek Help?

I was speaking with a bloke not long ago, Joe, who was feeling really frustrated when trying to help a mate who was avoiding Joe's attempts at support and refusing to seek help, even though he was obviously in some emotional distress. As is often the case Joe felt powerless in this situation and asked how he might better approach things.

So, what do we do when someone close to us, often a friend or family member, won't seek help? How do we manage the sense of obligation we may feel or the emotions that come with this?

First and foremost, we must remind ourselves that we do not carry the responsibility for other people's health and wellbeing, they do! However, in the above situation it is important to try and understand the reasons why some people are less likely to seek help when it is needed. We need to recognise that often when people are in the middle of a tough situation, simply making a decision to admit something is wrong can be a difficult and daunting thing. It can take time for some people to become comfortable enough with their situation to then contemplate the idea of accessing help. For others, negotiating feelings of embarrassment and shame can be quite overwhelming.

I take my hat off to Joe because, like him, we all need to recognise our role as primary carers, that is, everyday people in the community actively supporting and looking out for our mates.

Whilst our intentions can be coming from a good place, trying to get someone to change or seek help can put more of a strain on your friendship/relationship. Alternatively, simply avoiding the issue can foster stronger feelings of isolation and possibly result in the person becoming even more resistant. This can prove difficult when the time comes, and they are ready to reach out but may no longer feel comfortable with the idea of approaching you.

As difficult as these situations can seem, it is important to be there for people who are going through a tough time. You can do this just by letting them know you are available to listen when they need it and help when they do decide to reach out. In the meantime, you could take the opportunity to do a bit of research into what specialised local support options might be available, if required, such as a counsellor, financial/legal support or the GP, so you can be prepared and direct them when they do reach out. We also need to remind ourselves that the ability to listen effectively is one of the most important skills we can possess. Being a good listener can have a big impact on improving our relationships and helping others.

At the end of the day, it's also important to look after yourself. Setting clear boundaries is healthy and is all about understanding our limits. If you are starting to feel overwhelmed, talking to someone yourself can provide a good outlet and perhaps some insights into ways to manage the situation.

Most of the time, giving someone the space they need to arrive at seeking help is a good thing. However, if you do have concerns that someone is at imminent risk or danger to themselves or others, it is important that you act on this and seek professional help immediately. In these circumstances you may be worried about going against a person's wishes, but realistically most of us would rather deal with an angry response than a situation where the person we care about is seriously hurt or in trouble.

CEO Chat

Welcome to the start of a new financial year. Work is well underway towards finalising the budget for the 2023/2024 year. We are working on getting it endorsed by Council at the next Council meeting on 26 July.

We are pleased to advise everyone that the lights at the Lake Grace Ovals have now been adjusted as promised. Thanks to CBH for the use of the cherry picker and Doug Pauley for braving the blustery weather some 30metres up in the air.

We said farewell to Cheryl Chappell on Thursday 29 June as she officially retires on 30 June after nearly 11 years and 2 months with the Shire of Lake Grace.

I attended the live sheep export meeting in Lake Grace on 21st June. There was a good turnout of people and it was made most obvious to the consulting panel that there really wasn't a plan B and that live export should stay. There were some very good arguments put forward for its retention. The main spokesperson on the panel was very impressed with the quality of the arguments put forward and remarked to me afterwards that there was one person there that should be a politician as that is the sort of person needed in government.

The Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Act is still creating headaches and confusion within all parties. I would suggest that everyone interested tries to keep up with updates via the government website.

Highlights from 28 June Council meeting;

- The WA Planning Commission sought comment from the Shire on a property subdivision at North Lake Grace. Council resolved to unconditionally support the proposed subdivision as long as the proponent can clearly demonstrate it will comply with all relevant town planning requirements pertaining to the subdivision of rural land.
- At last month's meeting Council approved the removal of the "Overnight Caravan Parking Not Permitted" sign at the Lake King Rest Stop subject to consultation with affected parties. As a result of the consultation process it was referred again to Council who have now resolved to leave the sign in place.
- Council received a report on the Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Act most of which is still undergoing updates.
- A submission was received from a ratepayer regarding concerns with the proposed sale of Lot 12 Biddy- Camm Rd to CBH. Council considered the submission and after consultation with several parties were satisfied that the areas of concern raised would be dealt with in the development approval process. As such the sale will proceed in due course.
- Finally, due largely to concerns raised by ratepayers during the consultation period recently undertaken whilst updating the Shire Strategic Community Plan Council has taken the steps to give the Doctors in Lake Grace 3 months notice of the termination of their Practice Management Agreement for the operations of the Lake Grace and Newdegate Medical Centre. A survey was sent out several months ago through Australia Post to all householders and mailbox holders within the Shire as well as links to the survey being placed on the Shire social media pages. This was a decision not taken lightly by Council and in no way reflects any doubts as to the ability of the Doctors. We thank them for their services over the past 6 plus years.
- Work is currently underway to replace the doctors who will be finishing up on 31 August.

Community Infrastructure Services

Shire staff and contractors have commenced work on the Newdegate Hockey shed replacement project. This project was made possible by the Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Project funding the Shire received and funding from the Newdegate Hockey Club to fit out the building once complete. This project is expected to be completed prior to the Grand Final.



In the last month or so contractors for the DWER Rural Water Planning team in Albany installed a floating cover on the North Lake Grace underground concrete tank to try and reduce evaporation. DWER is currently in the early procurement stages of getting quotes to supply and install a 250KL steel tank and a high flow solar pump that will connect the underground tank and the steel tank to allow for an easy to use emergency community water supply. The Shire has also been successful in receiving a Community Water Supply grant that will see the installation of a 250KL steel tank and solar pump on the Buniche underground water tank for a future community emergency water supply. (works are currently underway at Buniche at the time this is being written)

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

Fire Control Office Training

Between 20-22 June we hosted an FCO training event at the Newdegate Country Club, delivering 4 courses for each of the participants. Everyone achieved competency in Bushfire Safety Awareness, Firefighting Skills and Machinery Supervision, with some completing the Fire Control Officer's course and the others levelling up their game on liaising with aerial suppression resources with the Ground Controllers course. This represented the first major step in working towards our Shire-adopted Bush Fire Service Training Program. Our Training Program details the training expectations for community members in the different firefighting roles available, from Farm Response to the Chief Bush Fire Control Officer.

The training included classroom theory sessions tailored to the group's experience and concluded with practical drills and assessments of the skills covered. We had the Lake King 4.4 and Newdegate 3.4 fire trucks for the practical which presented a great opportunity to learn more about the capabilities of each truck. We also learnt about the crew safety and protective equipment that our trucks are fitted with, including exterior water sprays to minimise the impact of a burn-over situation. All participants noted good learning opportunities and various gems that they would take away with them. We would also like to give a big shout -out to Mackenzie from Farmyard Pantry for keeping us

Converting a District Plate to a District Optional Plate. LG****

Do you currently display a Lake Grace District plate on your vehicle that is sentimental to you?

Did you know that these plates are ineligible to be remade if one or both are lost or stolen. These plates can now be converted to Optional District plates.

This means you would be able to

- · Have them remade if they are lost or stolen
- The grant of the Certificate of Right to Display and Trade
- The ability to display them on a vehicle, whether it is licensed in the plates holder's name, a third party or an organisation
- The holder of the Certificate may sell that right at any price in the open market

There is no change to the appearance of a District plate once it has been converted but you do have the option to have it remade in either BLACK on WHITE, BLACK on YELLOW or BRAND WA FORMAT. (fee applies)

You do not require any forms and the current fee for conversion is \$175.00



Showerhead Swap Program Saves Millions of Litres



If you're looking for a way to make your meals more vibrant, look no further than your grocery store's produce aisle. There, you'll find a rainbow of fruits and vegetables — from the palest white to the brightest orange to the deepest purple.

Fruits and vegetables get their coloration from phytochemicals, natural bioactive compounds which, in addition to giving many fruits and veggies their eyecatching hues, also promote good health.

In fact, the most vibrantly colored fruits and vegetables are the richest in vitamins, minerals, fiber and antioxidants.

Get your daily dose of fruits and vegetables

According to the food pyramid, you should be eating up to nine servings of vegetables and fruits each day.

Clinical dietitian Jennifer Ventrelle, MS, RD, LDN, recommends filling at least three-quarters of your plates at lunch and dinner with vegetables.

And instead of rich, sugary treats after your meals or for between-meal snacks, use whole fresh fruits to satisfy your sweet tooth.

What do the colors mean?

But which veggies and fruits you eat is as important as how often you eat them. That's because different colors have different health benefits:

• **Red** fruits and vegetables, such as tomatoes, strawberries and red beans, are packed with vitamin C, vitamin A, potassium and antioxidants.

• **Yellow/orange** fruits and vegetables, including carrots, peaches, squash and pineapple, are also loaded with vitamin C, vitamin A and potassium. They can also boost the immune system and enhance vision.

 Mushrooms, bananas, onions and other white fruits and vegetables are good for the heart and help to control cholesterol levels.

• **Green** means lots of heart-protective potassium and vitamin K, which aids the blood clotting process. Green fruits and veggies also help to maintain vision health and strong bones and teeth. Dark green, leafy vegetables have the highest concentration of antioxidants and fiber.

Blue/purple fruits and vegetables, including such favorites as cranberries, purple grapes, raisins and eggplant, boost urinary tract health and memory function and promote healthy aging.

"As often as possible, choose fruits and vegetables that are high in fiber," says Ventrelle. "They will fill you up more, leaving less room for foods that are high in calories and fat."

An added benefit: High-fiber diets have been

associated with decreased risk and recurrence of cancer.

Ventrelle also recommends eating fruits and vegetables that are highest in antioxidants, which boost the body's immune system, protect blood cells from free radicals, promote the growth of healthy cells and may help to lower the risk of stroke.

Fresh is best, but if you do cook vegetables, use a lighter preparation. Don't use a lot of oil, or fry or sauté them. Steaming or grilling is better.

Fruit and veggie do's and don'ts

Here are a few other things to keep in mind when planning your menu:

• Although fruits and vegetables are healthy, they aren't necessarily low in calories. "Avocado is a good type of fat," Ventrelle says, "but one-fourth of an avocado has 100 calories." Raisins and cherries are other examples of fruits that, while healthful, are high in calories. Eat higher-calorie fruits and veggies in moderation.

Go light on the starchy vegetables. If you choose sweet potatoes as a side dish, use that as your starch even though it's technically a vegetable. Don't have sweet potatoes and corn, which is also a starch. Pick some other veggie that's higher in fiber.

Veggie preparation matters. "Fresh is best, but if you do cook vegetables, use a lighter preparation," Ventrelle says. "Don't use a lot of oil, or fry or sauté them. Steaming or grilling is better." And be aware that if you boil vegetables, you lose a lot of the health benefits. The nutrients leach out. So when you pour out the water, you're also pouring out the nutrients.

Don't drown fruits and veggies in heavy sauces, dips or toppings, especially if you're watching your weight. Try sprinkling apple slices with cinnamon instead of smothering them with peanut butter or caramel. And dunk those carrot sticks in fat-free yogurt instead of ranch dip. If you must have sauces or dips, look for lighter recipes or limit the amount you eat to a few tablespoons.

Eat with the seasons. Choose fresh fruits and vegetables that are "in season" to ensure you're eating a good variety of colors throughout the year. For instance, add squashes, root vegetables and different

types of apples to your fall menu.

If you can't get fresh fruits and veggies, frozen ٠ is fine. Avoid eating a lot of canned vegetables, because they tend to have more sodium. And choose canned fruit that's packed in water or natural juice, not sugary syrup.

If you like dried fruits, eat them in

moderation. They tend to have a higher concentration of calories and sugar than their fresh counterparts. A serving size of dried fruit should be no more than onefourth of a cup.

If you're counting calories, buy smaller pieces of fruit. Large bananas can be almost 200 calories, so pick smaller ones. Apples, nectarines, peaches and other round fruits should be roughly the size of a tennis ball. For bite-sized fruits, such as grapes and cherries, one serving equals approximately 17 pieces.

With so many vegetables and fruits to choose from, and with so many ways to enjoy them, you'll find it's easy to create a "colorful" diet that's satisfying, nutritious and delicious.

The Coolgardie safe, Australia's first form of crude refrigeration, was invented by a mining contractor working the Coolgardie Goldfields in Western Australia in the early 1890s. He had noticed a wet bag kept his bottles cooler.

After some experimentation he made a wire box with hessian walls, sat it in water and placed on a verandah so that any breeze would evaporate the water in the hessian thus, through the process of evaporation, cool the air inside the box thus preserving its contents.

Coolgardie was 150 miles from the nearest general store and fresh food was literally at a premium. It was not only hard to get and expensive to purchase it deteriorated rapidly in the desert heat.

While the safe was an instant success it's development was impeded by the lack of water in the harsh dry deserts of Australia's interior.

This was resolved by using condensed salt water. There were so many safes being used in Coolgardie that by the turn of the century eight different companies were supplying condensed salt water to the region.

It wasn't long before the success of the Coolgardie safe spread and it was being used, in many variations, all

over the country. Some were professionally made and others home made out of whatever materials were available; old wooden boxes, used metal, hession bags and fencing wire.

The legs of the box not only improved airflow but when placed in a bowl of water drowned any marauding ants or other insects trying to get to the food.

This great example of a Coolgardie Safe is on display in the WA Museum Boola Bardip.


