Fit For Purpose

In the next few weeks a big tick will be able to be put against the 'Fit For Purpose' project that included three installations of outdoor exercise equipment in Lake Grace.

It is 18 months since the joint Shire of Lake Grace and Community Resource Centre project started with a public meeting to investigate the need, types of equipment and where it should be placed.

A \$26,683 grant from FRRR (Foundation for Rural and Regional Renewal) kick started the project with the Shire submitting the remainder of the funds and taking charge of the installation. The CRC has managed the project; from public meeting through to grant application and then the ordering of the equipment. Once the equipment arrived the Shire organized installation; one piece of equipment being left out of the original order has caused some delay.

There are three pods; one is at the playground in Gumtree Drive, this installation is targeting community use while a second pod is at the Shed in Stubbs street. The target audience for this installation is travellers who while taking a break may take the opportunity to stretch their muscles on the equipment, a means to stay alert and a boost for road safety. Both of these pods are ready to use, they are just awaiting the installation of signage.

A big thumbs up to you! We are still taking names for our next round of forklift training.
- We have had a great display of interest for the HR Truck training and accreditation. It's not too late to enrol, however the window of opportunity is closing rapidly. Please give us a call if you're interested. HC and MC training and accreditation will be happening in July.
- There has been a great deal of interest in the opportunity for funding for remnant vegetation (see advert on page 11). Anika Dent from Wheatbelt NRM spent a day in Lake Grace to talk to farmers about funding opportunities. If you would like to get on board please contact Anika as per the advert or give us a call at the CRC. In the mean time we are still interested in the following:
 - Anyone who knows where there's bridal creeper or would like to be involved in making a start on ridding it from our area.
 - Farmers who have a feral cat problem and would like to be a part of an eradication programme.
- We now have a date for the piloting workshop, it will be held over the 29th and 30th May at the CRC. Cost is \$1,400. Please contact us at the CRC and we shall forward the enrolment information to you.
- Another workshop we have coming up is Understanding Grief and Loss (half day), we hosted one of these a couple of years ago and it was very well received. The workshop will be facilitated by Injury Matters who are also keen to do other training/ information sessions. Two subjects of interest are anxiety and Stay On Your Feet. If you are interested in any of these three training opportunities please give us a call. A bonus for Lake Grace is that Injury Matters had received funding from CBH so we don't even have to look for grant funding.
- We have also booked an accredited First Aid workshop with St John for Friday 6th October. This workshop is for youth (16-18) and will come under the banner of Lake Grace Roadwise. We will be looking for funding to cover the costs of this workshop to keep any costs to a minimum (preferably free). Lake Grace Roadwise is keen to give youth the skills and confidence to act if they are involved in or come across an accident while driving. We are more than happy to take expressions of interest.
- We have been having issues with our internet so will be signing up for a new provider. Be aware that the lakegracecrc@westnet.com.au email will become obsolete. Emails ending with @lakegracecrc.net will be fine. If you have been sending material through to

us please follow up with a phone call as not everything seems to be getting through. Hopefully that will all change in the near future.

- Now Easter is just around the corner so the Driver Reviver will be open for business. We will be looking for volunteers for Thursday afternoon, Good Friday and Easter Monday. If you would like to give this a go please give us a call.
- Also coming upon us very quickly is ANZAC Day. Once again we're having a dawn service which will be followed by a breakfast supplied by the Lake Grace Lions. We received funding from Lotterywest (via the RSL) to cover any costs but we are keen to get feedback on what the community want. - Finally we seem to have some traction on works happening with the intersection; credit to Peter Rundle for putting a grievance to Parliament as I do believe that gave momentum for something to happen...but we won't count our chickens just yet.
- Now COVID is doing the rounds so if you're needing test kits we still have some at the CRC. Please don't come in if you're sick or have been exposed we'll find a way of getting the kits to you.


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John Watkinson

3rd June 1940 - 12th March 2023

Dad was born on the 3rd June 1940 followed by David in 43 and Andrew in 1950 to Lilla and Fred Watkinson. He grew up on Milnthorpe farm, Bramham in Yorkshire. A 260ac property where the family milked 30 cows, did some cropping, grew 20ac potatoes/yr and ran 60 sheep.

Dad remembered on his first school trip to the seaside another little boy gazing out to sea in awe shouted "Eee there must be 40ac of water out there!!!"

Dad left school to work in a butchers shop but his dad wanted him home so he went farming and fox hunting by age 18 he had collected 15 dogs.

I have here a few memories from Dads brother, Uncle Andrew, in the UK. I'll do my best to channel my inner Yorkshire but could very well end up sounding more like 'Vera'

I remember well when he was an apprentice butcher he very proudly bought home some of the first sausages he had made but before Mum cooked them brother Dave pushed a button into one of the sausages, Dad was not happy to be the one to find it in his sausage.

This next story is about Dad and one of his mates. The pair caught a wild Badger. This was back in the day Badgers were considered vermin and killed in large numbers some hides were used was for shaving brushes. Today they are a protected species. Anyway the pair put a collar on the badger and led him into a pub where Badger attracted the attention of a couple of cyclists who came over and stroked him. Eventually the Badger slipped his collar and took off in search of a safe place to take cover. He was last seen by the fellas scuttling up the chimney. They left the pub quickly.

The last story involves a fox. No surprises there... So if Dad wasn't hunting on a horse he would always make sure the hunt would have a successful day. One particular day Dad arrived at a patch of woodland just before the hounds. With him he had 'one he prepared earlier' in a milk churn. He took the lid off to release the fox but said fox proved reluctant to leave the comfort of his new home. Eventually Dad convinced him it was more comfortable outside. With the fox making for the safety of the woodland Dad dropped the milk churn and walk to a good spot to watch the action. The approaching hounds gave voice which caused the fox to turn around and run back the way he'd come... you guessed it... straight back into the milk churn

Dad met mum at Brambam Moor fox hound show in June 1961, both showing terriers

Luckily for us Dad couldn't stop thinking about her and when the chance came to visit the huntsman in Warwickshire he asked the question "does anyone know where Jill Morton lives?"

It was a Saturday when he pulled up outside the big



house at Longbridge, Sue came running past. He asked "Is Jill in please"

Sue called out to their mum who was taking a bath "Ma there's a boy here looking for Jill" her mum shouted out of the bathroom window "Well get rid of him"

Not deterred dad went back the next day and the rest is history

Married 24 November 1962 they lived with Dads parents at Milnthorpe but not for long as a cottage became available. They moved to Wetherby and he travelled back and forth 4 miles to work on Milnethorpe farm in a Fordson tractor. We lived there from 1962-1969. All us kids were born there.

When his dad died in 1965 the owners of the estate wouldn't give tenancy to Dad. They came to funeral on Thursday and gave them notice to move out the week after. Dad reflected it was probably because the boy, himself, had running dogs and would be doing a bit of poaching for home consumption.

At this time the Australian government advertised in their local paper. Painting a bright picture of fishing rods with 2 fish on each one. Land in Esperance was 4/6/ac not mentioning that you needed a lot of acres.

We landed in Australia 11 Feb 1969, can you imagine a plane full of 10 Pound Poms. We settled on Bunbury and once there moved six times. Last move to a caravan park as the money ran out. A bloke at the caravan park gave us a kitten said there was a job going with the Frank and June Craig at Dardenup. We were there six months

Dads next job was working for the Waite family at Boyup Brook with the occasional stint at the Abattoir as a slaughterman he walked to work or Kirky would pick him up. To make a bit extra he drove the gut truck to Manjimup 5/nights a week for \$5/trip it was a 3 hours round trip. The gut truck was a Chev and carried 20 x 44 gallon drums one night he dropped a drum of tongues off onto the road, the crows had a lovely time.

Saving their pennies for the great venture into farming. Mum and Dad started off by putting a deposit on Tangara, at Kulikup, 20 miles away. The block was bare and run down with only 300 acres cleared. The

family spent our weekends clearing, fencing and just generally making it into a saleable item. There was always time for horses. Dad would squeeze as many as he could on his little truck, mum packed up the food and we were set for the weekend. Us kids picked rocks and sticks in the morning. After lunch we would take off on our ponies with a Kangaroo dog and a pack of sheep dogs in search of something to chase.

In 1977 Dad finished working for the Waites and we purchased, Southlands, south of Boyup Brook this property had a house. We were there 10 years. Dad became a mulsing contractor. All of us kids spent time working on the cradle and he endeavoured to make it fun. It was pretty ordinary for the person who sat in the back of the old Ford car as they were surrounded by a roo dog and at least 3 sheep dogs. Only one thing worse and that was if they'd had roo for tea. Dad hated being cold so the heater was always on flat out and you weren't allowed to wind down a window... Still the money was good...

It was common after a big job for Dad to stop at the pub or the Club in Boyup Brook. One particular night Dad, Frankie 'Fox' Chapman and I stayed til stumps. Fox was somewhat the worse for wear by then but he had told us earlier in the evening that he wanted dropping at his new girlfriends place. Dad reckoned he knew where it was so we pulled up and I helped Fox to the door and rang the bell a couple of times for him. We'd discuss it might be nice for him to greet her with the phrase "Hi honey I'm home". It was about 11pm and the house was dark. The lights came on and something warned me that I shouldn't hang around so I let Fox slip to the ground and high tailed it back to the car As I opened the car door I heard him slurred "Hi Honey I'm ... With a warm feeling in my heart I shut the car door. A few days later we were working together and I asked Fox if everything went ok when we dropped him off. No he said with a pained look on his face you dropped me off at the wrong house... Dad, to his credit did a great job of looking surprised

We also did a lot of hay carting. Not big squares or round rolls but little squares. Dad and Fox had 2 trucks a bale loader and an elevator. I clearly remember carting hay for Jimmy Inglis. We were on our last load and right up the top of the stack. Dad was on the truck putting them on the elevator which was damn near vertical. Fox was taking them off the elevator and throwing them up another 2 or 3 high to me who was stacking. Dad was keen to get to the pub for a counter lunch and didn't notice Fox was under pressure till Fox could take it no more and began pulling the strings off and sending the hay back to Dad. They were great days...

Dad and his mother-in-law Granny Morton had an interesting relationship. Gran came to live in Australia in her 60's. For a few years she went back and forth to the UK regularly. Once she asked Mum to look after her parrot. The parrot was a fast learner and in no time at all Dad and John taught him to swear. Granny did her best to convince herself and her friends the parrot was only telling them to 'PUSH OFF!' In 1992, Windemere was purchased near Lake Grace. Dad and Mum were now able to escape and pursue their hobbies breeding Stockhorses and Campdrafting. They travelled the State including the Kimberly's for four years and once to Katherine in the NT.

In 2003 Mum, Dad and Johnno made the move to Dinninup Downs, Qualeup. They set about whipping the place into shape and like Southlands and Windemere they built on an open plan large kitchen, dining and lounge room. In this stage of semi-retirement Dad devoted himself to his beloved Bullock team and learning as many bush poems as he could.

By 2009 Dad and mum rekindled their love of the sport that brought them together, Fox Hunting. They joined the Brook Hunt and for more than a decade hosted a hunt day on the June long weekend. Although Dad no longer had a milk churn he did have a culvert an yes... You guessed it, it always had a fox in residence. Dad never needed any encouragement to recite a poem or too with Turbulence a favourite for Zoe and his beloved hunting friends. The Brook Hunt Master, Liam will blow the 'Gone Away' for us later. This signals to the hounds that the chase has seriously begun. Dad loved to blow this tune and did so as a send-off at a few funerals


Five years ago Mum lost her battle with cancer. As well as supporting Mum with her treatment Dad threw himself into fund raising, the pair hosting a bloom

festival open garden and several cancer council fund raisers. All water on the farm was diverted to the garden, Dad had another dam sunk and finally relented and got a retic system installed.

As many of you know losing our Mum was heart breaking for Dad. We were so grateful when Judy came into his life it was like a light had flicked on and Dad was walking in the sunshine again. Judy, We all want to thank you for the love and care you gave to Dad.

Dads battle with kidney failure never stopped him going places or farming. Every time I spoke to him he was busy with something and even though it was a shock to lose him we can be grateful that he died peacefully in his own home.

When I look for words to describe my Dad what comes to mind is hard working, tireless, determined, and oh so very social.... Someone who really *would* give you the shirt off his back.

Memories from Friends

Kirky Jeff Kirk – friend since the early 1970. I worked with John at the abattoir. Noel Smith, whose job it was to bleed the cattle would occasionally as a joke get a mouth full of blood and spray it over everybody This particular day Pommy John dared him to spray someone, the health inspector noticed him get the

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blood and came over and ended up wearing the blood.

Another time we came up to get a load of white gum posts in a little D series truck. It was way over loaded and dropped in a stump hole on the way out. Jill brought the little D2 dozer to pull the truck. She said to my wife Beth "you got to have your best bras on to drive this old bitch"

June Roberts – Our friendship with the Watkinson family started in Dardenup in 1969 to us John was a real countryman. Whilst they maintained their English heritage and for John his Yorkshire heritage they embraced the Aussie lifestyle and the freedom and opportunities that came to them. He indulged in his love of rural sports. His love of horses, successfully competing at Campdrafting and latterly Hunting, sheepdog trialling, he raised ferrets and pheasants and had aperies full of small birds and of course his team of bullocks. So many memories for all of us it was a true country life. Nicknames were a forte for John, you probably have one...he would tease us to guess who was the latest to be given this honour. This lead on to his great ability to recite poetry. John had a cheerful generosity from which we all benefited and loved a chance to hold a get together providing the necessary fowl, hog, sheep, cow or venison to feed us all. His love and respect for all things simply rural will stay with us now as inspired memories. Missing you John.

Nipper, David Forrester- We were neighbours to the Watkinson's for only a brief time compared to the last speakers, I only knew John for 20 odd years. As spoken, he was a funny man, a naughty man and a good man at heart. The first time I remember getting to know the Watkinson's my little daughter, Sophie, was only about 8 years old. She had a little horse, one of her maiden voyages was across to the Watkinson's. She said I've just met this couple and I think we're in for a bit of a fun time, they've got lots of horses. I thought Oh My Godfather... Now I don't know the back end from the front end of a horse but I got to learn sort of how they operated through the good will of the Watkinson's.

One quick story. We used to kill beasts and cut them up in our shearing shed. So John came over, we killed this steer. Now, from the service so far we understand that John loved all animals. There's probably some animals he didn't like so much one was foxes another one was our pet dog, a Labrador, he made it guite known that he didn't like Labradors. Anyway we're cutting up this beast. Peter and Johnny were maybe there that day. John had his special stash of osobuco. Anyway the Labrador was over in the corner looking at John going I dislike you as much as you dislike me, Im going to get you back Father John. And with that took a running leap and grabbed the back end of Johns part of the beast and took off down to the catching pens with John following it. He said "that bloody dog, it needs to be shot". We'll all miss you as neighbours. We've had some wonderful funny times.

Rundle's Calls for Dangerous Intersection Upgrade, Successful

Deputy Opposition Leader Peter Rundle's call on the Transport Minister to take action for urgent remediation works at a busy intersection in the State's Great Southern region has a positive outcome.

Mr Rundle said he was relieved on behalf of the Lake Grace community that, prompted by his Grievance in Parliament today, the Transport Minister has agreed to upgrade the road intersection at Stubbs Street and South-Kulin Lake Grace Road.

"I was pleased the Transport Minister had been receptive of calls to upgrade the intersection and has committed that Main Roads will undertake immediate action.

"Treatments, which we have called for, including rumble strips, bigger signage and different coloured tarmac are expected in the next couple of months."

Mr Rundle said in his Grievance the intersection in Lake Grace required urgent remediation works following years of concern which manifested in a serious incident at the intersection earlier this month.

"A combination of compounding risk factors at the crossing contributes to its complexity for motorists to navigate," Mr Rundle said.

"This intersection is notorious for traffic incidents and has a reputation as a potentially fatal crash site due to insufficient and substandard road safety treatments. Locals agree it is merely a matter of 'when' not 'if' a fatality unfolds if the intersection is not rectified.

"Locals report near misses on a weekly basis at this site and it shook the community when a serious accident occurred a few weekends ago."

Mr Rundle said a road safety audit commissioned by Main Roads in 2017 identified a raft of issues at the intersection which contributed to the unsafe nature of the intersection.

"The audit revealed stop sign locations caused confusion and rail crossing signs were inconsistently spaced from respective approach directions as just some of the issues with the intersection," Mr Rundle said.

I have to be completely honest that I haven't actually read this book but have it on good authority that it is a good read.


When a former NYPD colleague is shot dead in front of him, private investigator Marshall Grade discovers there's far more to the killing than meets the eye.


Ray Vialoux is in trouble. Big trouble. And he needs Marshall Grade's help.

How Do We Get the Easter Date & The Total Solar Eclipse

So why does the Easter date change each year?

Believe it or not, the reason the Easter date changes every year has a lot to do with astronomy!

It's got nothing to do with a decision made by churches, public holiday makers or governments.

Quite simply, Easter Sunday is deemed to be the first Sunday after the full Moon, following the March Equinox. The March Equinox is always on or around 22nd March each year.

Easter date 2023

It's a bit of a calculation and here it is for the Easter date 2023:

This year the March Equinox was on 21st March. The full Moon after this date is on the 6th of April and therefore Easter Sunday is the following Sunday which is the 9th of April 2023!

We hope you enjoy plenty of yummy Easter Eggs!

The Total Solar Eclipse 20th April, 2023

For natural cosmic phenomena, you don't get more remarkable than a Total Eclipse of the Sun! For a total solar eclipse to occur, the Sun, Moon and Earth need to be perfectly aligned in their orbits, with the Moon in the middle. As the Moon travels between the Sun and the Earth, its shadow is cast onto the surface of the Earth.

Eclipses are excellent examples of the extraordinary motion of the objects within our Solar System. This year, Western Australians have the privilege of viewing a Total Solar Eclipse on 20th April. On mainland Western Australia, the Total Solar Eclipse will only be visible from the Exmouth area. The rest of WA and Australia will only witness a partial solar eclipse.

How to View a Solar Eclipse Safely

Never look directly at the Sun. Looking directly at the Sun is unsafe except during the brief total phase ("totality") of a total solar eclipse, when the Moon entirely blocks the Sun's bright face. On mainland WA, totality will only occur in the Exmouth area. Everywhere else in WA and Australia will experience a partial solar eclipse which is not safe to look at with the unprotected eye. Solar eclipse glasses that are compliant with Australian and international standards provide necessary protection to view the eclipse safely. Only buy from trusted sources to ensure compliance with Australian and international safety standards, such as BinoCentral or Being in the Shadow.

When to look: From 11:29:41am to 11:30:40am, 20th April.

Where to look from: On mainland Western Australia, the Total Solar Eclipse will only be visible from the Exmouth area. The rest of WA and Australia will witness

a partial solar eclipse.

Backyard Buddies: Understanding Aphids

Aphids are small, soft-bodied, sap sucking insects which include cultural practices like removing infested plants,

belong to the order Hemiptera. Let's examine some unique biological features about aphids to better understand why they are so difficult to control.

Host plant range: Many species of aphids can feed on a wide range of host plants, which makes it difficult to control infestations in mixed plantings. These aphids are referred to as 'polyphagous' and includes the green peach aphid which feeds on a wide range of crops including vegetables, fruit trees, and ornamental plants.

Rapid reproduction: Aphids can reproduce asexually through a process called parthenogenesis, where females give birth to live young without mating with a male. This allows aphid populations to grow rapidly under favourable conditions, and some species produce 20+ generations a season.

Developmental plasticity & dispersal: Aphids can produce alates (winged aphids) in response to changes in environmental conditions. A drop in food quality, overcrowding or increased predation pressure can alter their development and produce winged individuals to aid in aphid dispersal.

Ant mutualism: Some species of aphids have a mutualistic relationship with ants, which can protect them from predators and parasitoids. This can make it difficult to control aphid populations without also addressing the ant presence.

Insecticide resistance: Some aphid populations have developed resistance to commonly used insecticides, which can make control even more challenging.

Understanding these factors can help you develop effective strategies for managing aphids. This may





biological control methods like introducing natural predators or parasitoids, and careful use of insecticides that are effective against the specific aphid species present.

If you don't recognise the aphid you are trying to control, please report it.

We Are Not the Same - Is It Embedded In Our Masculinity?

Quite often as blokes we have been told to get in touch with our feminine side. Over time this narrative has been part of the language barrier that has put bloke's positive approaches to wellbeing issues and help seeking in reverse.

There are three parts to our health: physical, mental and social/spiritual wellbeing. The latter is where we find: our identity, our individuality, our own sense of self, our sense of belonging, our passions and interests and our emotional *context* (not a feminine side!)

We are the same species but putting it simply men and women have evolved differently. Our DNA is 99.6% similar but it is that 0.4% difference that we need to talk about and address, because it helps explain why blokes have a warrior attitude to life and in turn helps explain why we seek help differently.

There are three main areas of difference that we talk about in the work we do:

1. Communication

- On average blokes will talk one third less than ladies per day (7,000 words to 21,000 words) this starts from a young age from boys through to men. Anyone with a wife, mother, mother-inlaw, daughter, or partner will know this. Ladies, talking is a good thing as it helps address/ highlight a whole lot of issues.
- It is perfectly normal for blokes to talk in dot points or even just grunt!

2. Risk-taking

- Blokes are hard wired to take risks from an early age. Some of this is linked to our brain development. The brain development stage for a lady is roughly between the ages of 18 to 20 years, whereas for a bloke it is between the ages of 25 to 28 years (some may say 45 to 50 years!)
- As we get older, we get wiser, but we are still hard wired to take risks.
- 3. Winning (an important part of the warrior culture)



- The majority (90%) of Aussie men think winning is important (a trait that can be traced back to our true warrior days, hunting for survival);
- An alarming statistic is that 50% of blokes think winning is all that matters. So quite often blokes don't take a backward step when it comes to finances, relationships and/or business matters.

The importance blokes place on winning, explains why a loss event and/or a sense of loss becomes problematic and can be hard to deal with. Combine this with the lack of understanding of our emotions and we may be a ticking time bomb.


As blokes we need to be more aware of our emotions and that it is alright to show them. We will all experience emotional issues throughout our lives. During these times we should openly express our emotions maybe through a hug or a cry and/or use language that is foreign to us i.e. I am sad, and/or I am struggling here.

Talk to a Mate®*!!* It is beneficial, and you will realise that it's not just you that may be struggling, there's a lot of other blokes out there feeling the same way.

CEO Chat

The crossroads at the Stubbs St and Kulin Rock Gorge Rock Road has certainly been the talk of the town over the past few weeks. The passengers involved in the recent rollover were lucky enough to escape with their lives judging from the camera footage . There is no doubt that the intersection requires attention and has done so over a number of years and the recent footage going around of near misses with trucks and vehicles of all sorts not stopping at the stop sign has finally had some positive results.

On Wednesday 22 March the Manager of Infrastructure, Craig Elefsen, and myself met with the Main Roads WA Director of the Wheatbelt Region, the Operations Manager Narrogin, the Acting Network Manager and Sergeant Joshua Egan-Reid from the Lake Grace Police on site to discuss the issues. This meeting was a result of much lobbying from various sources within the community. The Main Roads representatives then had to prepare a report to the Minister of Transport that afternoon as the matter was being brought up during parliament grievance time by the Deputy Leader of the Opposition Peter Rundle.

During the meeting with the MRWA representatives a plan to address the issues was formulated which included firstly, as a stop gap measure, to immediately arrange to have the white stopping lines redone and to be made larger. This was carried out the following day. The intersection was already going to be asphalted in May, it will now be investigated to use a different coloured asphalt to highlight the intersection. Further measures include improved signage on both South Road and Kulin Gorge Rock Road and the installation of rumble strips on the approaches.

Hopefully the proposed upgrades will have a positive effect however there is nothing we can do about driver inattentiveness or laziness.

Council and administration staff have commenced work on next year's budget. At this stage there shouldn't be any surprises. Again, roads and drainage will be a big spend item along with a continued focus on water capture and retention as well as community amenities.

Highlights from the Council meeting held on 22 March included the following;

- Reallocations of funds from Taylor Rd gravel re-sheeting to Biddy Camm Rd due to gravel availability
- · A reallocation of funds from some job savings to the purchase of a mobile water tanker
- Confirmation by Council that the upcoming October Council elections will be conducted by the WA Electoral Commission
- The Shire office will be closed will be closed on Monday 24 April (prior to Anzac Day).
- We will be applying for a State government grant to assist with headworks to open up more residential land in Lake Grace
- · Council endorsement of the Lake Grace Tree Trail
- Council confirmation of the commencement of Phase 3 of the Padley Park Retention Basin and Wetland detailed design
- Full details of the meeting are on the shire website.

If an item is covered in food, it is not recyclable. Food is one of the worst contaminators in the recycling process. On a sad note vandalism is on the rise again with many road signs being taken, cables cut at Lake King dam, damage to walking trail signs at the Lake Grace Speedway

walk trail, public toilets damaged at Lake King and Lake Grace.



Asbestos Disposal Changes at Lake Grace Tip To ensure the proper and timely burial of asbestos, combined with the dwindling landfill space set aside for asbestos, the Shire will make the following changes to the asbestos disposal process.

The Shire's Waste Management page will be kept up to date when the Lake Grace Tip can accept asbestos or not.

This can be found through the Shire website's dropdown menu Services > Work & Infrastructure > Waste Management, or through the following link: https:// www.lakegrace.wa.gov.au/services/work-andinfrastructure/Waste-Management.aspx.

- must notify the Shire ahead of time you wish to dispose of the asbestos and the amount, preferably in cubic metres. This will allow time to check currentl room to bury your asbestos, or if we need to create extra space.
- Once we respond that we can accept your asbestos, you can submit an Asbestos Disposal Application to the Shire. The fee will be invoiced to you or your company after disposal of the asbestos.
- Requests to dispose of asbestos on the same day of the request will be refused. It will take time to check our current capacity. We do not want wrapped asbestos sitting out in the sun for any time while we sort an additional trench.

This procedure (particularly the rejection of same-day disposal) will be put in to place starting on 10 April 2023.

At the time of this publication, the Lake Grace Tip is unable to accept any asbestos. All applications for disposal will be refused.

Please check the website when asbestos can be accepted again. Please keep this in mind when arranging for works on your property that require the disposal of asbestos as your builder/removalist may be required to take it to another tip.

Facility Hire

Please contact the Shire to book Shire facilities.

You are required to read the COVID Safety Plan before using the facility.

People, groups, and clubs who hire public buildings are still required to:

- Complete the WA Government Safety Plan
- Register users of the facility

- 4. In small bowl, combine the remaining ingredients.
- 5. Mix with fingertips until it has an even crumb texture.

6. Top the apple with the crumb mixture and bake in the oven for 20 minutes or until the crumble is golden brown.

Revealing the Stories of the old Lake Grace Hospital and its Restoration

Michelle Slarke

Do you know about the old Lake Grace Hospital? Were you treated as a patient there? Were you involved in the restoration of the Hospital? Heritage consultant Michelle Slarke is seeking stories and photographs of the old hospital, especially about people's experiences as a patient, and the restoration of the hospital as a museum.

A new research project will reveal the history of the hospital as it approaches its centenary. Michelle Slarke is researching the hospital to inform an interpretation plan for the Museum. The plan, commissioned by the Shire of Lake Grace, will identify, update and share the important stories and collection of the museum.

The Need for a Hospital

By the mid-1920s, nearly 1000 people lived in the Lake Grace district and the first shops and houses had appeared in the town. However, the closest hospital was at Wagin, 110 kilometres by horsedrawn vehicle. The community lobbied the State Government and the Australian Inland Mission (AIM) and raised funds for a hospital. The AIM, a scheme of Reverend John Flynn and the Presbyterian Church, set up 15 hospitals in remote and outback Australia from 1912.

Built in 1926, the Lake Grace AIM Hospital – a two-storey brick and jarrah building – was impressive. A local Hospital Board became responsible for its management, and people from the district regularly donated food, firewood and money to keep the hospital running.

The Patient Experience

Patient numbers soon exceeded the capacity of the building and so the verandahs were enclosed to create more wards and an operating theatre. In the latter, Dr Margaret Clark performed general operations including tonsillectomies, appendectomies, tooth extractions, caesarean sections and repairs to farming and sporting injuries. As a patient, you could expect to be placed in a shared ward, four beds to a room or in a verandah cubicle, stifling hot in summer and cold in winter. Patients stayed in bed for a week after surgery, receiving daily basin washes and using bed pans.

Despite alterations, by the late 1940s the hospital could now longer cater for the growing population. It was closed in 1952 when the new Lake Grace Memorial Hospital was built.

Restoration

By 1983, the once splendid hospital was vacant and in disrepair. The WA government decided to demolish the building and contractors began work. However, local people, including former staff Pat Strevett and Win Duckworth, rallied the community to save the building. Lake Grace Lions Club engaged a heritage architect who found that the building was in a poor state of repair but historically significant. Guided by this assessment, Lake Grace Shire Council voted to save the building from demolition and to restore it as a museum.

Restoration, led by the Lions Club and a Shire Council committee, took many hours of labour. Almost 100 volunteers replaced floorboards, guttering and fences, filled wall cracks, painted inside and out, and restumped the verandahs. Replacement materials had

to be authentic, using original type materials and copying original details. This included taking wall scrapings to match the paint type used in the year the hospital was constructed.

Lake Grace Australian Inland Mission Hospital Museum opened in October 1992. In stepped another group of volunteers – the museum committee – who located furniture, medical equipment and photographs of the era to fit out the museum.

Now almost one hundred years old and listed on local and State heritage registers, the Lake Grace Australian Mission Hospital is nationally significant as one of three remaining early AIM hospitals, and the only one in Western Australia. Primarily, its importance is to local people. It reflects their commitment to provide a lifesaving service and holds their stories – of the staff who gave medical care and of the people who were born, treated and died there.

This is a Shire of Lake Grace project made possible by a Community Heritage Grant from the Government of Western Australia.

Did you help restore the building? Were you ever a patient at the old hospital? Do you have any stories, information or photographs to share?

Michelle Slarke is keen to hear from former patients and those who helped to restore the building and set up the museum. Michelle is also compiling a list of nursing and domestic staff who worked at the hospital (1926-1952) and the hospital board members. Winners will be awarded a feature in the 2024 calendar, and a \$250 pre-paid VISA card.



Andrea explained this was one of the stories her parents shared to keep the children at home and behaving at home. It is also one of the reasons why Lake Grace is 'Warra' to aboriginal people.

Jo Darbyshire who spent three months with us as Artist in Residence in 2021 was extremely pleased to see the very large "BIG" paintings finally installed in the gallery. During Jo's residency she ran three workshops, working with oil paints on these large canvas's, its amazing with the theme Rural Utopia and a couple of painting techniques demonstrated that these 14 works could all be so different. Jo had an exhibition of her works here last year. It is fabulous we have managed to get these works all up for the exhibition.

Along with the 14 Paintings the members of the Lake Grace Artist Group were invited to create a 3D work (sculpture) to respond to one or more of the paintings.

I Flew For MMA

Based on the book 'I Flew for MMA' by Captain Reginald Adkins...

For as long as I can remember, I always wanted to be a pilot. I had a model DC-2 aeroplane that Mum bought at Woolworths for 2/6, and I built a little aerodrome with a hangar and windsock in our Mount Lawley backyard.

In 1937 I would ride my Armstrong backpedal 26" roadster to Maylands Aerodrome, and climb on the white rail fence to greet the arriving Eastern States mail plane. Eleven years later I would learn how to fly there.

I began my service with MacRobertson Miller Airlines in 1955 on a salary of £885. As I had been on the bones of my backside, it was a King's ransom!

My first flight began with a drive to Guildford Aerodrome at 0430 in my little 1940 Ford Prefect. It was a regular run up the coast - a 20-minute stop at each port and 7 hours 40 minutes flying time. Perth-Geraldton-Carnarvon-Learmonth-Onslow-Roebourne- and arriving at the tiny outpost of Port Hedland at 1530.

Hedland in those days had the usual two Pubs, Post Office, an Elders Store, Police Station, an odd tiny shop, and housing, all tin, and asbestos. We checked into the Esplanade Hotel which was something akin to the stone age. I was told to dump my suitcase, hang my uniform on a nail and I must have looked pretty stunned when I was told I was sleeping on a cyclone bed

outside on the verandah.

That was my introduction to flying and accommodation in the rugged North-West. The whole day was a real surprise and I didn't know what had hit me.

The girls worked hard on the flights, particularly when it was hot and turbulent. There was only one hostess and their duties included comforting the airsick and removing their bags full of vomit. The ones joining for the glamour soon left, so all around we had a goodnatured competent type of person - not frightened of hard work.

Some of the hostesses who come to mind were Marion Stewart-Dawon a blonde-headed happy girl, good at her job and with people. Then there was Joy Fawcett affectionately nicknamed "Shanks" because of her long shapely legs.

Marion Kramer earned her sobriquet one day when she realised that one of her passengers was dead. She was advised to do up the gentleman's seat belt, move his head over to the wall as though he was sleeping, and put a rug up around his shoulders. Tough work for a young lady - trying to stay calm and not alert other passengers that something was wrong.

Rosemary (Rosebud) Owen had a sunshine disposition and a smile that could melt you in an instant. Pam Hardwick (whose father started the famous Bernie's Hamburger Bar on Mount's Bay Road, in Perth), was full of life and fun, but could flash a look that could wither you on the spot if she was displeased.

When I joined MMA the Company had its own Hostel in Derby. Motels were unheard of in the North and local hotels couldn't cope with the comings and goings of crews. It was pretty close living, especially if there was a personality clash. In the wet season, we could be locked in the Derby Hostel for days on end.

The Hostie's quarters were strictly out of bounds and there was hell to pay if any pilot was caught "hanging around". The Company employed husband and wife live -in managers, some of whom could be extremely oldfashioned and puritanical.

Not that much ever went on and any hint of shenanigans would have the whole place buzzing. It was legend that if any scandal arose, it would be back in Perth via the grapevine before we were!

Jokes were sometimes played, like the time a bottle top, a burnt match and a lipstick smeared cigarette butt was secreted under a layer of a certain senior pilot's used clothes. The idea being that they would be discovered by Wifey and there would be some explaining to do. I don't know what happened to him. Maybe it was a low trick to play, but I think we were all a bit mad then!

The Hostel acquired a dog. Something of a cross between a kelpie and a wire-haired terrier. It wandered in one day, the crew made a fuss of it and decided to

stay. He was named Scruffy and caged scraps from the kitchen and would bark at anything that moved.

Eventually the blokes got sick of Scruffy and started discussing ways to get rid of him, even by shooting! He was a nice dog and I got a bit shirty towards them at this.

Anyway, one day the West Perth Cargo Depot rang home saying "We've got your dog here!" and when I told them I didn't have a dog they said, "It's your dog, it's addressed to you from Derby, and you'd better come out here now!"

I went out there and it was Scruffy! Those miserable mates of mine had put him in a crate and consigned him to me. He looked worse of wear but his ears went up as he recognised a friendly face, jumped in my car and we went home. The kids were still quite young and he became their friend and constant companion, we had him for years!

The last flight of my airline career was Perth-Geraldton-Carnarvon-Geraldton-Perth leaving at 0915 - real gentlemen hours. As was the MMA custom, my wife Shirley also accompanied me on the trip.

Taxying in a round of spontaneous clapping could be heard through the cockpit door, for a perfect touchdown

ending my career. Three fire engines from the Fire Service took up position, one out front and on each side, escorting us in, hoses sending up cascading foam and water in graceful white arcs.

Finally, we were "On the Blocks." I called "Cut Two", parked the brakes, "Cut One" and the Traffic Staffer Guy closed the start levers. We did our close down checks and it was all over.

Inside the terminal, there was a sumptuous spread, speeches were made, and I committed the big sin of sipping a nice cold beer in full uniform! But they couldn't fire me now. I'd driven out of the Airport gate and I wasn't going back!
