It's an exciting year ahead for the Lake Grace Gymnastics Club and has started off with lots of energy as the students enjoy their time on the mat. The Gym has a capacity of 44 students with 3 coaches, Sarah Clarke, Tahlia Willock, and Lauren Duckworth continuing this year, meaning more hands to support, teach and guide the students through the movements. As most of the sessions are full this term, this is a record number of students for the Club since starting back up last year.

Coaches Sarah and Tahlia have been busy preparing for the season and have successfully qualified in both Women's Artistic Gymnastics (WAG) and Men's Artistic Gymnastics (MAG) as of November 2022. They have also completed their Supervisor Certificates allowing them to take on anyone interested in being a coach and be trained in all things Gymnastics. More coaches are always welcome.

In September this year, there is a goal to have a team of boys and girls from Lake Grace Gym Club to head to the Katanning Gymnastics competition. The Katanning competition is an opportunity for the Lake Grace gymnasts to experience competition in the region, offering skills to be judged from Level 1. As the State Competitions start at a Level 3, this means there is limited exposure to competitions at the lower levels of the sport.

The Girl's competition will include a Floor Routine, Uneven Bars, Beam and a Vault. Boys will participate in a Floor Routine, High Bars, Vault, Pommel, Parallel Bars along with a routine on the Rings. With the competition being over one Saturday late in September, we will have athletes competing at Level 1,2 & 3 in the girls and Levels 1 & 2 in the boys and a great opportunity to experience.

# Walking up to 20kms a day - Our Ancestors & Exercise

Our ancestors were used to walking up to 20 kilometres Exercise options are endless, swimming, per day, they had to, to survive on the Savannah Plains and the Serengeti or they would end up as someone's lunch. We are not designed for sitting around and not exercising. The human body has not had millions of years to adapt to our sedentary lifestyle and we need to change our habits before it is too late.

Blokes have had a significant change because many of the work tasks that have always been manually done are now obsolete or automated.

Exercise is essential for our brain, mind, body and our cardiovascular health. I read a book titled Brain Rules by John Medina and rule 1 (out of 12 brain rules) is exercise boosts brain power. An enlightening read.

There are a lot of variables, from nurture to nature, that help how we age but one of the greatest predictors of successful ageing is the absence of a sedentary lifestyle. Industrialization has given us many benefits, but it has also meant, that for most of us, we have gradually quit moving. The result of this is more and more Australians are being classified as being overweight, with the fastest growing chronic condition in Australia in 2022 being Type 2 Diabetes.

There is a lot of current research that suggests exercise can:

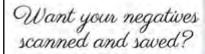
- help prevent Type 2 Diabetes (by up to 60%);
- improve our cardiovascular health thus decreasing the risk of strokes and heart attacks;
- affect the outcome of both anxiety and depression. The fact that exercise helps regulate the release of chemicals (serotonin, dopamine, and norepinephrine) into our bodies makes it an important element in maintaining the right balance;
- halve the risk of general dementia through aerobic exercise, just twice a week. It can also cut the risk of Alzheimer's by 60%.

So, what does this all mean for our exercise regime? There is a lot of advice around with different suggestions on exercise requirements. This varies from 5 minutes high intensity, to 30 minutes per day, to 1 hour a day every second day. We are the only one that knows our body's physiology and what will ultimately work for us. A guide is a minimum of 150 minutes per week of moderate exercise.

If you are limited in how you can exercise you can still make a difference. If you can physically walk only 50 metres a day, double it! Walking 100 metres per day compared to 50 metres can make a difference. The improvement in your body's physiology will be profound and the positive effect is that starting with a little bit of exercise will make you want to move more.

hydrotherapy, light gym work, walking groups, belonging to sporting groups, volunteering. Although in regional WA sometimes these options can be limited for people to access.

Don't let it stop you exercising – get moving!

# Book Review: Day's End by Garry Disher

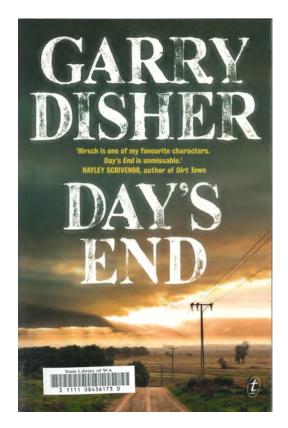
This is the fourth book in the Hirsch series and is just as enjoyable as the previous three. A copper in a small rural town, Hirsch see's the idiosyncrasies of small town life; the highs and lows and the toll that life can take on those who have little prospect while having a heart warming response to those who fight back.

Hirsch's rural beat is wide. Daybreak to day's end, dirt roads and dust. Every problem that besets small towns and isolated properties, from unlicensed driving to arson. In the time of the virus, Hirsch is seeing stresses heightened and social divisions cracking wide open. His own tolerance under strain; people getting close to the edge.

Today he's driving an international visitor around: Janne Van Sant, whose backpacker son went missing while the borders were closed. They're checking out his last photo site, his last employer. A feeling that the stories don't quite add up.

Then a call comes in: a roadside fire. Nothing much - a suitcase soaked in diesel and set alight. But two noteworthy facts emerge. Janne knows more than Hirsch about forensic evidence. And the body in the suitcase is not her son's.

# Irish Pork Stew with Stout and Caraway Seeds

6-8 servings

Ingredients

2kg bone-in pork shoulder blade steak (or about 1 and a half kilo of cubed meat plus bones)

1/4 cup plain flour

21/2 teaspoons salt

2 teaspoons freshly ground black pepper

3 tablespoons canola oil

3 medium yellow onions, chopped

250gm brown mushrooms, quartered

1 1/2 teaspoons caraway seeds,

11/2 cups Irish Stout or other dark beer

11/2 cups water

2 bay leaves,

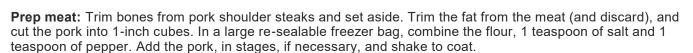
4 carrots, peeled and sliced about 1/4-inch thick

250gm baby Yukon Gold or small red potatoes, quartered

1/4 cup chopped Italian flat leaf parsley

Method:

Heat oven to 300 degrees.



**Saute pork:** Heat 1 tablespoon oil in a large ovenproof Dutch oven over medium-high heat until shimmering. Add half of the meat to the pot so it covers the bottom of the pot evenly and cook for 2-3 minutes before moving so that the sides brown nicely for a total of about 8-10 minutes. Transfer the meat to a bowl, add another tablespoon of oil to the pot and finish browning the rest of the meat then transfer that to the bowl as well.

**Saute veggies:** Reduce heat to medium and add the last tablespoon of oil to the Dutch oven and heat until it's shimmering. Add the onion and mushrooms and cook until the vegetables just begin to soften, about 3 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add the caraway seeds and the 11/2 teaspoons of salt and 1 teaspoon of pepper and cook for another 2 minutes or so.

**Assembly:** Add the raw pork bones to the Dutch Oven and top with the cooked pork chunks. Add the Irish Stout, water and bay leaves then raise the heat and bring to a boil, and stir and scrape any browned bits from the bottom of the pot.

**Bake:** Cover Dutch oven with the lid and transfer to oven to cook for 1 hour. Remove pot from the oven, give it a stir if you'd like, and add the carrots and potatoes, cover again and put back in the oven for another 1 to 11/2 hours until the carrots and potatoes are cooked through and the sauce has thickened.

**Finish:** Remove pot from the oven and the remove the bones from the stew. Add the parsley and stir everything together, taste for seasoning and add more salt or pepper if needed.



# School "Oval Greenification" Project

The students at Lake Grace District High School have for many years played on a brown oval with patchy green areas, in the summer due to a lack of water supply and reticulation on the school grounds. The huge project to give the students an annual green oval through the "Oval Greenification Project" has been underway with the tank installed over the last couple of weeks.

With the School Board putting forward the proposal, and support from the School P & C and other grants sourced from outside the school, it has been a Lake Grace Community effort to install the tank to date. Thanks to the School Board, P & C Association, McKenzie Concreting Co. (organizing of installation of pad and tank, donating of their time and equipment), Price's Fabrication & Steel (supplied and installed tank), Greg Carruthers (donation of sand, time and equipment), and Fyfe Transport (donation of water, truck and Liam Fyfe's time to fill the tank), the project is well under way towards completion.

More is still to be done with the reticulation to be installed in the near future but it is exciting progress hidden away at the back of the school. A big thank you to all involved as the students will enjoy green grass for years to come.

With countries around the world in such a turmoil. The war between Russia and Ukraine, the devastating earthquake in Turkey, the cyclones ravaging New Zealand, and the humiliating defeat of the Australian cricket team in India in the first two tests. It's good we can turn our thoughts to the happy good News events reported on this good news page. So read on McDuff.

Small town cancels NYE fireworks so walrus can sleep peacefully in harbour.

The Walrus has drawn huge crowds to Scarborough since being spotted on New Year's Eve, the BBC reported. Local wildlife experts have asked people not to disturb the creature who has been gradually making his way up to the East coast and coming ashore at various beaches. Thor was spotted on the Hampshire coastline earlier this month. Scarborough's New Year's fireworks display was cancelled out of concern for Thor. The council cancelled the show on the advice of the British Divers Marine Life Rescue who said that the creature needs to rest and recuperate before he continues his journey. "I was going down to my boat and there it was on the slipway. Magnificent. Its's got to be half a ton" said Stuart Ford who runs the Sealife Safari boat tour in Scarborough. "I think it's a once in a lifetime, first ever thing in Scarborough to see."

An anonymous man walked into the Turkish embassy and donated 30 Million dollars to earthquake victims in Turkiye & Syria. Deeply moved by the example of an anonymous Pakistani's donation, the prime minister tweeted. "These are such glorious acts of philanthropy that enable humanity to triumph over the seemingly insurmountable odds."

Turkeys ambassador to Washington DC, Murat Mercan, confirmed the contribution to the earthquake aid campaign launched in the US. Anadollu Agency, one of Turkey's state-run media channels, also confirmed the news.

Meet the 90-year-old woodcutter who built his own hobby house. Great Grandad Stuart Grant,89, moved into the cottage he bought as a wreck with no roof and no doors in 1984.

But he found it so satisfying doing work on the quirky outbuilding which dated back 20 years, that he decided to make it his home. He has been inundated with visitors to his home in Tomich, near Inverness, after his house was posted on a French tourist board's recommendations for north Scotland – with visitors comparing it to the hobbit homes from Lord of the rings.

"I haven't watched Lord of the rings, Stuart confessed. "It's just coincidence that my front door is almost the same shape and same kind of wood, oak, I said' Why are all these French people coming?', they said 'here's a tourist bard telling people one of the things to do in the north of Scotland is visit the Hobbit house." Stuart doesn't have a mobile phone or use the internet and no longer drives due to his age, but he loves meeting people. Stuart said he cut all the wood himself from

fallen trees and collected stones from the river for the stonework, "I'll be 90 in less than two weeks but I feel like a teenager." He said "You get a real buzz out of doing interesting stuff."

Couple Married 72 years renew vows this Valentine's Day. Monty, 93 and Alice,91, held the vowel renewal with family and friends on Tuesday at their home in Jericho, NY. Monty and Alice actually met at a Valentines day party in their Bronx neighbourhood in 1948. They tied the knot on February 4<sup>th</sup> 1951. #### **STATION NEWS**

We've had a lot of phone calls about the prohibited firearms buyback scheme. There is a list of firearms and ammunition online which will now be prohibited. Approximately 240 people across the state will be affected by this legislation change. These people will be contacted by police directly and reimbursed for all costs of any items that are now prohibited. If you have any queries about the buyback feel free to contact us here at the station.

#### **CRIME NEWS**

We continued to have reports of burglaries on vacant properties. They have now moved into the Lake Grace township. The suspect/s are forcing their way into vacant properties via doors and broken windows. We ask that you report any suspicious people or behaviour to police immediately. Keep a particular eye on properties in your area, if anything seems out of place let us know.

Here's a few bits of burglary prevention advice:

- Burglars don't want to draw attention to themselves, which is why installing a loud, alarmed security system may deter burglars. You can also opt for monitored alarm systems, which alert the local police station when it goes off. If you do install a burglar alarm, add generic security signs or stickers to deter burglars. But don't put a sticker specifying the type of security system you have installed (e.g. "This home is protected by an XYZ security system"); this makes it easier for thieves with the know-how to disable your security devices.
- Motion activated spotlights work in the same way, drawing attention to burglars.
- A security camera may be an effective solution to help secure your home. CCTV or video surveillance is now a relatively affordable option for the average homeowner, and you can even install a video doorbell to your front door. Systems range in complexity and cost, but they offer homeowners security too – particularly while away from home or on extended holidays. No thief wants to be captured on camera.
- Some homes are built with hollow core doors.
   These doors are easily kicked in, so replace exterior hollow core doors with solid wood or metal doors. It's also a good idea to install lockable security screens and make sure the security film is made from a good quality material that can't be

cut (e.g. woven stainless-steel mesh).

 If you have sliding doors or windows without any locks, use a window bar or cut pieces of wooden dowel to secure these from being forced open. Alternatively, install windows that open no more than 20cm to minimise the chances of someone crawling through it. Adding security measures like bars over the window can prevent people from crawling in.

#### **TRAFFIC NEWS**

In case you've missed it there are currently roadworks in the Lake Grace area. We've spoken to the supervisors at the sites and these will be in place for several more weeks.

When approaching roadworks there are temporary speed signs in place lowering the speed limited to a new posted amount. These speeds are not a suggestion and are the lawful speed limit. The speed limits stay in place for the duration the signs are up, sometimes 24 hours a day. We've had several reports from the crews working on the road of vehicles speeding. In one incident a truck and trailer ran a red light, travelling against the traffic flow on the single open lane. A car travelling in the lane, had right of way, and was forced off the road by the truck. Thankfully no one was injured. We have the registration of the truck and are following up with the owner.

We will be patrolling these work zones and enforcing the new speed limits to ensure the road crews safety.

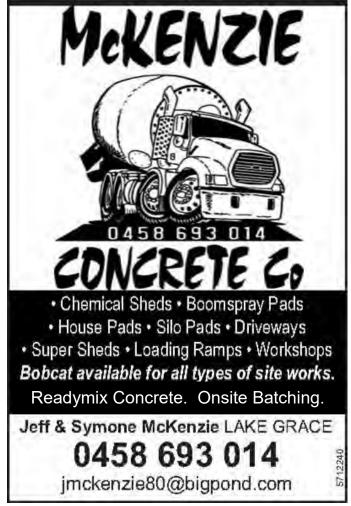

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# Fires February 2023

It has been a busy month for the Shire of Lake Grace and surrounds with multiple fires, with the last week of February stepping it up a notch for some.

Tuesday 21<sup>st</sup> February was officially the hottest and windiest day of the 2022/23 in Lake Grace townsite according to the Bureau of Meteorology's reports. With such a mild weather for most of this summer and minimal days over 40°C, it was a bit of a shock to the system as it reached a top of 40.3°C in the afternoon but with wind gusts up to 59km/h from the north at 9:33am and a temperature of 32.7°C by 9am. It was a hot and dusty day in Lake Grace and I hope your house was locked up!

Although it didn't rain here in Lake Grace on that Tuesday, the start of the fires happened on Tuesday afternoon with lightening strikes to the East in Lake King. Further southeast, Ravensthorpe battled concurrent fires on Tuesday with several joining up to form large fires. Shire of Lake Grace Bush Fire Service volunteers from Lake King, Mount Madden, Dunn Rock and Varley responded to the call to support Ravensthorpe, with crews turning out to the Edwards fire burning in West River.

Then Thursday 23<sup>rd</sup> brought us a cold change of 23.9°C and winds from the south. The morning mist/drizzle (aka mizzle) and reports of power loss had people on the lookout for pole top fires. This day saw 11 pole top fires in the Shire of Lake Grace alone. Reported fires were at:

Magee Road, North Lake Grace

Kuender Road, North Lake Grace

Mallee Hill Road, Mallee Hill

Pingrup-Lake Grace Road, South Lake Grace

Burngup Road South, Beenong

Brookfield Road, South Lake Grace

Kathleen Road, Lake King

Rodger Road, Lake Biddy

Buniche Road, Lake Biddy

Fourteen Mile Road, Mallee Hill

Pingaring-Varley Road, Pingaring

There were also pole top fires reported in surrounding areas including the Shire of Kent, Shire of Kulin and Shire of Dumbleyung

According to Western Power, pole top fires are caused "when there is a run of very hot, dry and windy days followed by a sudden misty, cold front. Humidity and light rain can combine with dust built up on insulators, resulting in tracks of dirt that can allow electricity to spark, in some cases eventually resulting in metal fixtures heating to a point that causes a fire." For Lake Grace there were a few more than "some" pole top fires on Thursday and many were without power with over 360 people affected into the following days.

The Lake Grace and surrounds community pulled

together again and most of the pole top fires reported were extinguished before the end of the day.

This event follows a similar day with 8 pole top fires reported, with 17 pole tops damaged that Western Power located, so it was not the first time that residents have had to wait for Western Power to come out, resolve power and install new poles after fire crews have put out the fires. It is a frustrating event that happens when the weather cools after a warm day and has become more common in recent times according to reports.

# Community Emergency Service

Fire Season Catchup – We saw our usual fires over harvest with a number caused by mechanical issues and a few electrical faults as well as rock strikes. As we moved through summer the lightning strikes started with the Shire largely missing out on the ignition of any majors fire. With the Shire's support I participate on the State Pre-Formed Team roster, which brings together a team of emergency services personnel to support large incidents. This year has seen support to the Kimberley following Ex-TC Ellie (TL06U), the Avon Valley fires and the Hamersley Drive Fire (Fitzgerald NP/Hopetoun). Closer to home the Shire of Lake Grace sent a Task Force of resources from the east down to support the Shire of Ravensthorpe with the Edwards Farm fire in West River, just across our southern boundary.

Additionally, we have noted another exceptionally high occurrence of pole top fires this season with 19 being reported to 000, and approximately 9 additional damaged poles identified by Western Power in their follow-up. Understandably there is increasing frustration being expressed by the community from this impost to their time and availability to power. The local Chief Bush Fire

Control Officers have been

discussing ways to move forward, applying pressure to Western Power to remediate this issue. We will investigate avenues available through the Shire to support this cause.

Finally, I would like to say thank you to those who have been reporting fires to 000. By doing this it accelerates our ability to mobilise and support incidents within the Shire. Remember, when you call 000 for FIRE, your message is passed on to the local CBFCO and decisions about response are managed locally.

# WHS—The Elephant in the Room

If you're a business owner, it's important to understand your obligations to provide a safe and healthy workplace. This includes keeping up with changes to health and safety legislation.

The Department of Mines, Industry Regulation and Safety has introduced <u>new Work Health and Safety</u> (WHS) laws for Western Australia.

Here are seven things to know about the new WHS laws and how they could impact your business.

#### 1. WHS is the new OSH

The previous laws around occupational safety and health, or 'OSH' as many of us know it, have been around for decades. The 'OSH Act' was first introduced in 1984 and has been supported by other legislation around specific health and safety measures related to mines and petroleum.

The Work Health and Safety Act 2020 ('WHS Act') will replace all of these and bring WA workplaces under a single WHS Act from March 2022.

#### 2. You could be a PCBU

The WHS Act introduces a definition of the 'person conducting a business or undertaking' - or PCBU. A PCBU can be:



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- a sole trader (for example, a self-employed person)
- each partner within a partnership
- a company
- an unincorporated association
- a government department of public authority (including a municipal council)

If you're a business owner, you could be a PCBU as an individual. If you run your business as part of a business partnership, you could each be individually and collectively a PCBU. Larger corporations and organisations will have what's known as officers of the PCBU.

#### 3. The PCBU has the primary duty of care

Under the OSH Act, duty of care was largely based around the employer-employee relationship.

Under the WHS Act, all PCBUs have a primary duty of care to ensure the health and safety of their workers and others who may be affected by the carrying out of work.

This means, where reasonably practicable, if you are the PCBU you would need to take action to eliminate risks to health and safety. If this is not reasonably practicable, you need to make sure those risks are minimised as far as is reasonably practicable.

This includes paying attention to the strategic, structural, policy and key resourcing decisions involved in running your business.

#### 4. Penalties have changed

The WHS Act includes a new offence of industrial manslaughter (s30A). This offence involves substantial penalties for PCBUs in a business where a WHS duty causes the death of an individual, in circumstances where the PCBU knew the conduct could cause death or serious harm.

The WHS Act voids insurance coverage for WHS penalties and imposes penalties for providing or purchasing this insurance.

The new laws also introduce what are known as enforceable undertakings. Here's an example of how an enforceable undertaking might work:

If a business operates in a way that commits (or may commit) an offence under the WHS laws (except for industrial manslaughter or a Category 1 offence), they may be able to volunteer to give an enforceable undertaking instead of going through legal proceedings. Giving an enforceable undertaking is not an admission of guilt.

Their enforceable undertaking is a written commitment to do certain things in an agreed period, and can be

accepted or rejected by the Regulator.

If the undertaking is accepted, the business would complete certain activities which need to be substantial and aim to deliver tangible benefits to the workplace, industry or broader community.

As part of the new laws, there are also reporting requirements for what are known as 'notifiable incidents', which includes serious illness, injury or death and dangerous incidents which might happen during the conduct of a business or undertaking.

#### 5. WHS laws will be similar across Australia

The new laws are largely based on the national model WHS Act and regulations used in other states and





territories, except Victoria. This means businesses will have similar health and safety obligations and requirements across Australia.

#### 6. Things won't change overnight

Many businesses will need a bit of time to adapt to the changes. To help support business owners during the change, the WHS Act has transitional arrangements which apply where duties are new or have changed a lot from what they were.

There is also now a two year transition period in place for <u>operators of earthmoving equipment used as a crane</u> who may now require a high risk work licence as part of the new WHS laws.

The WA Government has also allocated funding for an extra 21 inspectors and six support staff to help improve WHS outcomes.

#### 7. You can get help to make sense of the new laws

To learn more about the new laws and help you work out what this means for your business, we've launched a new workshop. This workshop covers a range of topics including how to implement safety practices within your business, how to conduct an internal safety review and more about safety management systems and certification requirements.

One of the impacts to business is the necessity of accredited training to ensure that they are compliant. Although there is financial and time impacts to consider, the safety of your workforce is paramount.

The CRC has been running some accredited business workshops; if there is anything that you need for your workforce please contact us so that we can arrange the training.

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# ATO Announces Changes to Working From Home Deductions

The Australian Taxation Office (ATO) has refreshed the way that taxpayers claim deductions for costs incurred when working from home. The changes better reflect contemporary working from home arrangements.

Assistant Commissioner Tim Loh explained that taxpayers can choose one of two methods to claim working from home deductions: either the "actual cost" or "fixed rate" method. Only the fixed rate method is changing.

The revised fixed rate method applies from 1 July 2022 and can be used when taxpayers are working out deductions for their 2022-23 income tax returns.

'First things first, make sure you are eligible to claim working from home expenses. To claim your working from home expenses, you must be working from home to fulfil your employment duties, not just carrying out minimal tasks, such as occasionally checking emails or taking calls. Also, you must incur additional expenses as a result of working from home.'

'No matter which method you use, make sure to keep records. This will give you more flexibility to choose the method that gives you the best deduction at tax time depending on your circumstances.'

Mr Loh said these changes provide benefits for those using the revised fixed rate in 2022-23.

'Items that are difficult and tedious for everyday Aussies to calculate actual work-use, like phone, internet and electricity expenses, are included in the revised rate. Assets and equipment that typically give taxpayers a bigger deduction, such as technological items and office furniture, are not included in the revised rate and need to be claimed separately.'

'Another benefit is that you no longer need a dedicated home office to use the fixed rate method.'

Mr Loh reassured taxpayers who haven't kept records so far this income year that transitional arrangements are in place for 2022-23.

'From 1 July 2022 to 28 February 2023, we'll accept a record which represents the total number of hours worked from home (for example a 4 week diary). From 1 March 2023 onwards, taxpayers will need to record the total number of hours they work from home.'

'And remember, you can't claim for things like coffee, tea, milk and other general household items, even if your employer may provide these kinds of things for you at work.'

#### Revised fixed rate method

The revised fixed rate method can be used from the 2022-23 income year onwards. The changes are:

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# ATO Announces Changes to Working From Home Deductions

#### Rate

The cents per work hour has increased from 52 cents to 67 cents.

#### What's covered by the rate

The revised fixed rate of 67 cents per work hour covers energy expenses (electricity and gas), phone usage (mobile and home), internet, stationery, and computer consumables. No additional deduction for any expenses covered by the rate can be claimed if you use this method.

#### What can be claimed separately

- The decline in value of assets used while working from home, such as computers and office furniture.
- The repairs and maintenance of these assets.
- The costs associated with cleaning a dedicated home office.

#### Home office

The revised fixed rate method doesn't require taxpayers to have a dedicated home office space to claim working from home expenses.

#### Record keeping

Taxpayers need to keep a record of all the hours worked from home for the entire income year – the ATO won't accept estimates, or a 4-week representative diary or similar document under this method from 1 March 2023.

Records of hours worked from home can be in any form provided they are kept as they occur, for example, timesheets, rosters, logs of time spent accessing employer or business systems, or a diary for the full year.

Records must be kept for each expense taxpayers have incurred which is covered by the fixed rate per hour (for example, if taxpayers use their phone and electricity when working from home, they must keep one bill for each of these expenses).

#### Actual cost method

The <u>actual cost method</u> hasn't changed. Taxpayers can claim the actual work-related portion of all running expenses.

This includes keeping detailed records for all the working from home expenses being claimed, including:

all receipts, bills and other similar documents to show taxpayers have incurred the expenses, a record of the number of hours worked from home during the income year (either the actual hours or a diary or similar document kept for a representative 4-week period to show the usual pattern of working at home).

a record of how taxpayers have calculated the work-related and private portion of their expenses (for example, a diary or similar document kept for a representative 4-week period to show the usual pattern of work-related use of a depreciating asset such as a laptop).

The ATO is reminding taxpayers that if they are claiming their actual working from home expenses, they can't claim a deduction for expenses which have already been reimbursed by their employer.

#### More information

No matter which method is used, if taxpayers purchase assets and equipment for work and it costs more than \$300, they can't claim the full amount immediately. For each of these items, the deduction must be claimed over a number of years and the work portion claimed (known as decline in value or depreciation).

The ATO has online calculators to help taxpayers work out the <u>decline in value</u> of assets and equipment purchased. There is also the <u>myDeductions tool</u> in the ATO app, which can help keep track of expenses.

Taxpayers needing assistance or advice about claiming working from home expenses can also seek the assistance of a registered tax professional.
