- Well COVID finally caught up with me, it's never good timing when you get sick but Kayleigh certainly had to get her skates on and tackle the Lakes Link plus any other work coming on her own. Well done Kayleigh you well and truly had everything under control.
- It's full steam ahead with workshops with our Forklift happening next Monday; we currently have 13 taking part in this. Although private trainers may be more expensive there's certainly a lot less paper work. Coming up in September we have the following:
 - Auschem 2 day workshop—Tuesday 12th and Wednesday 13th September. Yes it is a two day workshop with a maximum limit of 12 to do it. We have 35 on the books so it will be first in best dressed. There will be another two of these workshops happening in 2024 but we do need to fill this one.

- We have also booked an accredited First Aid workshop with St John for Friday 6th October. This workshop is for youth (16-18) and will come under the banner of Lake Grace Roadwise. We will be looking for funding to cover the costs of this workshop to keep any costs to a minimum (preferably free). Lake Grace Roadwise is keen to give youth the skills and confidence to act if they are involved in or come across an accident. We are currently taking expressions of interest.

Like flies to the honeypot plant lovers descended upon the Natural Resource Management free native plant giveaway that was held at the front of the IGA on 3rd August. Having just recorded 30mm of rainfall the night before it was an ideal opportunity to plant a few trees or shrubs.

Kate and Alex from the Northam NRM office barely had time to get their display out before the

customers were lining up. You could peruse the plants if you knew your stuff or you could go through the short biographies they had on each specimen so that you could determine whether or not the tree or shrub was right for the position you had in mind.

There was something for everyone; trees for on farms or larger blocks as well as shrubs and ground covers for those smaller areas. Fingers crossed that I've picked a neglected enough area of the yard for my leschenaultia to thrive.

Astrophotography Competition Opportunity

Entries to the 2023 Astrofest Astrophotography Exhibition have opened and will culminate with an Awards ceremony at the popular Astrofest event to be held in Perth on 18th November.

All West Australians interested in photographing the night sky are encouraged to participate in this fantastic event irrespective of skill or experience level. There are awards for mobile phone images, nightscapes, deep sky and many more.

The 2023 exhibition will include a special award for the Best Exmouth Solar Eclipse Photograph. The total solar eclipse witnessed by thousands of people in Exmouth in April 2023 inspired many photographers and this award has been added to capture the awe-inspiring moment.

WA has also experienced some extraordinary Aurora Australis activity over recent months. To recognise photographers who chase these phenomenal events, the Best Aurora Australis Photograph is a new Award for this year's exhibition.

The Astrofest Astrophotography Exhibition is a showcase of Western Australian astrophotography talent, with the finalist selection whittled down from a large pool of entries. It's the 14th year of the exhibition with hundreds of entries expected. Sponsors of the 2023 competition include Sony, Camera Electronic, BinoCentral, Shire of Perenjori and Shire of Upper Gascoyne. The prize pool is worth over \$9,000 dollars.

Astrofest is WA's largest astronomy event and has attracted approximately 4,000 people every year since the inaugural festival in 2009.

Ravensthorpe Wildflower Show



Bushcare Project

The Bushcare project continues to move forward, albeit at times slowly. We received another extension for the project and it will be finalized by the end of the year.

Trees that were planted at five sites in July last year are coming into their own; although there has been the expected losses there are a good number thriving and poking their heads above the tree guards. A fortnightly watering over the summer months and another damp winter has stood them in good stead.

Guards and stakes from trees that have died have been removed from most of the sites. It is disappointing that some of the stakes have been kicked over and broken but incredibly disheartening to see a self sown gum of three to four feet was uprooted at the South Rd-Griffin Street site. It would have taken years for the tree to get to that size.

Following our community workshop this Friday we have to finalise signage for the Tree Walk, create a brochure and establish a planting guide.

This project has been a joint initiative of the Lake Grace LCDC, Lake Grace CRC and the Shire of Lake Grace. Funding was provided by NRM with in kind support from the LCDC volunteers, CRC and also the Shire.

Who doesn't love a good tree? This is a book that has over 300 pages dedicated to the trees of our region.





Beginners Guide to Indoor Plants

There are many fantastic benefits that come with having plants in your home. Lush and leafy, or beautiful flowering plants help soften the hard lines of furniture. They add decorative pizzazz to any room, particularly when teamed with a gorgeous pot or hanger. Growing plants indoors means that even with no outdoor space, you can still enjoy gardening, at any time of the day or night.

Indoor gardening is also good for you, helping reduce stress and promote positivity. Plus, the combination of plants and potting mix also helps to filter toxins from the air. Indoor plants are a powerhouse of perks!

To help beginners on their indoor plant-growing journey, here's a list of easy-to-follow tips. From which plants to choose and what to grow where, to pots, potting mixes and how to care for your plants. Let's get growing!

How to Choose an Indoor Plant That's Right for You

Easy-to-Grow Indoor Plants

For beginners, it's best to start with plants that are hardy and don't require too much maintenance. Once your indoor plant care skills improve and your confidence grows, you can look at different plants. Here are some hardy and low-maintenance plants to try: Arrowhead Plant (Syngonium podophyllum), Devil's Ivy (Epipremnum aureum), Jade Plant (Crassula ovata), Mother-in-Law's Tongue (Dracaena trifasciata syn. Sansevieria trifasciata), Peace Lily (Spathiphyllum wallisii), and Spider Plant (Chlorophytum comosum).

Indoor Plants for Low Light

Most indoor plants will do best in a room with bright but indirect light. However, some hardy plants will tolerate lower amounts of light, including: Cast Iron Plant (Aspidistra elatior), Devil's Ivy (Epipremnum aureum), Mother-in-Law's Tongue (Dracaena trifasciata), and ZZ Plant (Zamioculcas zamiifolia)

Unless you install artificial lighting, there are no plants that can grow in rooms without sunlight.

Indoor Plants for Humid Rooms

Humid rooms such as a steamy bathroom, laundry or kitchen are ideal places for plants that are native to humid tropical forests. Here are some plants that will enjoy living in your bathroom: Moth Orchid (Phalaenopsis spp.), Peace Lily (Spathiphyllum wallisii), Parlour Palm (Chamaedora elegans), and Flamingo Flower (Anthurium scherzerianum).

Indoor Plants for Shelves & Hanging Baskets

Plants with trailing stems look wonderful when positioned on shelves or grown in a hanging basket. Their stems can cascade down or be trained horizontally across a wall. Plants with trailing stems include: Devil's Ivy (Epipremnum aureum), Mistletoe Cactus (Rhipsalis baccifera), Hoya (Hoya spp.), and Chain of Hearts (Ceropegia woodii).

Indoor Plant for Small Spaces

Small plants are ideal for desktops, coffee tables and shelves. The following plants don't take up much room and are great plants for beginners: Zebra Cactus (Haworthia fasciata), Chinese Money Plant (Pilea peperomiodes), Air Plants (Tillandsia spp.), and Baby Rubber Plants (Peperomia obtusifolia).

Indoor Plants Unsafe for Pets & Children

Some indoor plants may pose a risk to pets and children, including from contact with plant sap or ingestion. The following are a few common examples of potentially toxic indoor plants: Dumb Cane (Dieffenbachia spp.), Fiddle Leaf Fig (Ficus lyrata), Peace Lily (Spathiphyllum wallisii), Mother-in-Law's Tongue (Dracaena trifasciata), and Swiss Cheese Plant (Monstera deliciosa).

So watch your kids and pets around these plants if you have them.

Choosing a Pot for Your Indoor Plant

Once you have chosen an indoor plant, match the size of the plant with a new pot. The new pot should be a few centimetres larger in diameter than the plant's existing pot. Also match the height of the plant with the new pot. A tall plant in a shallow pot can easily topple over. A rough guide to follow is the pot should make up about one-third of the total plant plus pot height.

It's important that your pot has drainage holes. Pots without drainage holes are very difficult to manage and it's easy to drown your plant. For decorative pots that don't have drainage holes, sit a slightly smaller plastic pot with drainage holes inside.

How to Water Indoor Plants

Two of the biggest culprits for indoor plant death are underwatering and overwatering. Underwatering leads to plants wilting and leaves dying. Whereas overwatering results in yellowing and dying leaves, and Root Rot. In either case, prolonged dryness or wetness can be fatal.

There is no one rule when it comes to watering indoor plants. Different plants require different levels of moisture. The plant tag should provide some information on whether it needs consistent moisture (for example, Maidenhair Ferns) or prefers to dry out in between watering (like ZZ Plants).

To check the moisture level in the potting mix, dig your finger into the top few centimetres of mix. You'll be able to feel if it's dry or moist.

Indoor plants can be gently watered from above with a

watering can with a narrow spout. Apply the water directly over the potting mix. Alternatively, for plants in pots with drainage holes, the pot can be 'dunked' in a bucket or sink of water. The water level should be around two-thirds the height of the pot. Leave the pot in the water for 15 minutes and water will soak up into the potting mix through the drainage holes. After dunking, leave the pot to drain before placing it back on its saucer or inside its decorative pot.

To avoid overwatering, do not leave water in plant saucers. For plain plastic pots that sit inside a hole-free decorative pot, do not allow water to collect in the base.

Common Problems of Indoor Plants

Just like outdoor plants, indoor plants can be affected by a range of pests and diseases or become unhealthy due to incorrect care. Here are some of the most common problems that you might encounter...

• Why Are My Indoor Plant Leaves Going Yellow?

Two of the main causes of yellowing leaves are watering and lack of nutrients. Check the moisture levels in the potting mix and ensure plants are fed regularly.

Why Are My Indoor Plant Leaves Going Brown?

Brown leaf tips can be caused by overwatering, lack of humidity (for plants native to tropical areas) or being burnt by direct light. Check moisture levels in the potting mix, during hot and dry weather mist humidity-loving plants with water and move plants away from direct sunlight.

• Why is My Indoor Plant Wilting & Droopy?

Confusingly, wilting can be due to over or under watering. Check moisture levels in the potting mix and either reduce or increase watering to suit the plant's moisture preference.

• Why Aren't My Indoor Plants Growing?

Lack of nutrients can lead to poor or slow growth. Feed indoor plants every two months from spring to autumn.

Plants that have been in the same pot for an extended period may also have run out of room and nutrients. Repot into a slightly larger pot to help promote new growth.

Why Aren't My Indoor Plants Flowering?

Flowering indoor plants such as Hoyas, Peace Lilies and Orchids may not flower if lacking in nutrients and/or not receiving enough sunlight. Move plants to a brighter position but still out of direct sunlight and feed regularly.

Common Pests of Indoor Plants

Common pests of indoor plants include Aphids, Mites, Mealybugs and Scale. You may notice the pests themselves, or leaves starting to discolour and plant health suffering. Regularly check your plants for signs of pests and as soon as Aphids, Mites, or Mealybugs appear use a plant insecticide spray to stop them.

Crime News

We have been busy assisting our neighbouring stations over the past fortnight with a mixed bag of jobs, including a welfare check out in Dunn Rock, and a drunken male causing no end of dramas in Corrigin, thankfully he decided to go to sleep on a park bench and caught the next available bus out of town.

We've had reports of people in our area being targeted by romance scams recently. You may not be aware, but this sort of activity has been going on for years and can be devastating emotionally and financially.

We thought we'd explain a little bit about this type of scam and what to look out for, not just yourselves but also friends and family.

In short, a scammer uses dating or friendship to win your trust and get your money.

Never assume a person that you've only met online is who they say they are. Scammers go to great lengths to

convince you the relationship is real and manipulate you to give them money. Romance scammers will leave you broke and broken-hearted.

Scammers will find you on social media, dating or gaming apps and websites. They might also text or email you. They hide behind fake profiles and identities, sometimes of famous people. They're really good at making you feel special, so you believe the relationship is real.

Once you trust them, they have an 'emergency' and ask you to give them products or money to help them. Or they ask you to do things for them, like set up accounts or transfer money they give you. Scammers can wait years to build this trust.

Warning signs it might be a scam:-

They express strong feelings quickly and the relationship moves fast. You are made to feel special quickly.

If you are chatting on your usual social media platform or an official dating service, they will quickly try and move the conversation offsite, for example to WhatsApp.

Romance scammers will encourage secrecy and will influence you to only trust them. They may try to isolate you from your family and friends.

There will always be an excuse why they can't meet in person or show themselves on camera. They say they live overseas or somewhere remote, or their technology isn't working.

Other things to look for:-

Their online profile doesn't match what they tell you about themselves.

They talk about money or investments. They might say they know about cryptocurrency and offer to teach you.

You are asked for personal photos, videos or information they could use against you in the future.

The scammer gets desperate or angry if you don't do what they ask. They may threaten to cut off the relationship.

Steps you can take to protect yourself:-

Never send or transfer money to someone you haven't met

If your online connection asks you for money, they are likely a scammer. Stop contact right away and seek support.

Don't send money, card or bank details or important identity documents like your passport to someone you've only met online: No matter how long you've been messaging them.

Never agree to transfer money for someone else. It's called money laundering and being involved is a criminal offence.

Check the person is who they say they are.

Take things slowly. Ask lots of questions and watch for things that don't add up.

Search for the scammer's name along with the word

'scam' in a search, and look for websites about romance scams in the results.

Be careful what you share (and what you don't)

Never send intimate pictures or videos of yourself to people you don't know. Scammers use these to blackmail people.

Don't keep your online relationship a secret. Speak to people you know about it. It can be easier for others to spot the warning signs.

Be careful about what you share about yourself online. Scammers can use information about your hobbies, job or family to target you.

Learn how to spot a fake profile

They usually have:

- photos that look too professional
- very little personal information
- no connection to social media accounts
- few comments, likes or shares on their social media from other people

Take care and stay safe.

ATO Gives 'Green Light' to Lodge

The Australian Taxation Office (ATO) is giving taxpayers with simple affairs the 'green light' to lodge their annual income tax returns.

ATO Assistant Commissioner Tim Loh said that most taxpayers with simple affairs will find the information they need to lodge has now been pre-filled in their tax return.

'Most of the information we collect from employers, banks, private health insurers, share registries, and other institutions is now ready to go. So, if your financial affairs are fairly straight-forward, you've got a 'green light' to lodge – but remember you still need to check your details are accurate before you hit submit.'

Regardless of whether you lodge using a registered tax agent or yourself through myTax, pre-fill information will be automatically available in your tax return.

Mr Loh also reminded taxpayers that some income may need to be manually added – for example, income from rental properties, some government payments or income from 'side hustles'.

'Just because you've got a green light that doesn't mean you should rush! Take your time and make sure to check that all your information is included.'

As you prepare to lodge, keep Tim's tax time tips in mind:

- Include all of your income: If you picked up some extra work through online activities, the sharing economy, interest from investments, a capital gain (e.g. from the sale of an investment property), or received a cash payment for any work, you will need to include this income in your tax return.
- Assess your circumstances this year: If your job or circumstances have changed this year, it is important to reflect this in your claims. For example, you may have worked at home less in 2022–23 than in the year before, as many of us returned to the office. The way you calculate working from home deductions has also changed, so consider which method is right for you.
- **Records, records, records**: To claim a deduction for a work-related expense, you must have a record to prove it. The ATO app makes it easier and more convenient to keep records in one place, including photos of your receipts and invoices.
- Wait for your notice of assessment: Your tax estimate in myTax or from your registered tax agent may not match your final tax outcome. We recommend waiting for your notice of assessment before making plans for how you will use any expected tax refund this year.
- Stay alert to scams: Remember that the ATO will never send you a link to login to our online

services or ask you to send personal information via social media, email or SMS.

'Calling us won't speed up the processing of your return, but you can keep track of your return by logging into the ATO app or through myGov, regardless of whether you lodged yourself or through a registered tax agent. We normally process online returns within 2 weeks, but if your return hits a speed bump, we'll contact you,' Mr Loh said.

The ATO reminded taxpayers that the outcome of tax returns this year may be different than in previous years, with some people receiving a lower refund than expected, or even a tax bill.

'There are a number of factors that can impact your final tax assessment.'

'In simple terms, if you don't receive a refund, it just means that you've paid the correct amount of tax throughout the year. If you receive a bill, it may mean you didn't pay enough tax – this can be for a number of reasons,' Mr Loh said.

When you lodge your own return, the due date for payment is 21 November, regardless of when you lodge. If you are using a registered agent your due date may be later.

'If you've received a bill and you can pay, you need to do so by the due date to avoid interest accruing. If you're experiencing financial difficulties, we have payment plan options available to support you, which you may be able to set up yourself on the ATO website,' Mr Loh said.

You can reduce your taxable income by making sure you're claiming the deductions you're entitled to – the ATO has over 40 occupation guides that can help you understand the deductions that are available to you depending on your job.

'It might be tempting to inflate your deductions, but if you're considering this, we want you to hit the brakes and remember, we have sophisticated data-matching capabilities which provide us with the clues we need to spot deductions that don't add up,' Mr Loh said.

Want your negatives scanned and saved? How about your slides? The Lake Grace CRC is able to scan your negatives, slides and photographs. They can then be saved to disc for future use or printed.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT ELECTIONS 2023

Currently here at the Shire of Lake Grace we have eight Elected members serving as Councilors. Elected members serve a four-year term. Local Government elections in Western Australia are held every two (2) years.

The 2023 ordinary local government election will be held on Saturday, 21 October 2023.

Under the Local Government Reforms introduced in May 2023, the number of elected members for the Shire of Lake Grace will drop to seven (7). This means that out of the four (4) elected members whose terms are due to expire in 2023 there will be three (3) positions to fill.

CONDUCTING ELECTIONS.

The Electoral Commissioner is responsible for conducting all local government postal elections in Western Australia and can also conduct voting in person elections on request under the Local Government Act 1995. By making the Electoral Commissioner responsible for those elections, the local governments concerned ensure that elections are conducted independently and with impartiality.

For local government elections, rolls close at 5.00pm, 50 days prior to polling day. All electors should check their details are up to date before rolls close on **25 August 2023**.

If the number of candidates is equal to the number of vacancies, the candidate is elected unopposed. If there are more candidates than vacancies, the election will proceed.

While voting in a local government election is not compulsory in Western Australia, all electors are strongly encouraged to vote.

RESIDENTS ROLL.



Don't Be Taken For a Ride Buying a Used-Car

There's a lot to consider when buying a used car, such as your budget and what type of vehicle will suit your needs, but of utmost importance is ensuring you don't drive away with a lemon.

We recently issued a warning against licensed car dealer Ventura Autos, after receiving 136 complaints about the selling of unroadworthy vehicles, in breach of the Australian Consumer Law.

During their compliance inspections of the Welshpool business, our automotive officers issued 43 defect notices on vehicles being sold for issues such as noncompliant tyres, windscreens, oil leaks and seatbelts.

When purchasing a vehicle, consumers rightly expect they will receive a car without any significant problems. That's why we have released an easy-to-follow used car buyer's checklist in partnership with the Motor Trade Association of WA.

The checklist empowers buyers to know what to look out for when shopping around for a second-hand car and gives them the best chance at driving away with a safe and reliable vehicle.

At the top of the checklist is a \$2 Personal Property Securities Register (or PPSR) check using the VIN number found in the owner's manual to see if the car is

free from debt, stolen or written-off.

There's also advice to have the vehicle checked by an independent mechanic and inspect its log book for signs of regular servicing, any ongoing repairs and odometer readings.

In WA, 70 per cent of used car buyers buy via private sale, but these purchases often don't have the same protections as those vehicles bought from a dealer, which may offer some warranty protection depending on the age and mileage of the vehicle.

Private sales can also be a target for scammers, who offer non-existent cars for sale on online marketplaces, websites and social media platforms. In the past three years, Consumer Protection has heard from 259 consumers who were scammed while trying to buy a car online, including 88 who lost over \$660,000.

This is why it's vital for buyers to be vigilant when shopping online and not hand over their cash before seeing the vehicle in-person and doing a series of checks.

You may be eligible to be enrolled to vote in the local government elections on 21 October 2023 if you live in or are an owner or occupier of rateable property in the Shire of Lake Grace.

ROLL CLOSE: 5:00 PM Friday, 25 August 2023

Residents

You are automatically enrolled to vote if you are on the State Electoral Roll as at 5:00 PM Friday, 25 August 2023. If you are not already on the State Electoral Roll and meet the eligibility criteria, or if you have changed address recently, you must complete an enrolment form.

Enrolment Forms

You can enrol or update your details online, or download an enrolment form, via the Western Australian Electoral Commission website (<u>www.elections.wa.gov.au/enrol</u>). Forms are also available from the Australian Electoral Commission (<u>www.aec.gov.au</u>). Enrolments and updates must be completed and received by 5:00 PM Friday, 25 August 2023.

Non-Resident Owners and Occupiers

If you are a non-resident owner or occupier of rateable property in the Shire of Lake Grace and are on the State or Commonwealth Electoral Roll, you are eligible to enrol to vote. If you are **not** on the State or Commonwealth Electoral Roll and own or occupy rateable property in the Shire of Lake Grace you may be eligible to enrol to vote. This applies if you were on the last electoral roll for the Shire of Lake Grace prior to May 1996 and have owned or occupied rateable property in the district continuously since this time. Please contact your local government for details. Owners of land who were on the last Local Government roll continue to retain that status until they cease to own the rateable property to which the enrolment relates. Occupiers do not have continuous enrolment and should contact the Shire of Lake Grace to confirm their enrolment status. To be eligible to enrol as an occupier, you will need to have a right of continuous occupation under a lease, tenancy agreement or other legal instrument for at least the next three months following the date of the application to enrol.

Joint Owners and Occupiers

If a rateable property is owned or occupied by more than two people, a majority of the owners/occupiers may nominate two persons from amongst themselves who are on either the State or Commonwealth Electoral Roll, to enrol as owner/occupier electors.

Corporations

A body corporate that owns or occupies rateable property may nominate two people who are on either the State or Commonwealth Electoral Roll to enrol as owner/occupier electors.

Enrolment Forms - Non-Resident Owners and Occupiers Only

Enrolment forms can be obtained from local governments and must be lodged with the Chief Executive Officer by 5:00 PM Friday, 25 August 2023. Further information can be obtained from the Shire of Lake Grace.

Horace's Search for a "Livelier" Life

State Library of WA

This truly remarkable, astonishing story is based on an interview with Horace Harmour in 1977.

I was born in Surrey in 1893, as part of a big family.

My father had a coffee palace but was a gardener by trade. I remember Queen Victoria calling in twice for afternoon tea, on her way from Buckingham Palace to Windsor. I remember stroking her horse on the nose when I was four.

I came to Australia on the SS Armadale in 1911. It was a rough trip and practically all the crockery on board broke. When I landed in Fremantle, I had only a big suitcase, a box, and three pounds. It was hot, about a hundred and five in the shade.

I got work in York, with the Stock Inspector for Northam and District. Mr Higgins was a fine, likeable fellow and paid me well. Odd jobs included building windmills, rolling scrub using a wooden roller made from a hollow tree, milking cows, and cutting wood.

I became Mr. Higgins right-hand man and accompanied him to look after sick stock. We would take out the horse and sulky and the vet equipment for days at a time, camping on the side of the road.

I left Higgins to go chaff cutting. It was hard work indeed. All the fellows used to sleep on chaff bags and I

remember one fellow used to get on the top of the bags at four in the morning with no clothes on. Then crow like a rooster to wake us all up. After that, I went sinking dams around Baandee.

When a property opened for selection in Nangeenan, I successfully put in for it. Got forty acres cleared, a dam put down and a hundred acres of mallee scrub rolled. I built a shack where I lived with my two half-bred kangaroo dogs and called it 'Harmour's Farm'.

I got my provisions from a store in nearby Hines Hill. I remember one day visiting the store with one of the dogs. Then on the way home looking back to see my dog with a big cheese in his mouth that he'd stolen from behind the counter.

When WWI broke out, I sold everything I owned for twenty-five pounds. I should have got more but I was fed up with this batching stuff and my mind was, you know, on travel. Anything for a bit of a lively life.

I enlisted in Merredin, and the very next day was on a train to Blackboy Hill Camp, where a riding test determined that I was suitable for the Transport Section.

Two days before leaving for Egypt and after six weeks of training, I marched through Perth with the infantry. At the end of the march my limber wagon (used to transport artillery), was covered with bunches of flowers, money, and lollies.

On the troop ship Ascanius, I slept on the deck near the horses in a hammock tied to derrick poles. When we got off there was another month of training in Abbassia.

When we eventually headed to Gallipoli, with eight hundred horses and mules on board, the shellfire was so terrific, we had no hope of landing and had to return to Egypt.

When they called for volunteers to form a camel corps in Cario, I volunteered and was sent down to Kantara near to Suez, for a veterinary course. In the city there were two thousand horses and camels. There was a large veterinary hospital with a pharmacy on one end as well as a big heap of fishing lines. On quiet mornings, we would fish in the Suez Canal, which came right up to the hospital itself.

After a few months of training, I went to North Africa with the 1st Imperial Camel Corps. Enroute we encountered a huge sandstorm and oh geez, it was something terrible. Seeing it coming, the camels sat down and wouldn't move. The men sought shelter under rugs tied to the pommels of their saddles. After the storm passed, the sand was so banked up on the camels it almost covered their humps!

After Africa, I went to Sollum in Egypt, where from dusk until dawn I tended to bitten humps and mange (a skin condition caused by mites). Here I earned my name as Sergeant Snowy the camel doctor.

One day I was tending to the sick camels when I saw an Arabian person in the distance walking up and down the lines. I thought he was looking to try and pick a good

camel to pinch that night. So, I went over and asked him the side of the road that a passing dispatch rider on a who he was but he never spoke. So, I told him to get out!

He left without a word but a short time later I was told that the man was Colonel Lawrence of British Intelligence (aka Lawrence of Arabia - the 1962 film epic is based on his life). He'd been looking up and down the lines to see if the camels were in good enough condition to escort him to Akaba on a mission to bribe the Arabs to revolt against the Turks.

Two weeks later with the No 2 Company Camel Corps, I escorted Colonel Lawrence to Akaba. He's a very hard man to estimate. He always wore Arabic and although he was very quiet, Lawrence was a bit bloodthirsty in a way. Several times he ended a man's misery because they were badly wounded. I saw this with my own eyes. I saw a lot of things but gee you couldn't do or say anything. Just had to grin and bear it. You had to be very hard-hearted, even if you weren't, and close your eyes to the lot.

I tended to many camels during the war but my favourite of all was Lizzie. When the easy-going Sudanese white camel bull was left behind when his master was recalled, I knew I had to have him. So, I dressed him all over in whale oil and sulphur so after he rolled in the dirt he looked like a black camel. I kept Lizzie this way so no one would touch him and had him until the end of the war.

I went into action in Gaza in April 1917, but the Germans and the Turks were too strong for us and mowed us down. Out of a hundred and twenty men in my unit, only seven came back. I was out in the open under the shellfire, trying to lead the camels out of the action, and how the dickens I didn't get hit I don't know. There were nose caps from shell cases going everywhere, like cricket balls.

Towards the end of the war, I became sicker and sicker with bronchitis, dysentery, and malaria fever, all at the same time. Self-medicating from the army veterinary stock. When eventually I saw a doctor, he exclaimed "God. How are you alive?"

It was on the way to Damascus, laying on a stretcher on

motorbike told me the war was finished.

And that was the end of it.

NOTE – Horace returned to Fremantle on the hospital ship Wandilla. His snow-white camel Lizzie was sent down to the Sudan for breeding purposes.






