Staying in Place

Earlier this year Pingelly CRC and Pingelly Somerset Alliance hosted a 'Staying in Place Expo', tackling the subject of being able to keep people in their own homes as they age. Sponsored by Mable, InCasa and the Shire of Pingelly it focused on a care package recently started in Pingelly that is managed and staffed locally.

Project Office for Pingelly's 'Staying in Place', Helen Morton, is undertaking a roadtrip on Thursday 27th July and will be at the Lake Grace CRC from midday to 1:30pm to talk about what has been happening not just in Pingelly but in 19 other rural or remote communities across Australia.

Staying in Place is making it possible for older people to say living in their own home, in their own small rural and remote community until end of life – if possible. It is about local people delivering local services funded by home care packages.

With this 'locals supporting locals' approach, this model can deliver employment and economic opportunities with funds coming into and staying in the community; it also delivers social and health benefits.

Home Care Packages are structured from Levels 1 through to Level 4, determined by the needs of the

individual. Currently the Lake Grace Hospital delivers Level 1 and 2; this new initiative would expand on that. Something that the Hospital would love to see happen.

Can you see a community managed home care service being good for the future of Lake Grace? Can you see yourself as a potential provider or contractor? Would you consider using the service as a package holder?

Please come along and listen to what Helen has to say about Pingelly's experience. After only eight months they now have 37 clients with the full value of the Commonwealth funds via the client's home care packages bringing \$1.3M into their community annually.



Wildlife Corridors in the Wheatbelt

Native vegetation in the Western Australian wheatbelt now persists mostly in small areas that remained uncleared for various reasons.

On their own, most of these remnant areas are difficult to manage, and too small to retain viable populations of many of the birds and other animals found in the wheatbelt. These patches of vegetation can be linked by wildlife corridors, which may increase the ability of the wildlife to move about and persist in the area.

A delicate balance

Without some action now, many species are liable to disappear. The main loss would be of our natural heritage. Every region would become a little poorer each time another species became extinct.

There are also other considerations, with more direct economic importance. Scientists and the community alike know little about the role of insect-eating birds, for example, in controlling agricultural pests and diseases. We do know, however, that the loss of insect-eating birds in New South Wales has resulted in an increase in problem insect pests that cause dieback in trees. The problems of insect pests damaging planted trees are well known in Western Australia.

The crux of the problem is to conserve what remains of our native vegetation and fauna in the wheatbelt. We need to manage the vegetation properly, and to create and maintain connections - or wildlife corridors between these remnant areas, which allow birds, and possibly other animals, to move from remnant to remnant.

Animals often depend on a variety of vegetation types for food and shelter and need to be able to move between them. Birds that feed on insects and nectar



need to move between different patches to find plants that flower at different times of the year. Some honeyeaters may fly many kilometres to reach small patches of banksias that are in flower when little else is.

Singing honeyeaters and willy wagtails can travel easily across open paddocks. Western yellow robins and some thornbills depend more on native vegetation and will only move within it.

Wide is best

The corridors between areas of remnant vegetation are therefore highly important. Today, these corridors are found mostly along roadsides and fencelines, and vary greatly in their usefulness to fauna. Wide road verges with vegetation in good condition support more species that depend on remnant vegetation than narrow verges with only a sparse vegetation cover.

Local shires have an important role in maintaining road verges in good condition. Safety to road users is a primary concern, but beyond that, management should involve as little disturbance to the verge as possible. Disturbance of the native vegetation canopy invariably leads to weed invasion, which in turn means costly management problems.

The best solution for wildlife and weed control is to leave the vegetation, especially the shrub layer, intact, and to avoid scraping away more of the vegetation each time a road is graded.

The existing set of linkages between remnant areas is, in most districts, incomplete. There is great scope for adding to the 'corridor network' by joining isolated areas of remnant vegetation.

Creation of wildlife corridors need not be a separate operation from other revegetation programmes. Careful design of revegetation for shelterbelts or for waterlogging and salinity control can mean that these tree belts will be beneficial to wildlife. Revegetation along creeklines can often join up remnant areas, as can the location of treed shelterbelts.

Guidelines

Existing guidelines for revegetation for wildlife corridors are only generalisations, because we do not know enough about how animals and birds use these corridors. However, here are a few guiding principles.

• The wider the vegetation corridor the better it is for encouraging the movement of animals and birds. Increasing a windbreak from three to five rows of trees and shrubs would be beneficial.

Wildlife Corridors in the Wheatbelt (cont.)

• It is best to join up remnant areas that are still in somewhat good condition and fairly large, for example 50 ha or more, unless there are important small areas such as patches of banksia.

• It is probably more effective to join up areas of remnant vegetation that are close together (for instance less than a kilometre apart) than those further apart.

• When revegetating land, trees alone are not enough; a mixture of shrub species should be used. Shrub species are often just as effective at helping to lower water-tables as are trees. They fill the gaps that form in shelterbelts as the trees grow taller. Shrubs also provide food and shelter for many birds.

• Corridors frequently cross many different soil types. Species used for revegetation should be chosen to suit the different soil types. The vegetation present in different localities gives an idea of which species will be suitable, and can also provide a useful source of seed.

Farmers creating wildlife corridors have been a great tool in the resurgence of the numbat population.

Gardening Tips

Topic this month: Pruning

Tips for pruning

Choose the right tool for the job.

Always use clean and sharp tools. Make sure you have the right size tool for the size of branch you are pruning, this is so you avoid damaging the plant and tool. Its best to use a pruning saw on branches that are 4-6cm thick. Smaller pruners are best on smaller branches.

Choose the right time.

There's no real 'best time' for pruning but it is suggested that late winter is ideal because trees and shrubs are dormant and its easier to see what to prune. It also promotes fast and healthy regrowth for spring. Summer is the right time to remove dead branches, that's when they stand out.

Branches that are dead, damaged or diseased can be pruned straight away.

Make the right cuts.

Hold the upper cutting blade closer to the trunk (or main branch) for clean cut without tearing any bark away. Avoid leaving a stub, this is a potential starting point for pests and diseases.

Be safe when pruning.

- Make sure you have safely dressed. Long shirts and pants, gloves, safety glasses and enclosed shoes
- A nice wide brimmed hat for sun safety. (make sure you can still see where you are pruning)
- Keep tools sharp and clean
- Choose a nice clear, dry day for pruning

Tools for pruning.

A good quality pair of secateurs is important. A tip for not losing your tools in the garden, wrap some bright and colourful tape around the handles. Makes them easier to find in dirt or leaves. Keep your blades sharp and well oiled for prolonged use. Don't forget to get some strong gloves for when your pruning your rose bushes!

Benefits of pruning.

- Preservation of the plant
- Encourage growth
- Thin out a canopy to allow a breeze or air movement through the branches
- To form plants into special shapes
- Encourage branching

Pruning aftercare.

After pruning, most plants would benefit from a good feed from a soil improver and plant fertiliser. Helps

encourage better root growth, stronger plants and better fruit and flowers as it releases nutrients slowly and improves the structure and retention of the soil.

As human beings, we are pretty blessed to be able to select the foods we consume. With plant-based diets on the rise, there has been an ever-growing development of titles that cater for certain diets – and understandably, this can be quite confusing at times!

Vegan

Being vegan, or plant-based, means you don't consume ANY meats or products that come from animals – this includes fish! Vegetarians do not consume meat or fish. They still however eat dairy products, eggs and honey!

Pescatarian

Pescatarians are like vegetarians, except they DO eat fish. Hence, they essentially don't eat meat from land-animals.

Paleotarian

More commonly known as a Paleo diet, this consists of fresh fruits, vegetables and lean meats only. They do not consume gluten, grains, legumes, dairy, starchy vegetables (like potatoes), excessive carbs and processed foods.

Ketogenic

The Keto lifestyle is essentially known as the "low carb" diet, which aims to cut back the calories from sugar, soft drinks, pastries and white bread. The idea is to consume 20-50g of carbs per day, and obtain protein from wholesome products such as seafood, non-starchy vegetables (like kale & broccoli), cheese, avocados, lean meats & poultry!

Flexitarian

A flexitarian diet encourages a plant-based diet, however, it permits you to eat animal products (like meat, eggs and dairy) in moderation. It's pretty much the 'flexible' version of a vegetarian or vegan diet.

Fruitarian

This one is pretty self explanatory – it's a diet where people only eat fruit. However, some fruitarians consume seeds (and occasional nuts) to get that extra protein.

Macrobiotic

According to Medical author Melissa Conrad Stoppler, "macrobiotic diets combine the concepts of Buddhist spirituality and certain dietary principles with the goal of balancing spiritual and physical wellness. Macrobiotic diets aim to avoid the "toxins" that come from eating dairy products, meats, and oily foods. A macrobiotic <u>diet</u> consists largely of whole grains, cereals, and cooked vegetables."

Stoppler also states that "A macrobiotic diet also recommends consumption of locally-grown produce and avoidance of fruits that do not grow locally, such as bananas, pineapples and other tropical fruits."

Beegan

It's actually the exact same as veganism, except you are allowed to eat honey! This was allegedly derived from a movement to promote beekeepers (because roughly 33% of food we consume relies on the pollination process!).

Raw Foodie


The raw food diet (aka raw foodism & raw veganism) is a diet whereby consumers eat mostly, or completely raw and unprocessed foods. Like veganism, the raw food diet is generally plant-based; consisting of fruits, vegetables, <u>nuts</u> and seeds. Some people also consume raw eggs, dairy, raw fish and sometimes raw meat!



A Thousand Miles of Nothing—Part One

This remarkable account is based on the papers of Eileen Lanagan and takes place in 1940 on the Canning Stock Route. We acknowledge that the route has a difficult past and was the scene for a series of dangerous and tragic confrontations between Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal people. We pay our respects to the traditional owners whose life, lore (law) and ecology was impacted by this droving road.

I was the pivot of many curious dark eyes as I made my tour of Billiluna Station in 1940. Very few white women had ever been seen out there.

The homestead was one-roomed and made of desert oak logs. It had no windows and the closest neighbour was 140 miles away. For many years it had been home to a solitary white man, Dick Rowan, who had left it only to die.

My husband George (the Boss) had been a drover most of his life and one of only four that could be trusted with cattle on the Canning Stock Route. We had been married only a year and I had pleaded to come with him on the thousand-mile ride from Billiluna to Carnegie Station.

There were fifteen of us all told, riding together down that long invisible road through nowhere with a mob of 800 cattle. Riding right out of my little world.

Among us were East Kimberley lads - Captain, Koonari, Baroo, Chinaman, Slippery, Skipper, Mick, Brophy, and Wypoo. All tall and lithe, they were fine horsemen and well-dressed in the moleskin trousers, elastic-sided boots, and Bluey overcoats provided.

We had 56 horses and 12 camels to carry us through. Ten of the camels were loaded with stores and two running spare. The stores were our life for four months and included such things as apricots, Worcester sauce, and honey. As well as matches, hats, pipes, and a general muster of sundry needs.

In the medicine chest were only iodine, Flavine,

bandages, spirits of nitre, and Condy's crystals. We trusted in God and good luck that no accidents would happen.

We didn't have, nor needed a map. Heaven help the stranger who tries to cross the Canning by a map. It is a track for only the toughest bush drovers with first-hand knowledge of those wind blown wastes and mazes of high sand hills.

There were 52 wells along our route and unless you knew where they were, you'd never find them. My husband spent twenty years learning the Canning.

Travelling on Billiluna station country with the manager, George Williams, the flies were dreadful. There is a waterhole on Billiluna that the Aboriginal people say all the flies in the world come from, and I believe them.

My husband gave me Nully to ride, a homely and hardy stock horse who carried me fairly and faithfully all the way over the sand hills and spinifex.

We reached Billiluna Pool, a beautiful permanent water pool and the scene of night long dancing and campfires during corroboree time.

Then, eleven miles on in the Never Never, we yarned under the stars in a cathedral of gum trees. Interrupted only by the occasional lowing of the bullocks and the chime of a camel bell.

The next night we were on the rim of Gregory's Salt Sea, a vast and melancholy salt lake. We brought out our little short-wave radio and listened to oriental jazz from the Philippines.

The mob took form and on we went at a patient pace. Captain riding ahead, the Boss behind, the ringers on wing and flank. Resting only to feed and sleep at night. Feeling the stiffness from long riding, I was thankful at night for the light mattress in my swag.

For the cost of a bag of flour, my husband had bought



me a blue heeler pup, Tim, for company. He was my shadow day and night. With one ear cocked, he also gave a splendid 24-hour service as a watchman, never soundly sleeping - but nobody ever sleeps soundly on the Canning.

At the edge of Billiluna station, George Williams made his final count of the cattle and the Boss signed papers and took formal delivery. Then after a last friendly billy of tea and a handshake, George and his boys left us to the silence.

We were out on the Canning in dead earnest, and for the next four months this quiet world was ours.

There was a grave at the next well - No. 49 - a mound of red earth with a post and rail to guard it from the cattle. Jack Smith had died in my husband's droving camp the year before. He had been ill when he started and did not get far.

It was the first grave of many we would see. The lonely dead of the Australian bush are not good company. They are too life-like when there is nothing else human in the scene.

The Myalls (Aboriginal people living in the traditional way) followed us from No. 50 well. It was remarkable to see how swiftly they could cross a landscape, walking. One little girl of five or so, wearing only a loin cloth, paced it out in the cold wind, keeping well up with the others.

The men strode along carrying only spears. The women were laden with big bundles of odds and ends balanced on their heads, some with a baby or two clinging to them. One very old blind woman they led on the end of a spear.

We gave them bread and jam, and when we camped at sundown they laughed shrilly at our singing box, and were most attentive and intelligent in their musical appreciation.

The next morning Baroo, one of our best ringers, was thrown from his horse. He split his head and injured his ribs, both of which I well and tightly bandaged. But the patient was very sorry for himself until a traditional healer of the Myalls came over and offered to attend him. After that he got decidedly better.

Seven miles on and the Boss presented me with my first revolver and instructions on how and when to use it if necessary. I certainly hoped there would be no need.

"Daisy, my yellow Labrador Retriever, has a nose for finding discs," Mason said. "We will be walking through the park and her nose will go up. She can smell 'em and she just goes off. She could go off 30 yards through the multiflora, the high weeds. And here she comes with a disc."

Since she found her first disc about three years ago, Daisy has retrieved 155 of them with no plans of stopping anytime soon.

The park recently teamed up with Mason to create a program called "Daisy's Discs".

"Normally when park staff find them or when our park guests find them, all of them are turned into the barn area", says Ben Bolock, the assistant general manager at Grand Vue Park. "Some discs that have names on them, we call them, and people are able to come and pick them up. During that time, they can make a donation to Daisy's Discs and that money will fund the Marshall County Animal Rescue League. If discs are found and there's no name on them and we've had for a long period of time, and nobody has claimed them, the park will sell them for a very low amount and that money will go back into the disc golf course."

Two paramedics in Wauchope, Australia, went above and beyond their call of duty to fulfill the last wish of a palliative care patient.

Korean Businessman Gives \$70,000 To Each Household In His Hometown

A Korean businessman has gifted over \$70,000 to every household in his hometown of Unpyeong-ri, a village in South Jeolla.

Lee Joong-keun, the 82-year-old founder of property developer Booyoung Group, said he wanted to express his 'thanks to the support of villagers'.

All 280 households in Unpyeong-ri were wired cash, ranging from a minimum 26 million won to a maximum 90.2 million won after tax deduction. The amount varied depending on the number of years the householders resided in the village.

"The chairman didn't intend for this to be publicly disclosed. His sole purpose was to express gratitude to those who have preserved his hometown throughout the years", said Booyoung Group. Lee also donated gifts, books and other items worth a total 240 billion won to his hometown.

The Booyoung chairman came from humble beginnings. He was born in 1941 to a poor family in Unpyeong-ri. He eventually moved to Seoul and dropped out of Konkuk University due to financial difficulties.

In 1972, he founded the Woojin Construction Co. and in 1976 Samjin Engineering, which eventually became today's Booyoung Group.

Today, he has a net worth of nearly 20 trillion won.

Please Note: There is no kerbside recycling collection service in Lake King or Varley.

The recycling bins are collected by Warren Blackwood Waste and transported to a recycling facility. If items which are not recyclable are found the content can't be recycled and the load will be directed to the landfill.

If an item is covered in food, it is not recyclable. Food is one of the worst contaminators in the recycling process. By using the yellow top recycling bin correctly you are contributing, in a combined community effort, to reduce the amount of rubbish that is directed to landfill facilities each year.

FLEET LICENSING

Did you know that if you or your company have 10 or more vehicles you can have them added to a Fleet Schedule which will allow you to have a common expiry date for all their renewals.

You will receive 1 renewal notice for all the vehicles and still have the option to pay for 3, 6, or 12 months registration.

To apply, you will need to complete an Application for Fleet Licensing (E72) form. This requires you to nominate your preferred common expiry date and to list all the vehicles you wish to be on the schedule. This will need to be sent to the Fleet Licensing Team—*fleetlicensing@transport.wa.gov.au*

Once your application has been processed you will be sent a letter advising you of your fleet licensing code, as well as individual tax invoices for vehicles that need to be re-aligned to the common expiry date.

Fleet management is accessible through the DoTDirect online portal and has a number of features including: -

- Automatic email reminders of fleet schedules due for renewal
- Adjust eligible vehicle expiry date to that of the common fleet expiry date
- Remove and add vehicles
- Re-print outstanding fleet schedules

More information can be found on the Department of Transport website-Fleet Licensing.

ANNUAL LICENCE EXPIRY DATE (Common Expiry Date).

Alternatively, if you have 3—9 vehicles in your name you can apply for a common licence expiry date. This differs from Fleet Licensing as renewals are still sent individually.

You do not need to make a formal application, instead when the vehicle becomes due for renewal simply attend a DVS centre or regional agent and request to licence to the date of your choice. Once all of the vehicles are brought into line with this date you will continue to receive vehicle licence renewals six weeks prior to the expiry date.

Tourists Galore (cont.)

You would be forgiven for thinking that most of our visitors would be in the over 65 bracket, however 37% of those recorded were in the 46-65 age group. Surprisingly (for me anyway), 15% were under 18, 16% were 31-45, 24% were over 65 and 8% were in the 18-30 year age group.

There was a very even spread of visiting days (ranging from 11% to 17%), the most popular day being Thursday. Fifty percent of travellers are moving by car (staying in accommodation) while 42% are towing their caravan or camper.

Over the last eight years there has been a steady growth in visitor numbers to the Shire of Lake Grace annually, this year we have topped every record since opening (over 3,500 through the doors). This is an economic boost to our region as these visitors spend money; whether it be on food, fuel, accommodation or gifts and other items that remind them of their visit to Lake Grace.

Opening weekends and adding a casual staff member has proven to be beneficial. Having the centre open along with cafes, IGA and Hotel has provided a very welcoming atmosphere to the town. Feedback is incredibly positive from our visitors; as they comment on the warm welcome that they receive from the locals, the great array of businesses and facilities as well as how neat and tidy everything is.

Don't think the Visitor Centre isn't for the locals, they have some excellent giftware and can fill you in on some local attractions that you can keep in mind when you have family or friends visiting.

The Visitor Centre shall reassess extending opening hours according to demand on the weekends when the wildflower season begins. If you haven't dropped into the centre please do so; hours are 9-5 during the week and 9-1 on the weekend.



First LACHs Appointed Under New ACH Laws

Three Native Title organisations have been appointed as a Local Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Service – or LACHS – under the State's new *Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Act 2021*.

The first three LACHS were approved by the Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Council and will now take on a regulatory role to protect and advise on Aboriginal cultural heritage and help negotiate and facilitate agreement-making on land-use proposals.

Aboriginal Affairs Minister Dr Tony Buti outlined the appointment of the LACHS at the opening of the first meeting of the implementation group – a team of key stakeholders who will share information on common and emerging issues, and solutions with the Department of Planning, Lands and Heritage in the first six months of operation of the new Act and Regulations.

Dr Buti welcomed the three initial LACHS and acknowledged the important role each organisation will play within their respective native tile areas.

The three LACHS include:

- Yindjibarndi Ngurra Aboriginal Corporation has a strong history of collaboration with land users, including negotiating and developing heritage management plans, and will be the 'go-to' organisation for Aboriginal cultural heritage matters relating to the land and waters of the Pilbara region that fall within their determination area.
- Karajarri Traditional Lands Association will provide a LACHS role for Karajarri Country, which extends from Eighty Mile Beach to just south of Broome's Roebuck Bay, including some 32,000kms of land and waterways. The Association has extensive experience working with pastoralists, mining companies and Government agencies to protect and manage cultural sites in the area, undertake surveys and negotiate economic opportunities for the Karajarri people.
- The third organisation, which recently commenced Sorry Business following the passing of a significant elder, is also based in the Pilbara region and has extensive experience advising and negotiating on Aboriginal cultural heritage matters.

Each organisation will receive a \$200,000 grant to build capacity, recruit or upskill staff – part of a \$87 million State budget commitment to Aboriginal cultural heritage.

They will also receive up to \$300,000 each year to help meet the anticipated service level requirements from proponents, Traditional Owners, Aboriginal communities and other individuals.

While the LACHS are being established, or where there is no LACHS in place, the new Act guides proponents to engage the relevant native title group, which will be the relevant prescribed body corporate, registered claimants or native title representative bodies such as the relevant land council– just as they have done for many years. The Department is well equipped to help proponents identify the relevant native title group if necessary.

Australian Aboriginal culture is one of the world's oldest continuing cultures dating back at least 60,000 years. Cultural heritage is central to the health and vitality of Aboriginal communities – it provides an essential link to their past, present and future, and it must be appropriately recognised, managed and protected.
