New Season for Junior Basketball

This term has seen the start of summer season sports, with tennis, cricket, bowls, soon swimming, and the senior basketball competition. Basketball is one of those great sports that you can go down to the court with a ball and a couple of mates at any time to shoot hoops, no need to find a team or be organized to have a great time. But to learn the rules of the game, the skills to shoot that lay up and work the court as a team are invaluable.

The young people of Lake Grace have had the privilege of having Kids Basketball Training and Games in the Lake Grace town this season thanks to the wonderful efforts of husband-and-wife team, Lindsay and Tahlia

Willock. A total of four, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ hour sessions are being held this term to teach some basic ball skills and the opportunity to learn the rules of the game. There are 35 kids that have registered, with boys and girls ranging in ages from 5 to 12.

Each age group is separated into their school years and the groups move around stations focusing on different skills like shooting, passing, ball control while dribbling and layups for example. After this for an hour, they get to have a game, with enough kids involved to play 2 full courts. It could be absolute chaos with so many kids and balls around the court,

Staying in Place

An information session was held at the CRC this week with Mable, a platform for service providers for Aged Care and NDIS. It was an opportunity to learn more about the program, how flexible it is and how enriching it is to the community.

You can become an independent support worker on Mable and build a reliable career making a difference in someone's life.

The support worker has the freedom of choice; choosing the type of work you wish to do and setting your own hours. You may only wish to do gardening or would be available to drive someone to an out of town appointment but can only do this on a Thursday or Saturday. You set the parameters.

There is mutually agreed on rates with your clients and you can grow your skill set with over 170 free professional courses on demand.

Peace of mind is a plus with Mable providing a range of safe-guards and high-level insurance with every job.

Providers of domestic and social support don't need qualifications to start employment, they will however need a police check. Firstly you need to start an account with Mable, from there you can apply for your police clearance (this must be done through the Mable platform). All costs for the police check are met by

Mable if you enter a code that can be provided by the CRC. Providers also need their own ABN as well as two character references. If you're providing personal care then you would need a professional reference.

You may be happy to do some shifts but don't want to be paid, you can nominate a charitable bank account if you wish. You will still need to be on the Mable platform though to ensure that all the checks and balances are in place.

Social support in the past has been undervalued by many but lets face it; as important as it is to have a clean bathroom and fresh sheets on the bed sometimes people would much rather have a bit of fun. Social support can be going for a coffee, taking a drive, getting taken to the footy. The list is endless and the impact is enormous.

The germination of this project came from a lady in rural Queensland who was looking for services for her mother. With nothing being offered through the traditional avenues she hit on an opportunity that was beneficial threefold; clients, providers and community. When she and the project were featured on ABC's Landline it was picked up by Helen Morton in Western Australia who developed it in Pingelly before it spread to Walpole and is now at various stages of development in many other communities.

Blue Tree for Mental Health

If you haven't met Gaye van Berkel she's on a mission to highlight the importance of mental health and has organized the painting of a tree in conjunction with the Lions Club of Lake Grace.

This is a very personal subject for Gaye who lost her son to suicide in 2017, it's a grief that will walk with her on her life's journey. Painting the tree is something that helps Gaye remember her son, but she also hopes aids those who are struggling to know that they're not alone and that there is help available for them.

The Blue Tree project was started by Kendall Whyte, a legacy for her brother Jayden who took his own life in 2018. The concept came from a trick Jayden and a friend played on Jayden's father on the family's Mukinbudin farm, painting a dead tree overnight just for the fun of it. There are now 1063 blue trees dotted across Australia and other parts of the world, acting as beacons of hope and conversation starters.

You're only allowed to paint a dead tree and the Lions have one in their rest stop that they're happy to help with giving a facelift. The busy bee will be happening on Sunday 5th November from 10:30am; so come along and help Gaye, her brother Keith Higgs and the Lions with this project. There will be a sausage sizzle for

lunch to follow for the volunteers.

Although paint is supplied, some of it by Bunnings, it would be handy if everyone could bring a brush. See you there!

Lake Grace CRC Annual Report

This is an abridged version of the annual report presented at the 2023 AGM.

Finally, we seemed to have a normal year, more activity and possibly better reporting saw our contacts increase to over 10,000 throughout the year (phone, email and walk in). With the community more confident and ready to get on with it we had no trouble meeting our funding targets.

Our staffing levels have stablised and we currently run at just under 2 FTE with 3 staff members: 1 full time and 2 part time. With the CRC having such a broad range of business activities and being involved in so many partnerships it is important that each staff member is knowledgeable of our day-to-day practices and that we have up to date organisational instructions.

At the 2022 AGM we had a youthful influx to our committee, something that any organisation would be extremely happy to have.

We have seen an increase in organizational and business memberships and the Lakes Link News may have steadied following a decline in sales and subscriptions over the last few years.

Our partnerships with other organisations continue to thrive:

- Bushcare project in conjunction with the LCDC has had its deadline extended; the Tree Walk has been endorsed by the Shire of Lake Grace. We just need signage and brochures to be completed as well as a community education workshop. There has been a resurgence in the LCDC with new members and a number of new local partnerships with NRM and local farmers.
- Roadwise have had the Driver Reviver out for the main public holidays; Christmas and Easter. A 'Moving oversize farm equipment' information was held with a good attendance of 35 from the local farming community and support industries.
- Men's Shed have progressed with their shed extension project and have acquired a further three grants totalling \$33k for the project. Another grant of \$8k was also applied for from FRRR for new equipment.
- \$1,100 was received from RSL (per Lotterywest) for the holding of our annual ANZAC Day service.
- The outdoor exercise equipment project with the Shire of Lake Grace has been completed.
- The reformatting of the local history book 'Across the Lake' is now with the designer.
- We continue to help the Shire and Lake Grace
 District High School with staffing the library 15hrs
 per week (more over the school holidays) to keep
 the doors open for maximum exposure to the
 community.

During the year 69 workshops and information sessions were held with 599 participants, of the workshops 6 were accredited with 51 participants gaining a qualification in a range of fields including Working At Heights, Working in Confined Spaces, Forklift, HR Truck and piloting. These accredited workshops ensure that local businesses are able to comply with regulatory requirements and that their staff are suitably trained.

It wasn't just all about work though with a 'What to do after an accident' workshop and SOYF information session provided by Injury Matters. Muster Dogs came to Lake Grace, a collaborative event initiated by a local fan with the CRC, P&C and Football Club coming together to manage a free public demonstration. This was followed by a four day workshop which a dozen farmers attended. IT, crochet and seniors art were some of our more social workshops focussing on community development.

We have replaced our Lakes Link News photocopier and also updated the third staff computer. Our internet service provider has changed to Starlink as we found our internet was not meeting our requirements. Office 365 and having files in the cloud is working well for us, we will be updating our digital archive in the future to make things more streamlined and easier to find. We were also successful in accessing a grant to purchase a smart screen for the seminar room, a great leap forward in technology as the previous screen was over 10 years old and not compliant with modern technology.

Money is an underlying factor for all organizations and the CRC is no different; Lake Grace CRC posted a loss of \$30,000 for 2022/23. This can be attributed to the purchase of the new Lakes Link printer, a one-off increase in IT support and services and an increase in wages due to the training of new staff. All of these factors are why the CRC ensures it has adequate funds in the bank to cover these eventualities.

Although having given us a few challenges it has been a successful year and we continue to look forward to building on our previous successes.

Kerrie's Flourishing Flowers

Local artist Kerrie Argent is one of 33 exhibiting in Rockingham City's iconic Castaways, a showcase of large outdoor sculptures set against the backdrop of the Rockingham Foreshore.

Sculptures must use recycled and repurposed materials, and must include a 30% visible aluminium component to be eligible for the Major Award. The exhibition opened on Saturday 21 October and runs until Sunday 29 October 2023.

Kerrie's piece, 'Flourish, flower, survive' is made up of five floral displays created from 100 year old recycled rabbit wire, recycled cat food tins and repurposed fabric. The focus of this work is showing how our native bush continues to flourish and flower in difficult circumstances.

Castaways started in 2008 as a community arts project to raise awareness around the discarded items or 'castaways' washing up on local beaches and has continued to expand and evolve. Today, Castaways provides an important opportunity for emerging and professional Western Australian artists, schools and local businesses to be a part of a regionally-recognised arts program that continues to promote sustainable values.

Castaways Sculpture Awards consists of three exhibitions, with a prize pool of \$27,000 (non-acquisitive):

- the Main Exhibition displayed at the Rockingham Foreshore.
- the Maquette and Small Sculpture Exhibition at the Rockingham Arts Centre. The Maquette and Small Sculpture Exhibition celebrates the intricacy of small-scale three-dimensional artworks.
- the Schools Exhibition displayed in Churchill Park. Primary and secondary schools are invited to design and create a sculpture from recycled or repurposed materials for public exhibition alongside emerging and professional artists. Broccoli and bacon salad with creamy dressing

10m prep - 05m cook - 8 servings



Tahryn Selected for Australian Masters

Congratulations to Tahryn Trevenen for being selected to play in the Australian Masters Over 40 World Cup Hockey Team; this is quite an achievement as only 17 players are chosen (only two are from WA). With Australia having more than 125,000 registered players you gain an understanding of how popular the sport is.

Hockey has been a sport of choice in Lake Grace for over 90 years and with five out of six hockey team's representative of Lake Grace winning their premierships this year it is obvious there's not just enthusiasm for the sport but also a great depth of talent.

Tahryn was eight years old when she first started playing, her first C Grade coach was Annie Mason. Growing up she loved watching the A Graders such as Lyn Carruthers and her aunt Debbie Gray play; Lake Grace won four successive premierships in the Central Great Southern Hockey Association between 1988 and 1991 so there was plenty to absorb. Ironic that Tahryn and Lyn played alongside each other in this year's Lake Grace-Pingrup premiership side.

So where did this love of hockey come from? Well it really was a family affair, her mum Vicki O'Neill-Gray played so it was always a part of her life and developed from there. Tahryn loves the close friendships that develop from team sport and says that she's been lucky enough to play in some incredible teams that have made her love hockey even more. Tahryn's aunt, Kerry O'Neill was a member of the first ever premiership team in 1968 so hockey runs deep within the family genes.

A massive inspiration for Tahryn is her sister Courtney, who has represented both WA and Australia. Even though Courtney is five years younger, Tahryn attributes Courtney's coaching and advice being instrumental to the way she herself plays and finds herself in awe of Courtney's skills on the field.

Tahryn has achieved a number of fairest and best as well as goal scoring awards over the years but declares that premierships are her favourite moments in hockey and there has been many of those. There have been three premierships while playing for UWA (2000, 2003, 2006); two with Lake Grace Hockey Club (2009, 2010); two with Mighty Ducks (2013, 2014); one with Lake Grace/Kukerin Hockey Club in 2018 and two with Lake Grace-Pingrup Hockey Club (2022, 2023).

Although all of the premierships are special Tahryn says that there are five that stand out; her Mighty Ducks games as she was playing alongside her sisters Shannan and Courtney; the 2018 effort with Lake Grace-Kukerin as Damo's team won the inaugural men's premiership and her last two as she wasn't just playing but coaching as well.

Taking part in the 2019 national championships on the Gold Coast Tahryn was elated to be selected for the 2020 World Cup in Nottingham. Her excitement turned to devastation when the event was cancelled due to COVID.

The WA 2023 over 40s team that Tahryn played in was one of her favourite teams she's ever played in, amazing

team mates with everyone playing such great hockey. From this team she was selected for the 2024 World Cup again...and is hoping that nothing will stand in the way of this attempt to put on the green and gold!

Coaches are instrumental in developing and encouraging the athletes under their care and can make or

break the desire to play. Tahryn's favourite was her Countryweek coach when she was attending Narrogin SHS, Mr O'Reilly. "He was the first coach that taught me to really work hard for a spot in a team and that not everything is just given to you. I worked my butt off to get into that team and I remember the feeling seeing my name to say I was selected. It was very rewarding and I remember him saying to me after 'you deserved that kid'".

In 30 plus years of hockey Tahryn has only had three seasons away from the game, one because she was overseas and two because she was pregnant. In 2013 and 2014 Tahryn and her sisters decided they wanted to play together again. They ended up travelling to Narrogin to play for two seasons (Mighty Ducks); Tahryn travelled from Lake Grace, Courtney travelled from Kojonup and Shannan travelled from Perth. This was a very special and successful two season of hockey for them. In 2021 all three of the sisters were selected for the WA State over 35s team but once again COVID stepped in and put a stop to the tournament.

Is the family love affair with hockey still going? Absolutely! Tahryn's three boys love their hockey (and their football) with Mum being a very nervous and excited onlooker; this year the older two, Taj and Beau were part of the junior premiership team. Although Damo jumped ship and is back playing A Grade football, he loved playing for the Souths in their 2018 and 2019 seasons. Never having played growing up it turned out he was a natural when he picked up a stick. He definitely misses playing and has made the occasional foray back on the field to play when needed.

So in another 12 months Tahryn will be tossing the work boots and hi-vis clobber to one side and heading to South Africa to play her heart out. No doubt there will be plenty of cheering and armchair umpiring all the way from Lake Grace.

Backyard Buddies: Ants in your Plants & Pavers?

Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development

Want to know what your problem ants are and how to control them? You've come to the right place.

There are thousands of ant species in Australia, and most are difficult to identify without a microscope and specialist knowledge. There are very effective baits for some species, while others require control using sprays. Other species rarely need any control and can be left alone. Unless you know the species of ant, control can be guesswork, which can waste your time and money, and involve the unnecessary use of pesticides.

By submitting samples for identification, you can learn about the species of ants at your property and how to control them, plus you'll contribute to ant surveillance in WA. Detections in recent years of exotic and problematic species such as the African black sugar ant, red imported fire ant and browsing ant, is a testament to the ability of ants to arrive in WA via freight and cargo. Their rapid detection provides the best chance of eradication and prevents the economic, social and environmental impacts caused by these ants.

For ant identification services, we request that only dead specimens are submitted. This will prevent any unintended spread of the ants, whilst keeping the postie happy!

Sampling instructions

- Brush ants into a sealed container, Ziplock bag or collect ants using the sticky side of transparent tape and fix this gently to a piece of paper.
- Place sample in the freezer for 1-2 hours to kill any live ants.
- Label samples with the collection location e.g. backyard, kitchen, bathroom, driveway etc., and include a note with your name, address, contact number and email address.
- Deliver or post to: Pest and Disease Information Service (PaDIS), Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development, 3 Baron-Hay Court, South Perth WA 6151.

Any suspected exotic ant species should be reported for biosecurity screening to the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development.

Growing Up In Katanning

State Library of Western Australia

This story is based on an interview with Althea (Dorris) Barber 1896-1990.

First came the mice plague. The mice ate their way into the flour box. They ate our clothes. They ate everything they could get to. They were ravenous. The cats hated them too. They were full up, there were too many of them.

Then came the rabbit plague. Then a terrible drought. But it was my mother's ill health that finally drove us to sell our farm in South Australia and go West in 1903.

My father went ahead with a team of horses and a cow. Tragically though, one of the horses died of seasickness and the frightened cow fell over the side of the jetty in Albany and drowned.

We followed on the SS Bombala nine months later but even travelling first class did not spare us from suffering terrible sea sickness on the rough seas. They used to say in those days that if you could get across the Great Australian Bight without being seasick, you'd make a wonderful sailor.

From Albany, we took the eight-hour train trip to Katanning. It was slow, the carriages were like little dog boxes, and the seats were hard and uncomfortable. As we journeyed into the night, the guard walked along the train's roof lighting the kerosene lamps in the ceiling, but they were so dim that in most carriages passengers could barely see.

We arrived at Ewlyamartup, nine miles out of Katanning, where we were greeted by a temporary iron house lined with hessian. Inside my father had pinned beautiful everlastings onto the wall made into big letters saying "WELCOME TO" in pink and "WA" in yellow.

The farm was on virgin land and I loved it from the start. I would sometimes go out with a little tomahawk (miniature axe) and ringbark the sheoaks and little trees.

I attended the local school and to get there we would walk up a little bush track hemmed with wildflowers, lovely trees, and everlastings. Before then I'd never seen children going barefooted and I thought it was wonderful.

There were twelve children in my classroom (aged 7-14 years), including Aboriginal children. We all played and studied happily together. At lunch, I would take out my little square tin with painted violets on it. Inside would be a piece of cake, biscuits, fruit (if there was any about) and sandwiches. They were happy days.

We moved to Katanning in 1904 which at the time was just a little mushroom town growing up. Katanning school seemed huge and terribly frightening and the teachers were very strict, too strict. I used to get the cane twice a day without fail.

One morning in 1908 Katanning woke to a huge commotion - bells ringing, church bells ringing, all sorts

of noise, and people running around and calling out. Austral Terrace was all in flames and all the buildings were burnt down. But it wasn't too long until bigger and better shops were built. Also a nice footpath, hitching rails for the horses, and a large general store.

After five years at Katanning school, I had become a bundle of nerves, so I went to stay with my grandparents. Then briefly went to Methodist Ladies College in Perth to 'polish me off a little bit'. I learned here that if you wore good, well-polished shoes and good gloves, it showed that you were a lady. Oh, and a hat, you always had to wear a hat.

I returned to Katanning to help Mother. I played piano at the local roller skating rink. I was also an accomplished rider, once winning the Ladies Hack in the Royal Perth Show.

I was cleaning the brass door handles, polishing floors, and scrubbing the kitchen at the Green's residence when war was declared. The butcher came around and told me.

Nearly all of the boys in Katanning enlisted. It was a sad time and sometimes it would take six weeks after a boy was killed, to learn that they were gone. It would appear in the newspapers, or the local church ministers would

be notified and break the news gently to the family. The girls used to still go to dances and dance with each other.

My first formal dance was with Harold Piesse, a stout chap of 35 years from a prominent family in the district. My father was proud of that. There was no alcohol served until after the war and boys were decent and respectful.

A 'date' in those days might include going to the pictures with supper to follow – mostly poached eggs on toast. The boy always paid. The most that would happen was a kiss goodnight, and then only if you were very much in love or engaged. Even standing at the gate with a boy for more than five minutes in those days was unheard of.

When the war was over, Katanning went mad and every soldier, including my future husband Alan, was given a reception in the town hall. After that we never talked about the war, none of them did. I think it was just a terribly cold, awful page that they wanted to close up forever.

Save With Free Waterwise Offers

Residents of 21 Great Southern communities can now take advantage of free water-saving offers as part of Water Corporation's 2023-24 Waterwise Towns Program, which saved more than three million litres of water across the region last year.

The annual program, which is available in a record 47 communities State-wide, provides tailored offers to help regional Western Australians reduce water use and lower their bills.

Water Corporation customers in each eligible Great Southern community can now exchange two old, inefficient showerheads for waterwise alternatives under a free Showerhead Swap program.

In addition, residents in each participating town will be able to claim a rebate for the purchase of a new rainwater tank, or to plumb in or replace an existing tank.

Those in Esperance and Albany will also benefit from comparative water use showing how their consumption compares to others.

Since 2013, the Waterwise Towns Program has saved 1.8 billion litres of scheme water State-wide, helping support the long-term security of WA's most valuable resource.

Plumbing and irrigation services are limited, with registrations open until 1 May 2024, unless allocations are exhausted earlier. Showerhead Swap is available until 31 May 2024, while stocks last.






