



### Carer Gateway

#### What is Carer Gateway?

Carer Gateway is an Australian Government program providing free services and support for carers.

Carer Gateway is for anyone who is an unpaid carer. Whether you are receiving a government carer payment or not, all carers can get support through Carer Gateway.

You may be an unpaid carer if you are providing care and support to a family member or friend with disability, a medical condition, mental illness, or someone who is frail due to age.

Carers can be any age. Carers can provide any type of care – some carers provide support 24 hours a day and help with daily living, while other carers provide fewer hours of support and help with occasional transport or cooking. Some carers provide support to someone who doesn't live with them. For example, the person they care for may be living in an aged care home.

You don't need to be a new carer to use Carer Gateway services – any carer can use the services at any time in their caring journey.

Using Carer Gateway services will not affect services delivered through My Aged Care or the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS), or any state or territory carer services or carer payments you may be receiving.

The Australian Government works with a range of health and carer organisations across Australia, known as Carer Gateway service providers, to deliver services to carers no matter where they live in Australia.

#### **Support Available to Carers:**

Carer Gateway provides many services to support carers in their caring role, including:

- In Person and Online Peer Support Groups you might like to meet with people like you who care for someone and share stories, knowledge and experience. You can do this with people in your area or you can join the carer forum online.
- Tailored support packages you may be able to get a range of practical supports like planned respite and transport services to help you in your caring role.
- In-person and phone counselling if you are feeling stressed, anxious, sad or frustrated, a counsellor can talk with you either in person or over the phone in the comfort of your own home.
- In-person and online self-guided coaching you
  can talk to a professional coach to reflect on your
  experience and needs, identify personal goals
  and create a plan to reach these goals, or you
  can work through interactive online coaching
  sessions at your own pace. There are a range of
  topics to help you in your caring role.

- Online skills courses to support your wellbeing and understanding of legal responsibilities relating to the caring role.
- Access to emergency respite if you suddenly find you can't provide care, for example if you become ill or injured. Service providers will find ways to look after the person you care for while you recover.

#### **How to Contact Carer Gateway:**

You can access Carer Gateway services in a number of ways, including by phone and online.

By calling 1800 422 737 Monday to Friday between 8am and 5pm and selecting option 1, you can speak with your local Carer Gateway service provider (in Western Australia, the provider is Carers WA). They will talk you through the registration process and start the planning process. This process helps our staff learn more about you and your caring role so they can match services to your individual needs.

You can also ask someone to call you back at a convenient time.

To organise an appointment for phone counselling, call 1800 422 737 Monday to Friday between 8am and 6pm and select option 2. For more information and to request a call back, visit the phone counselling page.

### Let It Flow

In the words of Elsa, 'Let it Go' was the mantra for those taking part in Gayle Mason's three-day Mark Making Abstract workshop at the Lake Grace Regional Artspace.

Mark Making is experimenting with alternative devices for applying paint (or other mediums) to the canvas. Brushes could be put down and sticks or leaves picked up; mediums used could be inks, paints, charcoal or that flat white. The only rules were there were no rules, simply to experiment.

The first day was about making your mark on the canvas, it was largely mono; the second day was an extension of this but using colour on large canvases while the third day was experimenting with textures, creating layers using pigment, ash and even bitumen.

Aware it was going to be a messy business the black plastic was rolled out and those participating donned their art clothes ready for a good time.

Gayle Mason has a gallery and studio in Bellevue and looks forward to the challenge of helping realistic artists find their imagination, painting from the heart instead of

the head. Gayle says that many artists have lost the ability to play, that they need to free themselves up and not think about outcomes and expectations.

Kerrie Argent had attended one of Gayle's workshops and enjoyed it so much that she encouraged her to visit Lake Grace. Gayle said that she had done workshops in the coastal communities of Cervantes and Mandurah but hadn't ventured to Lake Grace before. She is now looking forward to returning having enjoyed the enthusiasm of the participants and their willingness to let it go and let it flow.

### Mother's Day Origins

This Sunday is Mother's Day, which is a day of many feelings, looking forward to family time, reflecting on how much we appreciate our mothers or maybe it holds feelings of loss as we remember the mothers that are no longer with us.

It has been a tradition that we can remember doing our whole lives, choosing a present for mum, getting her breakfast in bed, and or having a meal with extended family. Having been around since the early 1900's, the origins of Mother's Day have evolved from its original meaning and can be linked back to American influence.

Mother's Day in America was a conversation started back in 1870, when Julia Ward Howe, a American writer and activist for women's rights, appealed to women to unite and bring peace to the world; she wanted to establish a "Mother's Day for Peace." Her "Appeal to womanhood throughout the world" was later called the "Mother's Day Proclamation", brought about as a response to the ongoing wars throughout the country.

The idea of Mother's Day didn't take off though until a few decades later after a few other attempts. Anna Marie Jarvis wanted to honour her mother, Ann Jarvis, and the work she had done as a peace activist and nurse during the civil war. When her mother passed away, Anna held a Memorial Service in 1907 at Andrews Methodist Episcopal Church in honour of Ann and the legacy she left. Anna campaigned to have a day set aside to honour all mothers, meaning each family to honour their own mother. In 1914, US President Woodrow Wilson officially declared the second Sunday of the month of May to be Mother's Day. The giving of carnations (white to remember those who have passed, coloured for mother's still alive) is believed to have started as Anna had used white carnations at the Memorial Service.

Australia started to have special church services for acknowledging mothers from 1910 onwards, but it was not popularly observed until the 1920's. In 1924, following the losses of troops in WWII, Sydney woman Janet Hayden, was concerned for the lonely and forgotten aged mothers at Newington State Hospital. She successfully campaigned to local schools and businesses to donate gifts to these women. This tradition of giving gifts was started and has now grown into a large, commercialized business, with Mother's Day one of the highest grossing celebrations of the year. There are now over 60 countries that celebrate Mother's Day on the second Sunday of the month of May, some with links to the American meaning of peace and honouring of mothers, some with other reasons to celebrate mothers and women.

Australia's Mother's Day is most closely linked to the American origins of the day, although there are many other traditions for the day across the world. Some examples of other countries origins and traditions:

 Argentina celebrate on the 3rd Sunday in October, with the day being about the celebration of the "Maternity of the Blessed Virgin Mary".

- Bolivia celebrate Mother's Day in remembrance of the women that fought in the Bolivian War of Independence and were slaughtered by the Spanish Army.
- Ethiopia have a three day feast called "Anthrosht" after the end of the rainy season (mid-fall), consisting of ingredients bought by the children to make a traditional meal, and singing and dancing.
- France had their origins of Mother's Day as a celebration to those that had large families, and in 1906, mother's with 9 children were given an award as a response to the alarmingly low birth rate. Today in France it has become more commercialised since the 1950's with celebration of all mothers.
- Mother's Day in North Korea started in 2012, and is held on the 16th November as a public holiday, in remembrance of the First Nation Meeting of Mother's in 1961 and subsequent published works of "The Duty of Mothers in the Education of Children" by Kim II Sung.
- Paraguay holds Mother's Day on the 15<sup>th</sup> May, in remembrance of the independence of Paraguay, and in honour of Juana Maria de Lara's role in the events of 14 May 1811 that led to Paraguay's independence.

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### Book Review: The Last Kingdom by Steve Berry


I'm quite sure I haven't read a Steve Berry book before and if I have certainly not one including his Cotton Malone character. Initially I struggled to get my head around all of the characters and which side they were on, once a few got killed off the plot seemed to come together in my head.

Cotton Malone, former Justice Department agent, is in Germany to help his protégé Luke Daniels infiltrate a renegade group intent on winning Bavarian independence from Germany. The prince of Bavaria is determined to eliminate his brother the duke and install himself as king.

Everything hinges on a secret from history. In 1886 the eccentric and enigmatic King Ludwig II embarked on a search for a new kingdom - a place he could rule as he wished. No one knows if he succeeded. But the prince's ambitions depend on it being true.

In a race across Bavaria for clues hidden in Ludwig's three fairy tale castles, Malone and Daniels battle an ever-growing list of deadly adversaries - all intent on finding the last kingdom.

Definitely a good read but best done when your head is empty of other stuff. Even though a novel there is always an element of truth, I enjoyed learning more about Bavarian history and how Hawaii came to be an American state. Available at the Lake Grace Library.



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### Give Shipping Container Scams a Wide Berth

Swelling demand for shipping containers is causing Western Australian consumers to be scammed out of their money at a rate of knots.

When items are in high demand yet short in supply, they become easy targets for scammers who know that when people are desperate to buy scarce items, they can forget to 'practice the pause' to consider whether they are being swindled.

According to figures from our WA ScamNet team, 11 victims have been duped out of a whopping \$80,707 already this year – easily eclipsing the \$54,500 recorded in the first five months of 2022, and far exceeding the \$49,000 in total losses for the whole of 2021.

It starts when consumers respond to adverts on social media or elsewhere online for discounted shipping containers, before sending money to websites that turn out to be fake.

Often the scammers steal the business name and ABN information from legitimate companies to appear more convincing, which is exactly what happened recently to GG Plant and Machinery Pty Ltd - an authentic business without an online presence.

As fast as our WA ScamNet team was able to shut down the impersonator sites 'ggplantandequipment.com' and


'ggplantandequipment.com.au', another one popped up in its place ('ggplantequipment.com.au'), highlighting why consumers need to remain vigilant when looking for goods online.

Scammers wave a big red flag when they advertise goods well below market prices and only allow consumers to pay via bank transfer, so we always advise against paying for goods this way.

Instead, only shop on websites that offer secure payment methods such as credit card or PayPal, which allow you to dispute the transaction if the goods aren't delivered or something else goes wrong.

If you are looking to buy a shipping container, proceed with caution and remember it's always best if you can inspect the goods in-person. Take the time to find the website or contact details of the legitimate business, then make contact using details you have independently sourced to ascertain whether the offer is genuine.

### Hooking Along

Modern day crochet was derived in the 1800s, crochet (meaning hook in French) was a variety of knitting practiced by Scottish and Danish peasants known as shepherd's knitting. Some say its origins are much earlier, having followed the trade route from Arabia and China (tambour embroidery).

In 1829, the first crochet pattern was written by Mademoiselle Riego de la Branchardiere. The daughter of a French father and an Irish mother, she is known as the mother of crochet and said to be the creator of the Irish crochet style!

Crochet falls in and out of fashion but is definitely an art form; the advantage it has over knitting is that it has only one stitch but it is harder to learn than knitting.

Already our ladies are beavering away creating beautiful blankets for Wheelchairs for Kids. Each year they challenge themselves to improve, try new designs and colours while cheering each other on.

The group came back to the CRC in April (they get together from December to March at the Village Hall), spending two hours every Friday morning creating whilst swapping pinterest patterns and talking family news.

Although creating blankets is a big part of what the groups does, so is the social networking. We are also there to teach crochet so if you would like to learn please come along, hooks are available for purchase and we have yarn that you can use while learning.

I have a range of books, as does the library, that you can access for patterns and ideas. The group is quite casual with members attending when they're able. If you are unable to attend but would like to make blankets (we do have a couple of ladies doing this) then we can include them in our collection. There is some donated yarn that we're happy to share however yarn that is purchased (from funds raised) is only available to the group that attend.

#### **STATION NEWS**

Scott has been away in Perth on a pursuit driver training course the last few weeks. After many long days and assessments, he passed the course and now holds the highest driving qualification available in WA Police. This qualification allows him to pursue vehicles in the event they fail to stop when we attempt to intercept them. Pursuits are very high risk for all involved, including other road users, and Scott has received training on how to lower those risks, and end the pursuit safely. All police officers receive advanced driver training, but only a few receive pursuit training. Officers with lower driving qualifications can pursue vehicles in exceptional circumstances but there is a lot of criteria to meet before it would be authorised. We also all complete mandatory annual training on the subject.

#### **CRIME NEWS**

As some people may have heard there continues to be a spate of burglaries in the surrounding area, from Albany to Corrigin. There have been over 60 burglaries in the region since January this year. Lake Grace and Newdegate have been targeted several times. The MO is very similar and we have a dedicated team of police and detectives working on this. We can't comment too much on the investigation side of things but this is what we can say.

The suspects have been targeting farm houses and sheds on remote properties. The majority are vacant or the occupants are away. They seem to have a



knowledge of the properties that have CCTV. They have gone out of their way to avoid cameras when they are present or to avoid properties with cameras completely. This shows they have, at least on some occasions, been on the property before and seen the cameras.

They are stealing a range of things from power tools, motorbikes, and vehicles. Basically, anything portable. One burglary last week they stole over \$10,000 worth of property. They are committing these burglaries on a regular basis and show no sign of slowing down.

The best thing you can do to reduce your risk of being targeted is to install CCTV cameras. A cheaper option is to buy some trail cameras and install them at the entrances to your property and in your sheds. These cameras only record when they detect movement so can operate for months without the need for any further input from yourself. Cameras seem to be the biggest deterrent we have identified as these thieves have burgled multiple farms in a night, skipping properties with cameras.

If you have any questions or queries, or want any advice in regards to cameras contact us here at the station as we're more than happy to help.

#### **TRAFFIC NEWS**

People might have seen us out and about late into the evening these last few weeks. We've introduced some later shifts into our roster to give us better coverage over the course of the day. This also means we have been able to do more Random Breath Testing in the evenings.

Unfortunately, in the last fortnight we have caught four locals drink driving. A fifth person failed a roadside drug test. A lot of people we stopped were under the limit, but only just. If you're planning on drinking, plan on how you'll get home too, drink driving isn't worth the risk.

In other news a male from Lake Grace was charged with Dangerous Driving after we received several reports from concerned witnesses that he drove his car while a male was sitting on the outside of his vehicle. The male was interviewed and came clean and we were a bit lost for words with this one. He has been summonsed to court for the offence.

### **CEO Chat**

The Shire is undergoing a major review of its Strategic Community Plan which is a requirement of the Local Government Act 1995. It gives the community a say in which direction it wishes the Shire to take in the future. Workshops were held during the last week of April in Varley, Lake King, Newdegate and Lake Grace by Consulting Great Southern who have been engaged to undertake the review. Whilst turnout was not great there was some very good feedback received. As well as the in-person workshops there is an online survey available with the links on the Shire website and social platforms. In addition hard copies are available at the Shire office.

There has been a lot of movement around Lake Grace this past month with regard to both housing and industrial land. At this stage we have a couple of irons in the fire on both fronts and investigations into our options are underway.

We have been advised by Main Roads WA that roadworks at the Stubbs Street South Road intersection in Lake Grace and the intersection of Brookton Highway and the Collie Lake King Road in Lake King are set to commence on 11th May. Weather permitting they are set for completion by 24th May. This work is well overdue and most welcome.

Highlights from the last Council meeting held on 26th April include the following:

- Approval was given for Crisp Wireless to access the old TV/Radio
  Rebroadcasting Tower in Lake Grace so that they could install a dish and access
  point so that an additional internet provider option can be given to the town of
  Lake Grace. (Newdegate watch this space).
- Council was approached by a Varley farmer with regard to the purchase of a house in Varley which is a joint venture project with the Department of Communities. This house has been vacant for all but 3 months in the past 4 years. Council supported the sale of the house to the farmer. As this is a joint venture project and the Shire only has a 14.36% share in the property the ultimate approval needs to come from the Department of Communities. Funds from the sale of the house will be put towards providing housing in a more appropriate location.
- Council authorised the CEO to submit an application under the Regional Development Assistance Program to complete the development by Development WA of 4 Lots in the Dewar Street Light Industrial area.
- The Newdegate Field Days for 2023 are rapidly approaching and planning is well underway. Council approved sponsorship towards the field days to the value of \$15,000 as in previous years. This will be included in the upcoming budget.

We are currently seeking to appoint a Community Economic Development Officer to join our administration team. These are currently some exciting times within the Shire and we are seeking someone who can not only support the community through events but also be capable of completing grant opportunities that may become available to assist all areas of the community and Shire. The recycling bins are collected by Warren Blackwood Waste and transported to a recycling facility. If items which are not recyclable are found the content can't be recycled and the load will be directed to the landfill.

If an item is covered in food, it is not recyclable. Food is one of the worst contaminators in the recycling process. By using the yellow top recycling bin correctly you are contributing, in a combined community effort, to reduce the amount of rubbish that is directed to landfill facilities each year.

At the AGM it was obvious there could be no changing of the positions and there was genuine conversation about halting the meeting and facing the prospect of the group folding. However,

there was one vital concern, the Community Cropping Community Grant Funding – this all comes under the Development Association. If the group folded, then funding applications could not be processed. All of the Executive have elected to remain in their positions, but there needs to be change.

The motto of the LGDA is 'promoting business, educational, social and cultural development within the Lake Grace Community'.

Organisations that currently come under the umbrella of the LGDA include the Community Bus, Seniors Group, Toy Library, LIFT, Recreation Council Trust; fundraising ventures include the All Abilities Playgroup and the Garden Rejuvenation Project (for the Hospital). Some of the LGDA's past projects have been the Skatepark, Town Clock, Recycling and Christmas Trees (there will be a lot more). Other groups such as the Lions and Artists Group will report on their happenings – this is to be encouraged as it helps the LGDA have a broad picture of what is happening in Lake Grace.

With the Shire advertising the position of an Economic Community Development Officer it is a golden opportunity for the LGDA to provide a voice for the community; a voice that includes all of our demographics. The opportunities are endless, but only with your help.

### Keeping the Right Records

Fair Work Ombudsman

Employers who engage employees under relevant Commonwealth workplace laws are required to:

- make and keep accurate and complete records for all of their employees (for example, time worked and wages paid)
- issue pay slips to each employee.

These record-keeping and pay slip obligations are designed to ensure that employees receive their correct wages and entitlements.

#### What are the record-keeping obligations?

#### Employee records must:

- be in a form that is readily accessible to a Fair Work Inspector
- · be in a legible form and in English
- · be kept for seven years
- not be altered unless for the purposes of correcting an error
- not be false or misleading to the employer's knowledge.

Employee records are private and confidential. Generally, no one can access them other than the employee, their employer, and relevant payroll staff. Employers must make copies of an employee's records available at the request of an employee or former employee.

Fair Work Inspectors and organisation officials may access employee records to determine if there has been a contravention of relevant Commonwealth workplace laws.

### What information must be made and kept in employee records?

A range of information must be made and kept for each employee as prescribed by the Fair Work Act 2009 (FW Act) and Fair Work Regulations 2009 (FW Regulations).

#### General records

General employment records must include all of the following:

- the employer's name
- the employer's Australian Business Number (ABN)
- the employee's name
- the employee's commencement date
- the basis of the employee's employment (full or parttime and permanent, temporary or casual).

#### Pay records

Records of pay must include all of the following:

- · the rate of pay paid to the employee
- the gross and net amounts paid and any deductions from the gross amount
- the details of any incentive-based payment, bonus, loading, penalty rate, or other monetary allowance or separately identifiable entitlement paid.

#### Hours of work records

Records relating to hours worked by employees are to include the following:

 in the case of a casual or irregular part-time employee who is guaranteed a pay rate set by reference to time worked, a record of the hours worked by that employee

- for any other type of employee, the record must specify the number of overtime hours worked each day, or when the employee started and finished working overtime hours
- a copy of the written agreement if the employer and employee have agreed to the employee taking time off instead of being paid for overtime worked
- a copy of the written agreement if the employer and employee have agreed to an averaging of the employee's work hours.

#### Leave records

If an employee is entitled to leave, the record must include both:

- leave taken (if any)
- the balance of the employee's entitlement to that leave from time to time.

If an employer and an employee have agreed to the employee taking a period of annual leave in advance of an accrued amount of leave, the employer must keep a copy of the agreement which:

- states the amount of leave to be taken in advance and the date on which the leave is to commence
- must be signed by the employer and the employee, and if the employee is under 18 years of age, by the employee's parent or guardian.

If an employer and employee have agreed to cash out an accrued amount of leave, the employer must keep:

- a copy of the agreement to cash out the amount of leave
- a record of the amount of leave to be cashed out and the payment to be made to the employee for it
- the date on which the payment is to be made.

#### Superannuation contributions records

If the employer is required to make superannuation contributions for the benefit of the employee, the record must include all of the following:

- the amount of the contributions made
- the dates on which each contribution was made
- the period over which the contributions were made
- the name of any fund to which a contribution was made
- the basis on which the employer became liable to make the contribution, including a record of any election made by the employee (including the date) to have their superannuation contributions paid into a particular fund.

#### Individual flexibility arrangement records

If an employer and employee agree in writing to an individual flexibility arrangement in relation to an award or registered agreement, a record must include both:

- a copy of the agreement
- a copy of any notice or agreement terminating the flexibility arrangement.

#### Termination records

Where the employment has been terminated, the records must include:

whether the employment was terminated by consent,

### Keeping the Right Records (cont.)

by notice, summarily, or in some other manner (specifying the manner)

- if notice was provided and, if so, how much
- the name of the person who terminated the employment.

#### Transfer of Business records

Where there has been a transfer of business under the FW Act, at the time of transfer, the old employer is required to transfer to the new employer each employee record concerning a transferring employee.

#### What are the pay slip obligations?

Pay slips must be issued to each employee:

- within one working day of pay day, even if an employee is on leave
- in electronic form or hard copy.

#### What information must be included on a pay slip? Pay slips must contain details of the payments,

deductions, and superannuation contributions for each pay period.

A pay slip must include all of the following:

- the employer's name
- the employer's ABN (if any)
- the employee's name
- the date of payment
- the pay period
- the gross and net amount of payment
- any loadings (including casual loading), monetary allowances, bonuses, incentive-based payments, penalty rates, or other separately identifiable entitlement paid.

Additionally, where relevant, a pay slip must include any of the following:

- if the employee is paid an hourly pay rate, the ordinary hourly pay rate and the number of hours worked at that rate and the amount of payment made at that rate
- if the employee is paid an annual rate of pay (salary), the rate as at the last day in the pay period
- any deductions made, including the name, or the name and number, of the fund or the account of each deduction
- if the employer is required to make superannuation contributions for the benefit of the employee:
  - the amount of each contribution the employer made or intends to make during the pay period
  - the name, or name and number, of any superannuation fund into which the contributions were made or will be made.

However, when an employer needs to give a new employee a pay slip within 14 days of their first pay day, they don't have to include the superannuation fund name or number if:

- the employee hasn't notified the employer of their choice of superannuation fund
- the employer hasn't been able to obtain the employee's stapled superannuation fund details from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

#### What information must NOT be included on a pay

#### slip?

Pay slips **must not** mention paid family and domestic violence leave, however you do need to keep a record of this leave balance and any leave taken by employees.

### What deductions may be made from an employee's

Under the FW Act, an employer can only deduct money

- the employee agrees in writing (which must specify the amount) and it's principally for their benefit
- it's allowed by a law, a court order, or by the Fair Work Commission
- it's allowed under the employee's award, or
- it's allowed under the employee's registered agreement and the employee agrees to it.

Deductions that are commonly authorised include income tax deductions, voluntary superannuation or health insurance contributions, and trade union dues.

A term in a registered agreement, an award, or a contract of employment that allows for deductions has no effect if:

- the deduction is directly or indirectly for the benefit of the employer and is unreasonable, or
- the employee is under the age of 18 and the employee's parent or guardian has not authorised the deduction in writing.

The FW Regulations provide that certain deductions are to be treated as reasonable. These include, for example, the recovery of costs incurred through private use by the employee of a credit card, mobile phone, or petrol for a vehicle that has been provided by the employer.

#### Best practice guidelines for issuing electronic pay slips

Electronic pay slips must be provided to an employee (unless issued a hard copy) and include the same information as hard copy pay slips.

Employers should:

- give electronic pay slips to each worker, such as via email or into an electronic personal account (employers should not simply store them on a database)
- issue electronic pay slips in an easily printable

By way of best practice, employers should:

- issue electronic pay slips to employees securely and confidentially
- ensure that employees can access and print their electronic pay slips in private (for example, it would be inappropriate to issue an electronic pay slip to an employee who doesn't have access to a computer terminal to privately read and print their pay slip).

#### Contravention of record-keeping and pay slip obligations

The Fair Work Ombudsman may pursue a number of enforcement actions in relation to contraventions of record-keeping and pay slip obligations.

Fair Work Inspectors may issue an employer with an

### Keeping the Right Records (cont.)

infringement notice for failing to meet their recordkeeping and pay slip obligations under the FW Act.

An infringement notice is similar to an on-the-spot fine and is an alternative to taking matters to court. An infringement notice can be issued within 12 months after the day on which the contravention(s) is alleged to have occurred. Generally, an employer has 28 days to pay the penalty in the infringement notice.

The maximum penalty a court may impose is:

- \$1,650 per contravention for an individual
- \$8,250 per contravention for a company.

If an employer's failure to meet their record-keeping obligations is serious, wilful or repetitive, Fair Work Inspectors may recommend the matter be taken to court.

The maximum penalties a court may impose for recordkeeping and pay slip contraventions are:

- \$16,500 per contravention for an individual
- \$82,500 per contravention for a company.

A court may find that record-keeping contraventions are 'serious contraventions' if they occurred knowingly and as part of a systematic pattern of conduct. The maximum penalties for serious contraventions are:

- \$165,000 per contravention for an individual
- \$825,000 per contravention for a company.

### Other consequences of not meeting record-keeping or pay slip requirements

In addition to penalties for not keeping records, the Fair Work Act 2009 includes a presumption in favour of a person who makes wage-related allegations in a court proceeding, where the employer has:

- failed to meet their record-keeping and pay slip obligations, or
- failed to make records available for inspection.

If the person bringing the claim shows the employer didn't comply with the record-keeping and/or pay slip requirement, the employer will be required to disprove the person's wage-related allegation in court.

This onus of disproving the allegation will not apply if the employer can show they had a reasonable excuse for not meeting the record-keeping, pay slip or record inspection obligation.

#### Record-keeping templates for employers



### One-Pan Creamy Sun-Dried Tomato Chicken Gnocchi

#### **INGREDIENTS:**

6 (5-oz.) bone-in, skin-on chicken thighs

1 1/2 tsp.

dried Italian seasoning

1 tsp. sweet paprika

Kosher salt

Freshly ground black pepper

2 tbsp. extra-virgin olive

1/2 c. thinly sliced drained

oil-packed sun-dried tomatoes, plus 1 tbsp. oil from jar

4 cloves garlic, finely chopped

1/2 c. dry white wine, such as Pinot Grigio or Sauvignon Blanc

1 3/4 c. low-sodium chicken broth

1/2 c. heavy cream

1 (17-oz.) package gnocchi

1 (5-oz.) package baby spinach

1/2 c. finely grated Parmesan

METHOD:

Step 1: Preheat oven to 400°. Season chicken on both sides with Italian seasoning, paprika, 1 1/2 teaspoons salt, and 1/4 teaspoon pepper. In a large skillet over medium-high heat, heat olive oil. Add chicken and cook until golden brown, about 4 minutes per side. Transfer chicken to a plate.

Step 2: Return skillet to medium-high heat and heat tomato oil. Add garlic and cook, stirring, until fragrant, about 1 minute. Add wine and cook, stirring, until reduced by half, about 1 minute more. Add broth, then slowly stir in cream. Bring to a simmer and stir in gnocchi, tomatoes, and 1/2 teaspoon salt. Return chicken to pan.

Step 3: Bake until chicken is cooked through and an instant-read thermometer inserted into thickest part registers 175°, 14 to 16 minutes.

Step 4: Transfer chicken to a plate. Add spinach and Parmesan to skillet. Cook, stirring, until spinach wilts, about 2 minutes. Return chicken to skillet; season with salt and pepper.
