Caring For Our Bush

It always puts a spring in your step to go to a workshop that makes you feel empowered, the Land Conservation District Committee's Bushcare workshop ticked all of the boxes.

Guest speakers on the day were Keith Bradby from Gondwana Link, Peter White from DBCA and local botanist Anne Rick. All of the speakers have decades of experience and knowledge that they were happy to share with those who attended.

According to Wheatbelt NRM we aren't doing too badly as a locality with 38% of the shire having remnant vegetation cover, however only 44% of that remnant vegetation is protected by reserves. Therefore, the remainder is likely to be on privately owned land, this is

an incredible environmental asset that we need to respect and protect.

Closer to home, the statistics are more sobering, in a 25km radius of Lake Grace townsite only 10.7% of the native bush remains. Attendees at the Bushcare workshop had one thing in common, a love of the native bush and what they could contribute to the cause; whether it be assisting with flora audits or getting a better result from their on-farm tree planting.

White settlement and farming has a dramatic impact on the native ecosystem; although the flora and fauna exudes an aura of toughness growing in such a dry and rugged environment they and the soil that supports them are in reality quite fragile. We didn't mean to upset the

If you could be any animal, what would you be and why?


Easy. A Grizzly Bear – cantankerous powerhouse who hibernates all winter. I've obviously given that a lot of thought over the years.



Springtime Stargazing

Spring is the perfect time to get out under dark country skies and be in awe of the sparkling stars and planets overhead. But that's not all, let's throw in a close encounter between Saturn and the Moon, the Spring Equinox AND Scorpio!

The Spring Equinox is on 23rd September and marks the transition from winter in the southern hemisphere. The number of hours of daylight will almost equal darkness!

Spring is a great time to find the constellation Scorpio! It's a large constellation that forms the shape of a scorpion! It is currently visible throughout the evening, lying directly overhead at around 8pm. Look for a reddish star called Antares that lies in the centre of the constellation. See if you can find the curve of Scorpio's body and the sting in its tail stretching across the sky!

Something interesting: Antares is a super-giant red star several hundred times the diameter of our Sun and is about 600 light-years from Earth.

When to look: after 8pm during spring.

Which direction to look: Directly overhead.

For some fun stargazing, the full Moon makes a close approach to brilliant Saturn on 27th September and the pair will look stunning together. For those with telescopes or high-powered binoculars, check out the beautiful ring system of Saturn.

The Tea and Sugar Train

In 1937 every Wednesday at 5 am, the Tea and Sugar train would set out from Parkeston with supplies for the folks who lived along the Trans-Australian Railway line.

Nothing grew out on the Nullabor, so food, clothing, wood - absolutely everything except milk, supplied mostly by goats, had to be brought from either Kalgoorlie or Port Augusta.

Sprawled like a giant caterpillar along the Trans Australian track, the Tea and Sugar carried one passenger coach, because only in urgent cases of accident or illness would the express train stop.

The Tea and Sugar was made up in the evening, supplies packed and orders labeled, ahead of an early morning departure. Some of the crew slept aboard as Parkeston did not boast many houses. Passengers stayed overnight too, ready for the early start and bringing their own rugs and tucker.

Out from Kalgoorlie, there was a belt of timber and scrub, followed by the limestone country of the Nullabor Plain that swept like the sea to the horizon. Unbroken by trees, houses, or any living form, it was a grand sight.

There were no corridors to roam along on the Tea and Sugar but as the train stopped at even the smallest

camp, it was easy enough to change coaches en route.

The storeman's car was like a country emporium. It had a bunk, a little stove, and even a sink to wash up in. In its centre were cupboards and shelves. Fruit, vegetables, and other perishables were stored behind louvers at one end to keep them cool and steady.

When a stop approached the storeman would drop a counter across the door and stand there with an apron. Just as if he were a grocer in a Perth suburban street, but hundreds of miles from anywhere there was nothing suburban about his customers.

The butcher's shop on wheels did a brisk trade and boasted an inside counter all white and pure. It was a case of scrambling up to pick your joint, which came more or less on the hoof. For the butcher killed as the train rattled along, and as the number of sheep dwindled the bundles of hides grew.

The guard's van was an excellent spot to travel if you wanted to see the country. There was a little bow window seat from where you could look ahead up and down the track. The guard had a stove on which he could cook sausages as the train jolted along but he boasted no bunk - he was not called a guard for nothing.

The Tea and Sugar Train (cont.)

He did however have a desk, as the guard had to write a log like any seaman. As well as a field telephone, a first aid kit, a stretcher, and a safe for money and valuables received en route.

On its first day, The Tea and Sugar train would go as far as Rawlina, and spend the night safely camped on a sideline, out of the way of the 11.30 pm eastbound express. Then with the dawn came the westbound express after which, the Tea and Sugar set off on the 300-mile journey to Cook.

For people who lived in incredible isolation, the arrival of the Tea and Sugar train was a social highlight! There was great excitement among adults and children alike. Women even dressed up in style to greet the train.

In the 1950s an infant health clinic, a children's toy library, and a theater car were added to the train. The infant health clinic was open for consultation as soon as the train pulled to a stop, no matter what the

hour of the day or night. It was not unusual to be weighing babies at 2 am.

Noreen Jones was a nurse on the Tea and Sugar train, travelling every six weeks. Often in the sweltering heat, she provided help and advice to the women who lived in the fettlers' (railway workers) camps strung across the Nullabor.

Many women were migrants who did not speak English and together with a doctor, Noreen would carry out checkups all along the line. She quickly became adept at judging the weight of a baby just by picking it up and told the Post newspaper in 1999, that it was having the babies weighed that brought the mothers in. This created an opportunity to discuss how they were coping.

Noreen had great admiration for the women on the line and saw much hardship and poverty in the harsh environment. The ground was so hard and dry that the

children could not even write in it. Water was rationed and food so expensive that there was no point telling a mother to give her child lots of fresh fruit and vegetables.

This should provide us with faster and hopefully more reliable internet service. We are now waiting for Telstra to flick a switch somewhere, and then we will be good to go. Being part of a Government department means paperwork is a fact of life for us. We are trying to work smarter so more and more of our work is moving online. Faster internet will definitely translate to more free time to spend on the road, so we're really looking forward to this improvement.

Crime News

We have had a recent report of a business email being compromised, thankfully it appears that no significant amount of money has been lost, however it has caused a lot of anxiety to the victim.

The following is taken from the Australian Cyber Security Centre website, we highly recommend you visit this site as it contains lots of helpful information regarding all types of cyber security advice. You are also able to report cybercrime and security incidents through their website.

What is a business email compromise?

Business email compromise is when malicious actors use email to abuse trust in business processes to scam organisations out of money or goods. Malicious actors can impersonate business representatives using similar names, domains and/or fraudulent logos as a legitimate organisation or by using compromised email accounts and pretending to be a trusted co-worker.

Common scams associated with business email compromise include:

Invoice fraud: Malicious actors compromise a vendor's email account and through it have access to legitimate invoices. The malicious actors then edit contact and bank details on those invoices and send them to customers with the compromised email account. The customer pays the invoice, thinking they are paying the vendor, but instead send that money to malicious actors' bank accounts.

Employee impersonation: Malicious actors compromise a work email account and impersonate a co-worker via email. Malicious actors can use this identity to commit fraud in a number of ways. One

common method is to impersonate a person in power (such as a Chief Executive Officer or Chief Financial Officer) and have a false invoice raised. Another method is to request a change to a worker's banking details. The funds from the false invoice or the worker's salary are then sent to malicious actors' bank accounts.

Company impersonation: Malicious actors register a domain with a name very similar to a large, known and trusted organisation. Malicious actors then impersonate the organisation in an email to a vendor and request a quote for a quantity of expensive goods, like laptops. Malicious actors negotiate for the goods to be delivered to them prior to payment. The goods are delivered to a specified location; however, the invoice is sent to the legitimate organisation, who never ordered or received the goods.

How do I prevent my email accounts being compromised?

Be vigilant against phishing

Phishing (pronounced 'fishing') are scams that are made to appear as if they were sent from individuals or organisations you think you know, or you think you should trust. Malicious actors can steal credentials using phishing techniques and then do further harm, using those compromised credentials to login and send out malicious or fraudulent content to your contacts.

Phishing is not just limited to email. These scams are delivered via SMS, instant messaging and social media, and pretend to be trusted organisations like:

- State and Territory police or law enforcement
- utilities such as telecommunications, postal services, power and gas companies
- banks, and other financial institutions
- Government departments, such as the Australian Taxation Office, Centrelink and Medicare, or government services such as myGov.

Reputable organisations will not call, SMS or email to verify or update your information. This includes companies such as Amazon, PayPal, Google, Apple and Facebook. When you receive unsolicited contact from organisations, there are a number of simple things you can do to keep yourself safe.

- Check details such as the spelling of a sender's domain name. Double-check by comparing it to previous correspondence.
- Use spam and message scanning services offered by your email, SMS or social media providers to filter potentially harmful content.

- Exercise critical thinking and vigilance when receiving phone calls, messages and emails.
- Exercise caution opening messages or attachments, and clicking on links from unknown senders.
- Do not provide personal information (such as usernames, PINs, passwords, passphrases or secret/security questions and answers) to unverified sources.
- If a message seems suspicious, contact the person or organisation separately, using contact details you have verified separately (for example, obtaining the phone number from the organisation's official website) to check if they are likely to have sent the message.

Traffic News

Surrender Notices.

A Surrender Notice can be issued by a Police Officer as an alternative to an Impound Notice (when your vehicle is seized on the spot) if certain criteria are met. Basically, this allows the driver or owner of the vehicle to continue their journey, however they are lawfully

bound to hand the vehicle in to a designated vehicle storage yard by a stipulated date and time.

It is an offence under the Road Traffic Act to fail to surrender your vehicle by the stipulated date and time, and if a police officer reasonably suspects that the keys to the vehicle, or the vehicle is, in any premises, the police officer may, without a warrant, at any time, using reasonable force; enter the premises for either or both of the following purposes: -

- (a) seizing the keys;
- (b) driving, towing or otherwise conveying the vehicle to a place where the vehicle is to be stored.

If you haven't guessed, we have received a request from Katanning Police to locate a vehicle that is related to a Surrender Notice they issued. The vehicle was not surrendered and we will track it down, impound it, and charge the driver with the above offence.

And talking about good news, I am sure the following stories will brighten your day.

There's Much Less Plastic in Oceans than Assumed, Dutch Researchers Claim

A recent study conducted by Dutch researchers challenges previous assumptions about the extent of plastic pollution in the world's oceans, revealing that the amount of plastic present is much lower than previously estimated.

Estimates range from 75 million tons to 200 million tons of plastic waste floating in the oceans. But according to researchers at Utrecht University, the actual amount is closer to 3 million tons, it reports.

According to the International Union for Conservation of Nature, at least 14 million tons of plastic end up in the ocean every year.

However, based on measurements at 20,000 sits across the world, Utrecht University oceanologist Mikeal Kaandorp and his team claim 500, 000 tons is much more likely.

According to them, rivers in particular, bring much less plastic to the ocean than previously thought. Instead, much more plastic remains in the rivers than previous estimations.

"And what is in the ocean remains floating in large pieces for much longer. There are far fewer microplastics in the water than previously thought."

Biologist Merijn Tinga is "cautiously optimistic" about the good news.

"If the plastic soup is smaller than thought, it is a hopeful sign. But even if it's a hundred times smaller it is still far too much," he told the paper.

This Woman has Spent 3 days Crawling Through Cockroach-Infested Storm Drains to Rescue Puppies

A Houston woman has spent three grueling days crawling through cockroach-infested storm drains to rescue a litter of helpless puppies trapped deep within the city's sewers.

The rescue mission began after someone reported seeing a litter of puppies crossing the street, but lost sight of them and could only hear whimpers.

Callie Clemens, her dog Giselle, and a group of volunteers have been scouring storm drains looking for the dogs ever since.

"I can't sleep knowing there are puppies in there going to die," Clemens told.

The group has managed to save two of the lost litter. Clemens said there are others underground that she can still hear.

The volunteers have been using dog sounds on their phones in hopes that they can get some type of response from the remaining puppies.

"I know they're still in there, I just think they're further down." Clemens said.

Throughout the weekend, the volunteers have waded through unpleasant water and braved the nests of cockroaches in their quest to locate the lost puppies.

Dramatic Video Shows Homeless Man Save Baby From Rolling Into Traffic

A homeless man is being hailed as a hero for saving a baby that was heading straight into traffic.

Surveillance video from a car wash in Hesperia, California, shows a stroller start rolling down the driveway. The baby boy's great aunt tries to run after it, but collapses to her knees.

Ron Nessman was sitting on a bench outside of the car wash when he noticed the stroller heading straight for the busy road.

Scientists Discover A new Ecosytem Below the Sea Floor In the Deep, Dark Ocean

Scientists continue uncovering new layers of life on our planet, revealing a vast and intricate tapestry of biodiversity that seems to stretch infinitely.

Most recently, a team of scientists has uncovered a previously unknown ecosystem thriving beneath slabs of volcanic crust in the deep, dark East Pacific Rise off Central America.

Using an underwater robot, a team from Schmidt Ocean Institute (SOI) overturned chunks of volcanic crust, discovering cave systems teeming with worms, snails, and chemosynthetic bacteria living in 75 degrees Fahrenheit water.

"The discovery ads a new dimension to hydrothermal vents, showing that their habitats exist both above and below the sea floor," the organization said in a statement.

Hydrothermal vents are like underwater hot springs. They flow though cracks in the earth's crust.

Additionally, scientists found evidence of vent animals, like animals, like tubeworms, traveling underneath the seafloor through vent fluid to colonize new habitats.

"Our understanding of animal life at deep-sea hydrothermal vents has greatly expanded with this discovery," said Dr. Monika Bright. "Two dynamic vent habitats exists. Vent animals above and below the surface thrive together in unison, depending on vent fluid below and oxygen in the seawater from above."

"This truly remarkable discovery of a new ecosystem, hidden beneath another ecosystem, provides fresh evidence that life exists in incredible places," added SOI's executive director DR. Jyotika Virmani Schmidt. "Ocean Institute is proud to have provided a platform for Dr. Bright and her team to gather new insights into these systems that may be vulnerable to deep-sea mining."

"The discovery of new creatures, landscapes, and now, an entirely new ecosystem underscores just how much we have yet to discover about our Ocean - and how important it is to protect what we don't yet know or understand," added Wendy Schmidt, president and cofounder of SOI.

Local government elections are quickly approaching. Enrollments for voting closed on 25th August. Nominations for Council open on Thursday 31st August and close at 4.00pm on 7th September. If you are keen to see the progression of the shire and show an interest in your local community, nomination is encouraged.

Tenders closed for the operation of the Lake Grace and Newdegate Medical Centres on 18th August and are currently being scrutinized and assessed. We bid farewell to our doctors over the past 6 years and thank Doctors Olu, Abi and Olay for their service and wish them well for the future.

Until the new operators are appointed we have secured the services of Dr Michael Livingston from Livingston Medical who will be commencing on 4th September. Appointments can be made on the usual number.

Highlights from the Council Meeting of 23 August.

As part of the ongoing Local Government Act reforms we now have to identify which councilors vote for or against each motion. Council minutes are posted to our website within 7 days of the council meeting should you wish to view the details.

- After public advertising of the proposed closure of Walker Road to public traffic, Council voted 7/1 to officially close the road.
- South West Native Title Settlement Land Base Consultation: a further 5 areas have been identified for possible transfer for inclusion in the Noongar Land Estate as part of the settlement. All the lands identified are Reserve. It was noted that one Reserve contains an old gravel pit that the Shire may require for future further extraction. Details of the lands identified are available from the Shire office upon request.
- Approval was given to CBH to continue the use of Lot 216 Newdegate North Rd for emergency grain storage for a further 12 months without the need for development approval whilst they undergo works planning for its future site on the Newdegate-Ravensthorpe Rd.
- Council accepted an invitation from WALGA to register as a Roadwise Council which will assist in improving road safety standards within the Shire.
- Council accepted the offer from Farmers Centre (1978) Pty Ltd for the purchase of Lot 213 Quondong
 Court, Lake Grace. As per government regulations, the sale of the land is to be publicly advertised for 14
 days to receive any submissions against the sale of the land. There are now only 2 residential lots left
 for sale in town, both in Quondong Court.

Lastly, The Newdegate Field Days are rapidly approaching and we wish all involved another successful event.

Community Infrastructure Services

This year's road construction program has commenced with shire staff currently re-sheeting a 4km section of Burngup Road. This project should be completed by October. Request for quotes have been sent out to WALGA preferred suppliers (Contractors) for:

- Gravel sheet 5km on Hatters Hill Road
- Gravel sheet 5.80km on Winchcombe Road
- Gravel sheet 4.76km on Fitzgerald Road
- Gravel sheet 2km on Magenta Road

Once the Request for quotes have been received and assessed, works will be awarded to the successful contractor with works on Hatters Hill Road and Fitzgerald Road to be completed by 31st October 2023.

Staff have been busy at the Pingaring Old School and sports grounds in preparation for the upcoming Pingaring Centenary on the 8th to 10th of September. In conjunction with the Shire of Kulin, there will be entry statements installed on the 2 main entries to Pingaring. Thank you Shire of Kulin for organising this project.

Shire staff and contractors have been making the most of the prime grading conditions over the last couple of months with the winter grading program in full swing. Fisher, McGlinn, Biddy Camm and Gordon Roads (Lake Grace), Old Ravensthorpe, Taylor and Magenta Roads (Newdegate), Norseman and Stennetts Roads (Lake King and Varley) all received grading works.



balance, but we do need to forge a suitable coexistence.

All of that fabulous grain has encouraged an explosion in the numbers of kangaroos and galahs; this drives the fauna that was actually indigenous to the area into decline as they lose their nesting spots and face aggressive competition for the food. Reportedly crows were not a fixture in Lake Grace until the 1930s, pink and grey galahs didn't come to Lake Grace until the 1950s – these population shifts come with a change in the land use and the ready availability of food and water.

Keith Bradby talked about the link between land degradation and mental health, a healthy landscape led to healthy people. We see this locally with the number of people who enjoy a picnic at the Jam Patch, who love heading bush to camp; it clears the mind and gives us a good feeling. He also discussed wildlife corridors and that the connections can be landscape, linear or stepping-stone but it needed to include a variety of canopies. If planting, keep it random with a variety of trees/shrubs; be aware that a shrub you may love, but is actually from a different area, can take over and become a pest. A weed is simply a plant growing in the wrong spot!

revegetation projects in the Lake Bryde area. Peter's mantra for successful revegetation was preparation of the ground before planting; spray the weeds and give the rabbits a treat before even thinking about putting trees in the ground. With the pests taken care of Peter sees little need for tree guards, of course when planting tens of thousands of trees the extra chore and expense of tree guards could limit programmes.

Following the presentations by Peter and Keith there was morning tea and an introduction to Anne Rick who has called the shire of Lake Grace home for more than three decades. When marrying and moving from the metro area Anne thought her botany career was over; she was mistaken! Anne, Peter and Keith chaired a panel giving the attendees an opportunity to ask any questions about their own programmes or those done by the speakers.

One thing that is very evident is the loss of programmes and initiatives that were in place for revegetation and soil conservation. The shrinking of access to government bodies such as the Department of Agriculture are evidence of that.

Being able to plant varieties that are indigenous to the area is important but requires the skills (and a licence) to collect seed and be able to germinate. There are organisations that are able to do this. The LCDC will look at running a workshop on seed collection and successful germination in 2024.

The Bushcare workshop was one of the activities from the LCDC Bushcare project which was funded by NRM. Unfortunately, NRM were unavailable to be there on the day but sent a fabulous array of books that we were able to give away. Still to come in the project is the signage for the tree walk, brochure, planting guide and the finalisation of the management plan; all of this is to be done by the end of the year.

A big thank you to our presenters and to those who came along and to Michelle Slarke for organizing such quality speakers and providing the introduction and background and talking a little about the Bushcare project.


I cannot tell a lie, I haven't actually read this book....but I will. It is a brand new edition at the Lake Grace Library.

In 2020, lost and heartbroken, and with an unscratched travel itch thanks to international border closures, Sonia Henry accepted a job as a GP in remotest Western Australia. The plan was to stay for one month. But before she knew it, this dressed-to-the-nines Sydney party girl was becoming an akubra-wearing bush doctor covered in red dust - and loving every minute of it.

Sonia spent the next two years working in some of the remotest parts of the country. She learned how to shoot in the middle of the desert, visited pearl farms and pubs, came to terms with being regularly outnumbered by crocodiles, and adopted a cattle dog called Buddy, who would come to be her closest companion. 

Gardening Tips

Spring Rose Care

From early spring, roses emerge from their winter hibernation and we see fabulous new growth and blooms. Spring rose care isn't complicated when you follow some simple steps - feed, protect from pests and diseases, regular pruning, mulch and water.

Feeding Roses

Well-fed bushes will give you lots of growth and gorgeous flowers. Whether you have a big rose garden or a few potted roses, feeding them is easy. Choose a fertiliser that is specifically designed for roses (or any flowering plant), and the ingredients, with a fast acting fertiliser, will promote healthy leaf and stem growth and bright, colourful blooms.

Rose Pests

Aphids! Aphids love roses in the spring time. The small sap-sucking insects eat the sugary sap that flows through the new rose growth. These pests come in a few different colours such as, green, black, yellow or brown.

They can often be seen in clusters of large numbers on leaf buds and developing flowers, along stems and underneath the leaves. Aphids take valuable nutrients and sugars from the roses causing leaves to twist and fall off, they can also pass on damaging viruses/



diseases. So its important to control them as soon as you see them.

Hungry caterpillars also enjoy roses, chewing through the leaves and getting into rose buds and petals. Even with their camouflage, they can cause major damage to the plant.

Thrips are tiny, slender insects, only 1-2mm long, that suck the sap from the rose's leaves and flowers, causing brown blemishes on the petals and the leaves tend to look silvery and distorted.

Rose Diseases

One of the most troublesome fungal diseases for a rose plant is Rose Black Spot. The leaves can have black spots the become feathered with yellow margins. If left untreated, the leaves will turn yellow and fall off, making the plant weak.

Another common rose disease is Powdery Mildew. The leaves, stem and flower buds have a white powdery growth on them and is most active in warm, humid weather.

To keep these diseases under control, a combination of an insecticide and a fungicide will do the job. Just make sure to spray roses every two weeks, as soon as they are noticed.

Watering & Mulching Roses

Roses grow best in a well-drained, moist soil or potting mix. Rose gardens should be watered deeply at least once a week, especially during dry weather. Potted roses will dry out faster than what's in the garden, so they should be watered more often. When watering your plants, make sure you water the base of the plants rather than over the leaves, as wet leaves can cause diseases.

To keep the soil or potting mix moist, apply a layer of mulch (such as bark chips or straw). Be sure to leave a gap of a few centimetres between the base of plant and the start of the mulch, to allow air flow.

Members of the Western Australian community are being urged to consider nominating for the upcoming local government elections to be able to influence the decisions being made that potentially impact the lives of thousands of residents.

Local Government Minister David Michael said, by standing for local council, candidates will make a valuable contribution to local democracy by putting forward policies and highlighting issues they believe are important to them and their community.

A promotional campaign by the Cook Government, in partnership with the WA Local Government Association, will aim to promote diversity in local government representation with the hope it will result in greater involvement of a wider range of candidates from Aboriginal and multicultural backgrounds, as well as young people and people with disability.

The Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries has also teamed up with the Youth Affairs Council of WA to conduct a campaign specifically targeting the 18-24 age group to boost the interest of young people in getting involved in local government.

To provide incentives for people to nominate, the local government reform package includes measures to support a diverse range of people who serve on councils, such as new parental leave entitlements, and changes to enable local governments to pay superannuation and educational allowances to council members.

Nominations for the local government elections to be held on 21 October will open on 31 August and close on 7 September 2023.
