Junior Countryweek Cricket

Hundreds of cricketers from regional Western Australia converged on Perth last week for Junior Country Week, which was sponsored by Alcohol Think Again.

The annual event saw players from across Country WA compete in under 14s and 16s matches from Monday 9 January to Friday 13 January.

Competing teams faced off across four days for a chance to make the Final, which was held at the iconic WACA Ground for the second successive year.

Three Lake Grace junior cricketers attended, Alby Stanton and Taj Carruthers in the Upper Great Southern U14s which was coached by Derek Stanton. Judd McKenzie was in the UGS U16s, his third and last time attending Junior Country Week as next year he will have aged out.

It was great fun for the trio as they rekindled and forged new friendships while enjoying an onslaught of cricket with their peers at a variety of cricket grounds in the metro area.

The 12 players in the U14B team came from Lake Grace, Wagin, Williams, Darkan, Narrogin, Pingelly and Pumphries Bridge. The U16 team were a combination of UGS players and also Central Wheatbelt who were unable to get the numbers for a team. A great initiative that meant all of the junior cricketers who wanted to attend, could.

In their final game of the week the UGS U16's (third on the ladder) were pitted against Great Southern (fourth on the ladder). UGSA won by 133 runs (UGSCA 7/222 v GS 7/89) with Judd scoring 8 runs off 38 balls. Judd's figures for the week were 68 runs; bowling-6/75 (25) 6 maidens and 1 catch.

During the week the UGS U14B team suffered two narrow defeats and three comprehensive wins. For the team their Country Week campaign came to an end with a 50 over contest against Northam to decide third and fourth places. With some solid play the UGS side came out winners 10/173 as opposed to Northam's 8/164.

Well done boys for representing your town so well!

WA recorded their highest road toll since 2016 with 174 deaths, including 112 in regional areas and 62 in the metropolitan area. Road Safety Commissioner Adrian Warner said the year was ending with too many families, friends and communities suffering in grief.

Use Your Consumer Rights to Avoid Post-Christmas Disappointment

WA consumers are being reminded about their rights should Christmas joy turn to disappointment when gifts end up being faulty, unsafe or not as described.

In these circumstances, under the Australian Consumer Law (ACL), stores must offer a refund, replacement or repair and this is regardless of whether the item was on sale. Proof of purchase such as a receipt or credit card statement from the gift giver will generally be required.

Consumer guarantees within the ACL require that products bought from Australian-based retailers, including those trading online, are free from defects, fit for their intended purpose, match the description in any advertising and are safe.

However, Commissioner for Consumer Protection Gary Newcombe warns these safeguards won't apply to 'change of mind' situations.

"For example, if the item is the wrong size or you don't like the colour, the store is not legally obliged to offer a remedy, so consumers are at the mercy of their individual returns policy. The same applies if you want to exchange the gift for something else," Mr Newcombe said.

"Another issue that may arise this year are delivery delays. Consumers may be entitled to a remedy if their product fails to turn up in time for Christmas, so we suggest contacting the business to resolve the issue in the first instance before lodging a complaint with Consumer Protection."

Glasgow, 1932.


When the son-in-law of one of the city's wealthiest shipbuilders is found floating in the River Clyde with his throat cut, it falls to Inspector Jimmy Dreghorn to lead the murder case - despite sharing a troubled history with the victim's widow, Isla Lockhart.

From the flying fists and flashing blades of Glasgow's gangland underworld, to the backstabbing upper echelons of government and big business, Dreghorn and his partner 'Bonnie' Archie McDaid will have to dig deep into Glasgow society to find out who wanted the man dead and why.

All the while, a sadistic murderer stalks the post-war city leaving a trail of dead bodies in their wake. As the case deepens, will Dreghorn find the killer - or lose his own life in the process?

This novel opens the eyes to the poverty and difficulty of changing ones circumstances when living in the tenements.

Definitely worth a read and available from the Lake Grace Library.

Positive and Active Mentoring

Being a *male* is a matter of birth, being a man is a matter of age but being a positive and active *mentor* is a matter of choice, *he didn't tell me, he showed me.*

Wisdom can only be obtained through personal growth, ageing and the experiences we have in life. To me this means we can have a mature young man but not a wise one. I think this interpretation is important because it substantiates the vital role a positive and active mentor can play for us no matter what our age.

Who are our mentors? They can come from a pool of people, but are predominantly sourced from the following areas:

- someone older;
- for a bloke, dads are our first choice (92%). This is interesting because society's demographics are changing. Research tells us that in 1960 10% of all kids were living away from their dads whereas by 2010 this had grown to 27% of all kids living away from their dads. This is a significant shift and one that puts additional pressure on the vital role of male mentoring;
- father figures, grandfathers, uncles, brothers, teachers or sporting coaches;



 it can be someone who is not in your field of work or play, this can help gain a natural and external viewpoint.

When we are deciding what to do in life (whether it is day to day stuff or longer-term), talking to a mentor can help us with our decision making. This is important both in our personal life and our working and business careers.

A positive and active mentor:

- not only listens to what you're saying, but asks open ended and reflective questions;
- has opinions which you respect but acknowledges that you don't have to act on or agree with them;
- gives wisdom and perspective (lived experience);
- acts as a sounding board and confidant.


When making major decisions, talking through issues with a mentor is beneficial. Young blokes especially need to tell their stories to mentors. It is by this process that they can validate and question where they are at and where they are heading in life. It helps them to clarify their issues, thus cultivating independent thinking.

There is never a time in a man's life that he won't benefit from having a positive and active mentor. Mentoring is about developing relationships, it takes time and sacrifice, it's a two-way street and everyone benefits. Blokes often have three types of people (mates) that we can spill our guts to. These usually come from the following categories:

- a peer;
- a partner;
- a mentor.

As blokes we need to identify who these people are. Ask yourself the question *who is my mentor*? This person may change through our life journey but remember *positive mentoring is rewarding and being an active mentor is our choice.*




Winners on the list are definitely personal hygiene and bleach (not to be mixed up with the former); cordial and

The Vision of CY O'Connor

The 10th March 2022 was the 120 year anniversary of the death of Charles Yelverton (CY) O'Connor.

In 1881, CY O'Connor accepted the appointment of Engineer-in Chief of Western Australia, a position which carried with it the acting-general management of railways.

In 1896 he was relieved of the railways management, in order that he might devote the whole of his attention to the great engineering schemes that were engaging the attention of the world. Namely Fremantle harbour and

the Goldfields Water Scheme.

Sadly, with an incredible work load, heavy responsibility and continuing pressure from his critics, CY O'Connor's mental health suffered and did not live to see the completion of the pipeline.

penned this note, which today is hidden in a vault at the State Records Office.

"The position has become impossible." he wrote.

"Anxious important work to do and three commissions of enquiry to attend to.

We may not have done as well as possible in the past but we will necessarily be hampered to do well in the imminent future.

I feel that my brain is suffering and I am in great fear of what effect all this worry will have upon me. I have lost control of my thoughts.

The Coolgardie scheme is all right and I could finish it if I got a chance and protection from misrepresentation but there's no hope for that now and its better that it should be given to some entirely new man to do who will be untrammelled by prior responsibility.

Put the wing walls to Helena Weir at once -"


CY O'Connor then rode his horse past Fremantle Harbour, south to Robb Jetty, then into the sea to take his own life.
