Neil Bishop Eulogy

22/6/1926 - 1/7/2023

Read by Gillian—We have appreciated the many kind and thoughtful phone calls, cards and messages – funny and poignant memories of how Dad has been involved in many lives over his 97 years. Dad's sense of humour and his cheek were well known, as was his love of family and farming. Although we miss Dad in our daily lives we are actually quite happy for him - he is right where he wants to be.

Read by Russell—Dad was born in Wagin, the eldest son of Sidney and Frances. Sid along with his parents and siblings emigrated to Australia from Towcester in England in 1910. They arrived in Lake grace in 1911 and began establishing their farm Brockham 4 miles south of town.

Dad's mother, Frances Sinclair was a nurse from Wagin who had served in Egypt during the first war. Sid met Frances at the Wagin hospital when being treated for a leg injury after slicing his leg open with an axe. A two day trip in a horse drawn cart in those days.

Their early years were spent at Murrumbung, a farm just west of Lake Grace before Sid bought the original farm, Brockham, from his parents when they retired to Perth. By this time Dad had two brothers, Rob and Fred and a sister Elizabeth, better known as Biddy. They had a good life and upbringing despite the privations of the depression era. As kids on a farm, I doubt they noticed.


Dad had a couple of years boarding at Christ Church which was a stark contrast to life on the farm causing him some home sickness, relieved somewhat by an occasional weekend with Perth relatives – Bishops and Sinclairs. However, he was back home working on the farm at 15 until joining the air force towards the end of world war 2. Dad was on the train to active service in Darwin when the war ended. He had memories of unexciting times spent guarding warehouses with rifles without bullets.

When on leave in Adelaide he met a local girl Hilary May and in 1952 they were married in Adelaide and returned to the farm in Lake Grace. Biddy tells us that she was lovely.

Tragically, Hillary died of a brain tumour after only 3 months of marriage. In later life Dad described this period of his life as being 'like a dream'. I can only imagine the effect this would have had on him.

In 1956 Dad married Elsie Ness from Newdegate, our Mum! They also started their farming and married life at Murrumbung before moving out to the Buniche farm when Gillian was a baby. Joy and I eventually arrived, and they settled into a life on the land with all its ups and downs.

Dad loved the farm and farming; it was the only thing he wanted to do. That and making Mum happy. He had some wins and some losses in both endeavours. He especially liked working with sheep and walking behind a mob with a dog gave him great pleasure.



We had a pretty typical farm upbringing, we all enjoyed helping Dad out, especially if it involved sheep work and shearing. I don't think we ever got yelled at, he always made time for us. Although I do remember when I was about 3 and pantless running through the garden with him after me with the bannister brush. I must have done something bad because we rarely saw him upset.

He once told me how the first time he took the girls to watch as he killed a sheep they both went and cried in the ute. I think he lured them out with the promise of an anatomy lesson, and this became a regular thing. We learnt at a young age how hard it is to puncture a sheeps eyeball and how far their intestines stretch and what the inside of a heart looks like.

Dad was a patient driving instructor and we learnt to drive at an early age. Gillian can recall steering the truck when she was about 6 while Dad fed sheep. We could ride around in the header box or on the back of the combine at seeding. Mum would have been horrified if she knew, or maybe she did and turned a blind eye. He taught us a lot, probably more than we realise.

I think he was more upset than Mum when sending us off to boarding school. We were such great kids!... or maybe it was just the cost.

For a few years a quad bike was his favourite mode of transport and all the better with a grandchild or two on board. Amy's first ride was tucked into his left arm at just a few days old, a nervous 15 minutes for Anne. They all have fond memories of chasing sheep with Dad and

learning the subtle art of moving a mob without stress. He would often arrive at the yards cradling a tuckered out sound asleep 4 year old and a grin all over his face.

Dad had a great sense of civic duty, something inherited from his parents and got involved in many community organisations especially the Anglican Church. Both he and Mum were strong supporters of the Lake Biddy church and of all the Anglican Ministers of the time.

He approached most things with a sense of humour and mostly still had it at the end. He loved a chat and an opportunity to hand out some cheek. Anyone losing some hair or gaining weight had that pointed out to them.

Prospective boyfriends of the girls were met at the garden gate with an axe, wheelbarrow and a command to chop a load of wood before they could take any daughter out! They all complied. He did lack tact at times though, so apologies to those who were on the receiving end.

In later years Mum and Dad moved into Lake Grace and into semi-retirement. Dad would drive out to Buniche most days and was making himself useful into his late eighties. Although an incident between the header and a field bin brought his machine operating days to an end - the expensive ones anyway!

When we sold the farm in 2019 he and Mum moved into a unit in Perth not far from Gillian and Joy's homes. It was a big step for them leaving friends behind and a vibrant supportive community but closer to family. After Mum died he alternated between Gillian and Joy's houses and occasionally ours in Busselton. Eventually he said he wanted a place of his own (out of our hair, he said!!) so we found him a spot in an aged care home for the last year and a half of his life. He had family visiting every day – children, grandchildren and even the great grandies, which he really enjoyed.

So, there you have it. A very brief summary of a very long life. Thanks Dad! for everything.

Read by Joy—Dad had an excellent diet with 3 exceptions.

For most of his life dad would have 4 cups of tea and 1 cup of coffee a day, with 3 teaspoons of sugar in each cup. 15 for the day. That is a lot of sugar for one person each day.

Mum, Gillian, Anne and I always used salt, herbs and spices in our cooking but that wasn't enough for Dad. He would always put lots of extra salt on his meals. He loved potatoes, doesn't matter how they were cooked as long as he got his spuds for lunch and dinner...... with salt.

Dad wasn't too happy with the food in aged care. We made sure that he got his spuds for lunch and dinner and felt the menu was quite good. Gillian and I couldn't

work out why he didn't like the food, but I reckon it was because of the salt or lack of.

Dad enjoyed homemade dessert and had it nearly every day of his life. We couldn't fill Mum's shoes in that department and with us Dad had to put up with plain old ice cream. Dad loved chocolate, but Mum would always ration the chocolate to a little bit each day, but after she passed away all hell broke loose. Chocolate came from everywhere. Old Gold and Tim Tams were his favourites.

We would take him Tim Tams when he lived at Lady McCusker and I am sure that sometimes he devoured a pack a day. And guess what...he put on weight around his middle. He was a bit mortified when he couldn't fit into his favourite jeans. It was a bit of a quandary for Dad.....jeans or Tim Tams....Tim Tams or jeans. Tim tams won!!

After a while we cut back on the amount we took him, he lost weight. The staff were concerned about the weight loss and were going to give him Ensure.... Uurgh... We weren't having that! so back we went with the Tim Tams. Dad put the weight back on and everyone was happy.

And what about the smoking. Dad started at an early age and smoked right up into his late 80s early 90s. He stopped buying cigarettes and tried to give up smoking but that didn't work, so he started bumming cigarettes off people around town and our friends here in the city. We have to apologise to all those people as we doubt if he ever paid you back. Our cousin Bruce recalls coming out of the post office to find Dad sitting in the passenger seat, puffing away having found Bruce's carefully hidden cigarettes. And then there was one particular grandson...Declan .. who doesn't smoke, but now and again he would sneak Dad a cigarette. They would hide around the side of the house and Dad would have his smoke and be the happiest man in the world.

So, there you go ... Dad's 3 favourite food groups... Salt, Fat and Sugar with cigarettes to top it off. All I can say is 'Good on you Dad, you broke the mould.'

Farmers from the West heading to Canberra

Media Release

Farmers and representatives from across the West are packing their bags and heading to Canberra on September 5 to speak directly to politicians about the Government's proposed phase out of live sheep exports.

The delegation of eight people from Western Australia includes representatives from Sheep Producers Australia, WAFarmers, WoolProducers Australia, the Western Australian Shearing Industry Association and the WA Livestock & Rural Transport Association.

Darren Spencer runs his own shearing business about 450km from Perth in Lake King and says the group wants to share with politicians in person what's at stake if the Government pushes ahead with the phase out.

"We want to make sure politicians from across Australia understand that when they talk about phasing out live sheep exports, they risk phasing out whole towns," he said.

"The live sheep export industry is concentrated in Western Australia and employs farmers, shearers, truck drivers and livestock agents – which means it supports families, small schools - entire communities, and the towns they live in. Phasing out live export really will phase out whole towns."

Australia's live export industry is worth some \$1.3 billion and generates around 10,000 jobs, many in remote areas.

But the Albanese Government has committed to phasing out live exports of sheep by sea.

An independent panel has been appointed by the

Minister for Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry, Senator the Hon Murray Watt to consult with all those involved. The panel is expected to provide its report to Government by September 30, 2023.

The phase out does not apply to other industries such as live cattle exports.

Ben Sutherland, owner of a rural livestock transport business called 5k Livestock and Bulk, echoed Darren Spencer's comments about the phase out.

"This won't just affect farmers it's something that will be felt across the community," he said.

"We help with activities like hauling equipment for local schools and their sports activities - and we give a strong hand with donations and the like for the local footy club. We won't be able to keep doing things like that if this phase out is supported.

"Right now, it's a busy time of year and our business is supporting five employees, so it's a big thing to head over to Canberra, but we want to look politicians in the eye and help them understand what this phase out will do to our families, our kids – and the Australian economy."

The group heading to Canberra is set to present their argument to politicians from all sides on September 5 at Parliament House. They are hoping to speak with Minister Watt in person.

The West Australian delegation includes Geoff Pearson from WAFarmers, Steve McGuire representing West Australian wool producers, Corrigin sheep farmer Steven Bolt, Western Australian Shearing Industry Association representative Darren Spencer and Ben Sutherland from the WA Livestock and Rural Transport Association.

The Wool industry in WA had a gross value of \$655 million in 2021/22, which was 49% of the total contribution of the sheep industry

WA produced 61.2 million kilograms of greasy wool in 2021/22, over 95% is merino wool destined to be used for apparel

The entire Western Australian wool clip is exported or transported interstate

The total live export industry is worth \$1.3 billion (in 2022) and generates around 10,000 jobs, many in remote areas

Australians have increased confidence in the live export industry, including animal welfare standards, according to research conducted by CSIRO spin off Voconiq The average voyage mortality rate for sheep in 2022 is a record low level.

The average voyage mortality rate in 2022 compares to average voyage mortality rates of 0.22% in 2020, 0.64% in 2015 and 0.90% in 2010 – that is, average sheep voyage mortality rates are now about one-sixth of the levels they were in 2010.

We do this in light of the adverse statistics that represent men's health in general and the notion that for a large proportion of men developing their health knowledge is not seen as a priority. This fits with men having a more functional view of their health i.e. not seeking help until we are virtually physically impaired by the problem. We often challenge men on these points but what does it really mean as a bloke to take responsibility for his own wellbeing and health?

As blokes we take responsibility and make a lot of informed decisions throughout our lives, on a variety of things such as family, work and social issues. Why then should decisions about our wellbeing and health be any different?

Too many blokes are running into trouble because we keep avoiding and putting off looking after our wellbeing and health. Just being a passive participant is not good enough, we need to be the one in the driver's seat in all areas of our health be it physical, mental or social/spiritual.

Taking responsibility for our wellbeing and health means becoming an active and informed healthcare consumer. It means scheduling regular service visits with our doctor and being aware of issues that affect us at certain stages of our lives, such as the potential for prostate problems as we get older. We also need to consider issues that could be common in our families (hereditary) and discuss these with the doctor. It's a bit of a generalisation but how many of us guys rely on our wives or partners for our health when it comes to our diet i.e. what food is in the house and what we eat for dinner?

Remember that it's not our wife's, mate's or doctor's wellbeing and health, it's ours. Good wellbeing and health can only happen if and when we as blokes take responsibility!

While taking charge is important it doesn't mean we have to go it alone, we all need help sometimes. From a community educator and support worker perspective, this often means our role involves walking beside someone helping to establish relevant pathways of support. It could also be simply listening to and validating people's issues and accompanying emotions. We see it as, walking beside the ute with the window down but not hopping in, it's your ride, you are the one in the driver's seat!

Our key message ... before it at all gets too much... Talk to a Mate®!! requires us to take some responsibility in that it's important we identify who our mates are so that when the shit hits the fan (and it does happen) we have a plan in place to address things.

Block Your Driver's License to Lock-out Identity Thieves

Money is not the only thing scammers are looking to steal these days – your personal identification can be just as valuable to them.

As part of their ruse, scammers posing as legitimate organisations or government service providers often pretend to need copies of your driver's license and passport to verify your identity, when their actual aim is to steal it.

Having your identity stolen can cause devastating and long-lasting impacts, from finding unauthorised purchases on your credit card, through to having your name used to open bank accounts, take out loans and even to scam other people.

Just recently, Consumer Protection issued a warning about a fake WA Seniors Card website that was targeting seniors for both their money and multiple forms of identification. In reality, the WA Seniors Card is free of charge and applicants are never requested to pay a fee, or disclose personal identification in exchange for membership.

Aside from sending scammers your personal information, the other way they can get their hands on it is through data breaches that occur when cybercriminals hack into an organisation's system and leak their

customers' details onto the dark web.

To help protect all WA consumers from identity theft, the Department of Transport has made it possible to put a block on your driver's license to stop it being used to verify your identity online.

Putting a block on your driver's license or learner's permit means if a scammer tries to use these documents for identity verification through the Australian Government's Document Verification Service (DVS), it will be declined.

You can add and remove a driver's license block anytime using DoTDirect by navigating to the 'Protect your identity' section on the 'Driver's license' page. Your authority to drive is not affected by having a block on your driver's license.

If you are caught up in a data breach, or have handed over your personal identification to scammers, your first step should be to contact IDCARE, a national identity and cyber support service on 1800 595 160.

How to grow tomatoes

Tomatoes are one of the most popular backyard vegies. Home-grown Tomatoes are full of flavour and can be picked at their tastiest and sun-ripened best. There are large varieties that are ideal for growing in vegie patches and compact varieties for small garden spaces and pots.

Tomatoes are easy to grow and can be very productive too, if you follow some simple feeding, watering and insect and disease protection steps. Spring is a great time to start growing Tomatoes in Australia. Here's how to get growing!

How to grow tomatoes in a garden

- Choose a sunny spot in the garden with well drained soil and mix in a soil improver and plant fertilizer.
- Sow the seeds, lightly cover with and water well.
 If you are growing from seedlings, you can plant them a little deeper, so that the bottom few centimetres of the stems/roots are covered and water in well.
- To avoid damaging plant roots later in growth, its best to put stakes in for the support of the tall growing tomatoes.
- As the seedlings emerge and grow, use a liquid plant food weekly and mulch around the base, keeping it away from the main stem.
- As the tall staked tomatoes grow, gently tie the main stem to the stake with a plant tie or an old pair of stockings. This keeps the plant from drooping and losing its posture.
- When the tomatoes are nice and plump and red, feel free to harvest them.

How to grow tomatoes in a pot

Its best to choose a smaller variety of tomato to grow in a pot.

- Choose a pot at least 400mm wide and deep and make sure it is in the sun fully and fill it with a good quality potting mix.
- Sow seeds, lightly cover and water well. If you're using seedlings, they can be planted a little deeper so the bottom of the stem/roots are covered with soil. Water them well.
- Even though these are growing in a pot, they will grow tall and require staking. Its best to do that now to avoid damaging the roots.
- Potted plants dry out quicker than in-ground plants, so its important to water them more regularly.
- As the seedlings grow, feed them weekly with a liquid plant food to encourage that growth.
- The staked tomatoes will grow tall and will need to be tied to the stake with a plant tie or old

- stockings, but make sure you tie the main stem to help keep it growing tall.
- You can harvest the tomatoes when they are red and plump and look delicious.

Common problems with tomatoes

How to Get Rid of Common Pests of Tomatoes

Caterpillars, Aphids and Whiteflies find Tomatoes irresistible. To help control them in your garden, spray at first sight with Pest Insect Killer Ready to Use Spray. Spray foliage thoroughly, including the undersides. This product works by contact action, so good coverage of insects is essential.

How to Stop Fruit Fly Attacking Tomatoes

If you live in an area with Fruit Fly you will need to protect your plants against this dreadful pest. Begin applications of Fruit Fly Control while fruit are still small and before they have changed colour. Otherwise, you will end up with little, cream-coloured 'worms' in your fruit. You can try harvesting Tomatoes a bit earlier, when just changing colour, and bring them inside to safely complete ripening. Also try growing cherry-sized Tomatoes instead, as these are much less susceptible to Fruit Fly attack.

How to Get Rid of Common Diseases of Tomatoes

Tomatoes can also succumb to diseases such as Powdery Mildew, Rust, Early Blight or Target Spot and various Leaf Spot diseases. These can all be treated with Yates Tomato & Vegetable Dust and is best applied as a preventative treatment. Dust seedlings approximately 7 days after transplanting and repeat at 7 -10-day intervals. Apply uniformly, ensuring that the upper leaf surfaces of foliage are covered.

Why Aren't My Tomatoes Flowering or Fruiting?

There are a few reasons why a Tomato plant is not fruiting including lack of sun, lack of nutrients, and excess nitrogen and lack of potassium.

Make sure the plant is getting enough sunlight (at least 6 hours direct) and feed with a Tomato and vegetable fertiliser such as Pelletized Food. Avoid using all-purpose

fertilisers as these tend to be high in nitrogen.

Biosecurity Blitz

Backyard Buddies

Wherever you live and whatever the size of your backyard, you can help protect WA's agriculture, forests, and natural ecosystems into the future.

The Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development's (DPIRD's) Biosecurity Blitz is back in 2023, with a special focus on reporting backyard pests and diseases.

The Biosecurity Blitz aims to protect Western Australia's backyards and agricultural industries from an increasing number of exotic threats, such as the recent incursions of polyphagous shot-hole borer (PSHB), myrtle rust and Queensland fruit fly (Qfly).

By checking your backyard for pests and diseases and reporting what you find, you'll learn about these organisms, help protect your garden, regional biodiversity and the local food and nursery industries in Western Australia.

Every report helps!

Your report helps to increase the likelihood that serious pests and diseases will be detected early, providing the best opportunity to eradicate or contain them.

If your report turns out to be a common pest, that data may be used to support WA's export trade.

New Beyond Blue Data Shows One in 3 People With a Mental Health Condition Don't Get Support

On World Suicide Prevention Day, new data from Beyond Blue shows almost one in 3 people with a mental health condition that impacts their life, are unlikely to reach out for support.

The results of Australia's Mental Health and Wellbeing Check, a survey of more than 5,000 people commissioned by Beyond Blue and carried out by the Social Research Centre, reveals the main reasons why people don't reach out.

The research found:

- 30% of people living with a mental health condition that was impacting their lives were unlikely to seek support from anyone.
- 39% of people delay seeking support due to costs.
- 30% delay seeking support due to waitlists.
- 27% think they'll get better without support.
- 24% think their problem isn't serious enough.

Beyond Blue CEO Georgie Harman says the data is concerning given the deep impact of poor mental health and suicide on people, families and communities.


"People need to know accessing support early, before they reach crisis point, can help alleviate stress, worry and isolation, and prevent depression and anxiety from getting worse. My message is don't wait, don't hesitate," Ms Harman said.

"We know people can think their problems are too small or trivial, or they believe they are taking up valuable mental health resources. But the impacts of depression, anxiety and emotional stress can be cumulative, and small problems can snowball and become harder to manage.

"Accessing support early for yourself or someone you care about, can prevent problems escalating." Nearly 80% of people who contacted Beyond Blue's Support Service reported an immediate reduction in distress, and ongoing feelings of reduced distress two weeks later.

"If you are delaying getting mental health support due to costs, or waitlists, you can reach out to the Beyond Blue Support Service or join our Online Community Forums. We are here for you regardless of how big or small the problem feels. It's never too soon to seek support," Ms Harman said.



Damage to Town Bush

the bush alongside Griffin Street, at the east end of town. At least 11 fully-grown mallees and quandong trees have been chopped down with an axe. These have been used to make a cubby or just left on the ground. As well, and for the third time, the stakes and guards protecting planted seedlings have been pulled out and/or snapped off. And there is now a fire pit in the middle of bush which is problematic.

It is against the law to cut down, remove, burn or damage native bush in Western Australia. People who do so can receive large fines.

At this particular patch of bush, we've planted trees in a bare area so the bush joins up and has a better chance of survival. This bush is one of the few remnants around our town. It is precious - local botanist Anne Rick found 45 different species here. However it's not a big area and the loss of these 11 trees will have an impact.

This site is part of the Lake Grace Bushcare Project. We are working to protect and revegetate remnant bush around Lake Grace, and beautify and improve our townsite. We have had such good community support for this project - 75 volunteers turned up to plant 2000+ seedlings. And this work goes on. We're trying to do some good here.

We are sad and disappointed to report recent damage to Parents can help. Please have a conversation with your children - whether they are playing in this bush or not about the damage that is happening here. We are not interested in blame, we want to get the word out; it is wonderful to play in nature but this is killing the bush we're trying to protect for future generations. We don't want to involve the authorities or install surveillance cameras but this is the third time this site has been damaged.



Pension Boosted But More Needed For Those In Need

From 20 September 2023, the Age Pension, Veteran Payment, Disability Support Pension and Carer Payment will receive an increase because of indexation.

The maximum rate of the single Age Pension will rise by \$32.70 per fortnight (taking it from \$1064 to \$1096.70) and for couples, by \$49.40 per fortnight (taking their combined payment from \$1604 to \$1653.40).

Chief Advocate Ian Henschke said while people who rely on the Age Pension will welcome the increase, under the current system pensioners are still behind, especially when inflation is unusually high.

Several other government payments will also be increased on 20 September in line with announcements made in the May Budget.

Single JobSeeker Payment recipients will receive a base payment of \$749.20 per fortnight, a \$56.10 increase. For JobSeeker recipients aged 55-59 unemployed for more than 9 months, the payment increase will be \$96.10 per fortnight.

A welcome change is the 15% increase to Commonwealth Rent Assistance. The maximum rate for a single renter will rise by \$27.60 to \$184.80 per fortnight, for a couple by \$26 to \$174.

"It's a good start but more needs to be done to help renters," Mr Henschke said.

"We recently heard from a couple paying \$920 a fortnight in rent. As pensioners, this leaves them with only \$907.40 a fortnight to pay for food, fuel, utilities, and other expenses."

Income limits for eligibility for the Commonwealth Seniors Health Card are increasing by \$5,400 to \$95,400 per annum for singles and by \$8,640 to \$152,640 for couples combined. With deeming rates frozen for two years, more self-funded retirees could now be eligible for concessions.

As recent National Seniors research showed, a greater proportion of people with low incomes and those who are renting are suffering from cost-of-living pressures." Mr Henschke said.

"For example, 39% of older renters told us they were experiencing severe cost-of-living impacts compared to only 11 % of older homeowners.

"What we need is additional targeted support for people with limited means and to stop punishing those who need to work.

"In our Employment White Paper Submission we have called on the government to simplify the tax and transfer system to boost workforce participation, and with it income and savings.

"We want a change to income test rules for pensioners who want to work and work more. This could be achieved by reducing the taper rate from 50c to 32.5c in the dollar to align with the tax system. It's simple, fair, will help solve critical workforce shortage, and boost the budget bottom line.

"We will continue to fight for a system that improves people's lives."



And in 2023 (at the age of nearly 56) she is still polling in the top 10 in Association F & B, Top 3 in Association highest goal scorer, and top 4 in Club F&B.

Honestly this isn't even the half of it – I've included no junior achievements. We know that she has played in 28 grand finals over her hockey career and won 22, including country week grand finals, all this with being nearly blind in one eye!

On the field she is a powerhouse, her skills are still impeccable, her knowledge of the game and contributions to team play and feedback is invaluable. Her advice, ideas and work ethic on field has contributed to not only LGPHC success, but the improvement of the hockey skills of this entire

association. It would be fair to say that the strength, depth and numbers of players taking up hockey in Lake Grace/ Pingrup is very much due to the path she has paved for players in our town.
