Well Done Lake Grace - You Have Done us Proud

We have just experienced the best farm production growing season in the history of our district with 312,000 tonnes of grain being delivered to the Lake Grace CBH site. Up from 295,000 tonnes in 2021.

To put that into perspective, after one of the lowest district growing season rainfall seasons ever recorded (1914) courtesy of Robert Carruthers Snr, the 1915 season was a bumper production year for the 10 or so farmers who had cleared land since settlement in 1911-12. It was reported that 30,000 bags were delivered in the district. 10,000 bags were delivered to Neendalling on the West side of the lake which was the designated townsite for the area at that time and approved delivery point for the wheat dump for the Lake Grace area. Neendalling was proving to be problematic for most of the farmers South of where the Lake Grace townsite now stands as the wheat had to be carted on horse drawn wagons around the North of the Lake past Bennett's farm and then down to Neendalling. The nearest railhead at the time was at Kukerin and the rail line was planned to come to Neendalling during 1916.

The local farmers took a delegation to the state government seeking an extension of the proposed rail line to cross the lake to a location on the Carruthers farm where Lake Grace town now stands. Permission was granted and another 20,000 bags were delivered to the wheat stack at the Carruthers farm. The rail line was completed during June 1916 and fortunately for the farmers all of the wheat had been purchased by a Grain Trading agent in Wagin so the farmers received their money prior to that date.

The total of the 30,000 bags equals 2,500 tonnes, so we have certainly come a long way since 1915 (107 years) with the full development of the district.

Lake Grace has been fortunate geographically as time passed, being located mid point on the East-West Perth to Esperance route which developed during the 1960's and the North-South Albany Wave Rock tourist route.

However, we must congratulate our forefathers for their progressive actions in forming a local Co-Operative in the 1920's to provide grocery, hardware, drapery, garage, Ford dealership, Mobil fuel depot, tyre service and Wesfarmers agency to service our local residents. This was followed by the provision of an Inland Mission Hospital, doctor, recreation facilities and district Police Station. All of this attracted a hotel and many other businesses to compliment what had been achieved prior.

It is also interesting to note that Lake Grace was predominantly settled by immigrants from Great Britain following a Western Australian government promotion of new farmland available in WA. This was in contrast to some neighbouring districts which were settled by families moving East from the Great Southern line (ie Katanning and Narrogin).

When The Great Depression hit in 1929-39 a lot of the new farmers from the neighbouring districts simply went back to where their families were in the Great Southern.

The Lake Grace farmers had nowhere to go having emigrated so they toughed it out, even to the extent of building our town hall in 1932 despite some controversy about the cost, just to demonstrate that "we are not moving anywhere else".

Since then over the past 70 odd years with the development of the remainder of the farmland in the district, Lake Grace has become a small regional centre servicing the South East agricultural area with a full suite of vital services for some 100 Kilometers radius.

Lake Grace will continue to be the vibrant prominent service provider for the region in the future providing that we continue to support our local businesses.

Finally, none of this vibrancy occurs without the support and involvement of all of our residents who make up the fabric of our success and without whom none of this could have been achieved.



Noisy Neighbours

Noise from your surroundings is a part of communal living however unwanted and loud noise can impact on your relationship with your neighbours. Noise is classified as unwanted sound, which among other things can be disruptive, causing loss of sleep, interference to activities and emotional stress. The Environmental Protection (Noise) Regulations 1997 protects Shire residents from the stress and irritation caused by unreasonable noise from parties, music, construction, specialised equipment and other sources.

When is noise unreasonable?

The Environmental Protection (Noise) Regulations 1997

set different permitted levels depending on the time of day. The legislation does however also create a number of exemptions for certain activities if they are done in accordance with set conditions. Noise which is emitted in excess of the permitted levels or not in accordance with an exemption is deemed to be unreasonable. As a guide, noise which is clearly audible at a residential boundary may exceed the permitted level.

Equipment used on residential premises

Some types of noisy equipment used in residential premises is able to exceed allowable noise levels provided they are used in a reasonable manner for no

Noise Exemptions	Restrictions
Music (and other sound amplifying equipment)	Can only be played (audible to neighbours) between 7am-7pm, Monday to Saturday. Permitted from 9am-7pm on Sundays and Public holidays.
Musical Instruments	To be used for an hour per day between 7.00am and 7.00pm – Monday to Saturday and between 9.00am and 7.00pm on Sunday and public holidays.
Specified Equipment	Hand-operated equipment can be used for up to two hours (accumulative) on any one day between the hours of:
(e.g. gardening tools, lawn mower)	7am–7pm, Monday to Saturday
	9am–7pm, Sundays or public holidays.
	These restrictions do not apply to a construction site. Specific equipment or activities usually associated with a commercial operation are not deemed as reasonable use at a residential property and would need to comply with the noise limits at all times.
Party noise	Music noise from a party will generally exceed permitted noise levels. Neighbours, in most cases, will tolerate 'one off parties' especially if you advise them beforehand of:
	The date of the party (neighbours may wish to make alternative arrangements).
	The time you switch off or turn down the music
	Phone number of party organiser to call if the situation becomes unbearable.
	• Limit your use of outdoor speakers, direct the speakers away from neighbours' houses, keep the bass low, and move the party indoors, closing windows and doors, if it goes late into the night.

NOISE	Tips:
	 Use tools out of direct sight to neighbours windows and doors, such as behind barriers.
	Avoid using tools early in the morning and late in the evening
	 If using a piece of equipment repeatedly, try to do so in block periods. e.g. if using a power saw, measure a number of pieces timber and cut them all at the same time rather than measuring and cutting each piece separately.
	If undertaking renovations, inform your neighbours of the likely timeframe.

Book Review: State of Terror by Louise Penny and Hillary Rodham Clinton



STATION NEWS

We've had a few occasions recently where people were reported missing. It's a good time to remind everyone of the website; Safe and Found WA. Safe and Found WA is an initiative introduced by Western Australia Police Force (WA Police Force) and Australia Medic Alert Foundation.

Safe and Found supports people living with dementia, autism or a cognitive impairment who might be at risk of becoming lost or reported as missing, by ensuring Police have immediate access to critical information to assist when undertaking search operations.

A detailed profile outlining the persons personal history and characteristics is completed ahead of time, and kept securely along with a recent photo, on the Safe and Found database for Police to access immediately if they go missing.

We cannot stress enough how valuable this information is to police and has already assisted in locating hundreds of people. A person does not have to have ever been reported missing, only have the potential to do so.

CRIME NEWS

We've had several burglaries reported in the last fortnight. It seems someone has been busy as Kulin, Dumbleyung and Corrigin also had similar MO burglaries reported. Unknown suspects entered and searched lone farm houses on properties off the beaten track. On most occasions they searched sheds and outbuildings but also broke into abandoned or vacant homes.

We're currently working with the detectives on these investigations and have some forensic leads we are following up.

TRAFFIC NEWS

We have had a surprising amount of crashes recently. Thankfully no one has been seriously injured.



You may have seen what's left of a Hyundai between Lake Grace and Newdegate. The driver was very lucky to have gotten away without serious injury after the vehicle left the road and rolled. He was left with nasty concussion and no memory of the crash.



In another crash, the driver by pure luck, went in between two trees, either of which would have led to a much worse result. He escaped with very minor injuries.

In a slight plot twist, this driver happened to have stolen the vehicle. In an attempt to hide evidence of his crime he piled tree branches on the vehicle after the crash



and set the whole thing ablaze.

Now a fire normally attracts the attention of people and this occasion was no different. With the help of witnesses' police were directed to the male and he was arrested attempting to flee the area. He was charged with Stealing and No Authority To Drive.

Our biggest month to date was October 2022 when we processed 188,094 items, compared with 127,146 October 2021 and 83,445 October 2020.

In January 2023 we processed 159,982, compared with 156,386 January 2022 and 99,885 in January 2021.

In December 2022 we processed 168,114, December 2021 we processed 128,499 and 79,248 items were processed in December 2020.

So not everyone is a numbers nerd like me, but what this all means is that there is no sign of slowing down, all the numbers are going up and that's all thanks to you.

The only numbers going down are the numbers going to landfill and that's a really good thing,

Well done all you container savers, you have stopped 3,484,036 items from going in to land fill and at the same time put \$348,403.60 back in to the community





Record-breaking Scam Losses & Victims in WA

WA ScamNet has released a 2022 scam report, with 1,203 people reporting combined losses of \$15,988,513 - a seven per cent increase on 2021's recorded losses and recorded amount of victims.

The report reveals online shopping and classified scams claimed the most victims.

274 online shoppers lost a total of \$876,774, with 270 buyers and sellers on classified sites losing a total of \$564,680 - likely due to COVID-19 reaching its peak in WA and the need to isolate at home.

The top two scams reported to the Consumer Protection Contact Centre were the Amazon phishing scam - an SMS, email or phone call about an undelivered package or item supposedly being held at a distribution centre, and the cryptocurrency investment scam.

Scams relating to the myGov phishing scam increased by 2,650 per cent from two enquiries in 2021 to 55 in 2022. In most cases, the scammers attempted to gain access to consumers' banking details by claiming the consumers were entitled to a refund.

Investment scams, mainly involving crypto currencies, were to blame for \$6,980,254 in losses, while \$2,871,468 was lost to dating/romance scams - with one individual losing \$800,000.

The disturbing 'Hi Mum/Dad' text scam tricked 59 victims into paying \$265,353 with criminals posing as desperate children needing urgent financial assistance from their parents.

The Australian Competition and Consumer Commission has reported that annual scam losses nationally are at least \$2 billion and could be as high as \$4 billion. Alarmingly, a survey has indicated that only about 13 per cent of scam losses are reported to authorities, indicating that these figures are only the tip of the iceberg.

Scammers are getting smarter and scams are getting harder to spot so consumers need to be even more vigilant with all communication online and over the phone.

With every phone call, text message or email it's important practice to pause... and think, could this be a scam? If it is too good to be true, it probably is. Keep your personal information safe and only give it out once you have verified the legitimacy of the request through your own research.

Australia's Climate in 2022: Wetter and warmer than average overall

Bureau of Meteorology

The Bureau of Meteorology has released its official record of Australia's climate and notable weather events for 2022. The <u>Annual Climate Statement for 2022</u> includes a full analysis and description of last year's rainfall, temperature, water resources, climate influences and more.

The report shows 2022 was a warm and wet year for most of Australia.

Australia's national mean temperature was 0.50 °C warmer than the 1961–1990 average, making 2022 the 22nd-warmest year on record (equal with 2006) since national temperature records began in 1910.

Annual maximum temperatures were above average for most of northern Australia, Tasmania and parts of the west coast but below average for New South Wales, southern Queensland and parts of South Australia.

Annual minimum temperatures were above or very much above average for most of Australia.

National rainfall was 26% above the 1961–1990 annual average making 2022 the ninth-wettest year on record since 1900.

Rainfall was very much above average for the southeastern quarter of the mainland, where persistent rain saw significant flooding affecting large areas, multiple times during the year.

Spring in 2022 was the second-wettest on record for Australia, and the wettest on record for the Murray—Darling Basin, for New South Wales and for Victoria.

Rainfall was below average for western Tasmania, much of the north of the Northern Territory, and the far southwest of Western Australia.

Water storage levels have been high across much of Australia during 2022, although some storages were still low for parts of central coast Queensland, western Tasmania, south-east New South Wales and western Victoria.

The high rainfall experienced across much of eastern Australia was consistent with a wet phase of natural climate variability for our region – namely a La Niña, a negative Indian Ocean Dipole in winter and spring, and a persistently positive phase of the Southern Annular Mode from mid-autumn.

The 2022–23 La Niña has been the third in a row. It is only the fourth time 3 La Niña events in a row have been observed in the Bureau record since 1900 (others were 1954–57, 1973–76 and 1998–2001).

The Bureau's official annual record of climate can be used by governments, businesses and communities to better understand the weather events that impacted them over the calendar year. More information is available in the Annual Climate Statement 2022 on the Bureau's website.

Further information about the impact of long-term climate trends is available in the <u>State of the Climate 2022</u> released by the Bureau and CSIRO in November 2022.

New South Wales and the ACT

- •NSW overall had 863.6 mm rainfall in 2022, as an area average across the state, which is 55% above the 1961–1990 average for New South Wales.
- •It was the second wettest year on record for NSW after 1950, where there was 916.5 mm rainfall.
- •The average temperature was 0.13 °C warmer than the 1961–1990 average, while also being the coolest year for NSW overall since 1996.
- •2022 was Sydney's wettest year on record (since 1858) with 2,530 mm rainfall, 121% above average. The previous record was 2,110.5 mm in 1860.
- •Canberra had its seventh wettest year on record (since 1939) with 892.4 mm rainfall, 43% above average.

Victoria

- •Victoria overall had 873.1 mm rainfall in 2022, as an area average across the state, which is 32% above average.
- •It was the fifth-wettest year on record and the state's highest rainfall since 1974.
- •The average temperature was 0.45 °C warmer than the 1961–1990 average for Victoria.
- •Melbourne had 699.4 mm rainfall in 2022.

Queensland

- •Queensland overall had 778.1 mm rainfall in 2022, as an area average across the state, which is 25% above average and the state's highest rainfall since 2011.
- •The average temperature was 0.73 °C warmer than the 1961–1990 average for Queensland, while also being the coolest year for Qld overall since 2012.
- •Brisbane had its fifth-wettest year on record since 1840, with 2,037 mm rainfall, 91% above average and the wettest year since 1974.

South Australia

- •South Australia overall had 310.8 mm rainfall in 2022, as an area average across the state, which is 39% above the 1961-1990 average and the state's highest rainfall since 2016.
- •The average temperature was 0.15 °C warmer than the 1961–1990 average for South Australia, while also being the state's coolest year overall since 2010.
- •Adelaide had 612.4 mm rainfall in 2022, 13% above average.

Tasmania

Australia's Climate in 2022 (cont.)

- •Tasmania overall had 1,321.6 mm rainfall in 2022, as an area average across the state, which is 3% below average.
- •2022 was Tasmania's equal-tenth warmest year on record (equal with 2005).
- •The average temperature was 0.57 °C warmer than the 1961–1990 average for Tasmania.
- •Hobart had 700 mm rainfall in 2022, 14% above average.

Western Australia

- •Western Australia overall had 417.1 mm of rainfall in 2022, as an area average across the state, which is 22% above average and the state's highest rainfall since 2017.
- •The average temperature was 0.50 °C warmer than the 1961–1990 average for Western Australia.
- •Perth had 701.6 mm rainfall in 2022, which is 5% below average.

Northern Territory

•The Northern Territory overall had 613.2 mm of rainfall in 2022, as an area average across the Territory, which is 12% above average.

- •The average temperature was 0.69 °C warmer than the 1961–1990 average for the Territory.
- •Darwin had 1,972.2 mm rainfall in 2022, which is 8% above average and the wettest since 2017.



Cuballing got off to a fast start scoring freely. After strong opening partnerships between the Cuby openers Mitch found a breakthrough.


